



Duly Authorized Prijects

To all political sub-divisions of Dicken's County which consists off our Honorable Commissioner's Court, Our Honorable City Officials of the City of Spur, (the only incorporated city in the county), and the various school board, common, independent and consolidated, with their duly and learning efficience legally elected governing officials. If you have a project in mind that as a whole will serve the public alike in the way of improvements of a permanent nature, that will supply man labor and will consist of a per-manent improvement for your political sub-division same may be a feasible project, and can be authorized by the department when properly presented, but in no way will any project receive consideration unless presented through the designated channel. The designat ed channel is as follows: You will be furnished a blank project form from this office at any time you desire the form, and the assistance of an engineer and the whole hearted cooperation of your administrator to assist in any way in preparing your application for your project.

After your project is approved and authorized the entire labor will be paid by the Federal Government, and






