



These births may have occurred in other years or in other counties or there may be an error in the name, in such event if this information is furnished the State Bureau immediately that record may be cleared up before the investigation is finished, otherwise the births must stand charged against your county as a violation of the 1927 Vital Sta-tistic Law. Such a violation is a misdemeanor that carries a fine of not than \$5.000 nor more than \$50, for the medical attendant at every birth must file a certificate with the registrar at the time of birth. These violations appear as a reflec-
