The board reported various charges against Rapaport. One affidavit chargfied him with compelling an employee to work 12 to 13 hours Maily during the week and 16 to 17 hours on Fridays and Saturdays for \$16 a week. The board had been unable to secure any cooperation from either Miss Wilmer or Rapaport and their findings in both cases were acted upon very promptly by the National Recovery Administration.






