New Election

Beginning with September 1 from Herman Harkey, and Mary Ruth now on the State of Texas will be governed by a new election law. The We hope to have the best senior governed by a new election law. The object of the new law is to secure election returns from all elections at a much earlier date. The following transcence of the provisions of the secure are some of the provisions of the act

a much earlier date. The following are some of the provisions of the act which is known as Senate Bill 395.

1. Precinct election officers are required to telephone unofficial returns to the County Clerk—county chairman in case of primaries—when they complete the count.
