### Spur Bulldogs Lose To Lamesa 38 to 0

The Spur High School Bulldogs unable to handle the powerful Lamesa Tornadoes at Lamesa last Friday afternoon went down in defeat 38 to 0. Fighting every inch of the way the Spur team wasn't able to make a first down against the team that is rated as the best they had played this year. A smooth working, clock like team with both power on the offense and defense was the report of the Tornadoes when they went into action.

Inexperience with so much at stake proved a drawback to the Spur team. Nervousness at the opening of the game let the Lamesa team score before the Dogs could get the feel of the field and game.

Henry Scoggins was the outstanding star for Spur. Matarior and Levelland play for the championship of the north half next Friday and the loser of that contest plays Spur for the third place in the district or consolation. No game had been booked for this week by Spur authorities at time of going to press.

### Oklahoma Church Calls Local Pastor

The First Baptist Church at Duncan, Oklahoma, has extended a call to Rev. F. G. Rodgers, pastor of the first church in this city. Rev. Rodgers has accepted the call and at the services last Sunday morning tendered his resignation to the local church to be effect, December 1. The resignation was accepted, the church feeling that Rev. Rodgers was being called to a larger field and that the call should be from the right source.

Rev. Rodgers has been pastor of the First Church here the past six and one-half years, and during that time the work and organization has been greatly improved. He had the problem of carrying the work of the church through the depressed period, and during that time the Sunday School and church attendance has held up fine.

The church at Duncan has a membership of about 1500, and is a field any minister will be proud to serve.

### SHARP WHEELS ON HIGHWAY DOING DAMAGE

Highway authorities are calling attention of people to the fact that the old car wheels that have no casings on them are doing damage to the highway when these wheels are being used on wagons, trailers, trucks, and other vehicles driven on the highway. They are asking that you beat the rims down, or do something to these wheels to keep them from cutting the road. The highway officials state it is a violation of the law to run cutting wheels over a highway, and are asking people to cooperate to save the roads.

### Pay Delinquent Taxes Now

The State of Texas has made very lenient provisions for the payment of delinquent taxes by removing the greater portion of the penalty and striking off the interest for a reasonable time. If delinquent state and county taxes (and this applies to delinquent taxes for Spur Independent School District, too) are paid before the first of January, 1934, the penalty is only two per cent plus a small collection fee.

In Dickens County there are \$241,484.74 in delinquent taxes that are due to be paid. If these could be collected this fall, it would amount to more than all taxes collected in the county last year, if the State Auditor's report is correct.

### Plane Burns At Local Airport

The tri-motor transport plane of Lieut. R. G. Vaughan was destroyed by fire on the local airport about 1:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Lt. Vaughan and his assistant, Herbert Ator, flew to Spur Tuesday morning and had arranged to be here two days conducting joy rides over the city.

In the afternoon a number of people had gone to the airport to see the plane and some had taken a flight. Lieut. Vaughan had just landed with a number of persons whom he had taken for a flight, and a number were getting into the cabin of the plane for another flight. Some one lighted a cigarette and dropped the burning match in the dry grass which ignited at the tail of the plane. A gale was blowing from the north and the plane was headed south. The burning grass ignited the plane and it was in flames within a very few seconds.

The passengers were able to get away from the plane without injury, but the machine was completely destroyed. It was three years old and cost \$20,000.

DEMONSTRATOR DOUBLES GOAL

"I planned a canning budget before planting a garden this spring. The budget called for 609 pints of leafy vegetables, 140 starches, and 127 other vegetables; 137 pints meats including pork, beef and poultry products; 106 pints pickles and relishes; 280 pints fruits and fruit juices; 140 pints tomatoes and tomato juice; 94 pints preserves, jams, jellies; 36 pints hominy, and 36 pints miscellaneous products as soup stock, mock olives, sandwich spread," explained Mrs. F. B. Crockett, farm food supply demonstrator for the Espuela home demonstration club as she showed her canned foods and pointed proudly to the poster that showed her canning report beside her food budget.

"The total value of the canned foods in our pantry is \$153.45. The expense was \$22.95, that leaves a profit of \$131.10. But it is worth more than that to us. Besides the canned foods we have dried peas, beans, okra, pepper, home ground corn meal, home cured meats, home made cheese, and of course, all the milk and eggs we can use," continued Mrs. Crockett.

"Look at the difference in the color of the catsup that was processed in the sealed bottles and that cooked in the open kettle," exclaimed Mr. Crockett as he pointed out the two colors on the shelf. Mr. Crockett is as happy over the pantry as his wife and has helped her in everything. CLARA PRATT, H. D. A.

THE ROAD TO YESTERDAY

case of Theodore G. Rahutis, restaurant man of Gary, Ind., first to be deprived of the NRA insignia. H. S. Norton, chairman of the Gary Compliance Board reported that every one of Rahutis' 40 employees sustained in affidavit form repeated charges that he was violating both the maximum hour and minimum wage provisions of the President's Agreement he had signed. One employee was required to work 21 hours in 2 days at 1 cents an hour. On August 31 he was notified by the local board that "there must be some

misunderstanding on your part of the agreement as modified for the restaurant business." He failed to respond to an invitation to a conference and, according to the board, complaints kept pouring in from his employees. In his absence, another notice was handed to Mrs. Rahutis and a third and final formal warning was served on him personally, which read in part: "We hope you welcome this opportunity to make a voluntary statement. If complaints are unfounded, they should be disposed of, so there is no doubt as to your right to the Blue Eagle." All notices were ignored.

National Recovery Administrator Hugh S. Johnson's telegram to Rahutis said in part: "Even if complaints are not true, your refusal to come forward with some explanation when respectfully asked to do so by your local board indicates you are unwilling to cooperate with the President in his recovery program. Therefore, you will immediately cease displaying the Blue Eagle and surrender any NRA insignia in your possession to the postmaster at Gary. You will refrain from using the Blue Eagle in advertising or otherwise."

Following the first disciplinary action, telegrams were sent to Miss B. Wilmer, proprietor of the Crystal Beauty Shop, and Maurice Rapaport, manager of the Shop-town Market, both of New Rochelle, N. Y., ordering them to surrender their insignia to the postmaster instanter and to make no further display in any manner of the Blue Eagle. Affidavits filed with the compliance board of New Rochelle stated that the owner of the beauty shop had increased prices to her customers 50 percent, attributing the increases to the NRA, but had actually increased her overhead by only \$2 per week bringing the wages of her two girl employees to \$9 per week. The board reported various charges against Rapaport. One affidavit charged him with compelling an employee to work 12 to 13 hours daily during the week and 16 to 17 hours on Fridays and Saturdays for \$16 a week. The board had been unable to secure any cooperation from either Miss Wilmer or Rapaport and their findings in both cases were acted upon very promptly by the National Recovery Administration.
