SCHOOL NEWS

(By S. C. Hall, Supt.)
O. C. Arthur, County Administrator CWA returned from Austin last week with the welcomed information that the authorities had tentatively approved the Gym Athletic Field Project for the Spur Schools, work to begin at the earliest convenience to all concerned. The project is composed of the construction of a Gymnasium 122'x76' in which can be built auditorium features that will accommodate over 1200 people. The Athletic Field adjoining the Gym can be used for football, baseball, tracks, tennis, playground ball and various outdoor sports. It is thought the tennis courts will be constructed of concrete.

The Gymnasium, which has been needed by the Spur Schools, will be a means of furnishing Physical Education to both Junior and Senior High School pupils. Nothing is needed in the Educational Work more than a means of physical development and play for the entire student body. Many parts of our moral derelictions in America are due to an unbalanced life from which amusements are largely omitted. The "bad" boy in the streets is usually following his instinct for amusement, of which the lack of playgrounds has deprived him. The playground and Recreational Association of America has found that play, under leadership, will cut down juvenile delinquency, and quotes court records to show the practical elimination of mischief and property destruction in various American cities following the establishment of public playgrounds. An "occupied child" is essential to his full development. Play, work, study, and recreation of the right sort are the means of keeping the child occupied. After all the present adult generation lives only for the building of the future adult generation which is the childhood of today. This General Recreational Field for the Spur Schools, which will serve a wide territory, is but another means of paying the debt of the adult generation. A child shall lead us!

Many new pupils have enrolled since the first of the year and several have dropped out because of moving from the community. The total enrollment of the four schools, including the colored school, still remains around the thousand mark. The Spur Schools need a more in-

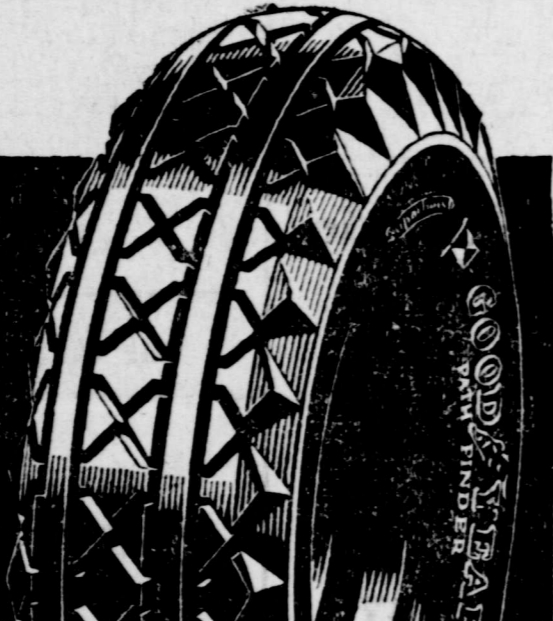

The Junior High School has been brightened up considerably with fresh paint on the interior. This work was done through the assistance of money from the CWA. Effort is being made in every way to brighten the atmosphere for the pupils of this school by making the building as attractive as possible. Further work will be done by janitors in washing the coal smoke from the ceilings.

The superintendent plans to have a flower planting program on all grounds this spring and make the grounds more attractive. The depression and water rates have slowed up this work in the past, but it is thought that more can be done this year. All parents and friends of the school who have flower suggestions please make them to J. I. Mecom at the Senior High School and Junior High School and Joe Draper at the Ward School.

All teachers have been on hand since the holidays eager to make the last round before the Mid-Term Exams. Pupils are manifesting eagerness to study and make good. The mid-term exams will begin Thursday January 25th and last through Saturday the 27th. All pupils in grades high enough to take exams will be exempt that have averages of 90 per cent in subjects taken.

Approximately 200 volumes of fiction have been added to the Junior High School Library and a very large number to the Junior High School during the past sixty days. These books will be available only to pupils doing necessary outside reading in English. Special care and pride is being taken in the use of the books.

Through CWA Mrs. M. H. Brannen is working as Special Librarian for the High School for six weeks ending February 15. Mrs. Brannen possessed the required degree and experience to qualify for this work in affiliated High School and is organizing the library in an efficient manner.

The administration notes with regret the announcement of Mr. O. L. Kelly, Ward School Principal for County Clerk. This will be a considerable promotion for Mr. Kelly in finance, but we shall regret very much to lose his talent in the Faculty should he be elected.

CLUB LEADERS PLAN PROGRAMS

Nine home demonstration clubs in the county were represented in the meeting of the club presidents and farm food supply demonstrators in the agent's office Saturday afternoon when they met to study the yearbooks and to plan for the demonstration on concrete hollow tile and other programs for this month and next. Each club has a farm food supply demonstrator who is expected to make and lay at least 100 feet of concrete hollow tile in her garden. The farm food supply demonstrators are to have charge of the programs this month based on the food budget. Each club member will make a food budget for her family at this program after the value and requirements of the foods for the family are studied.

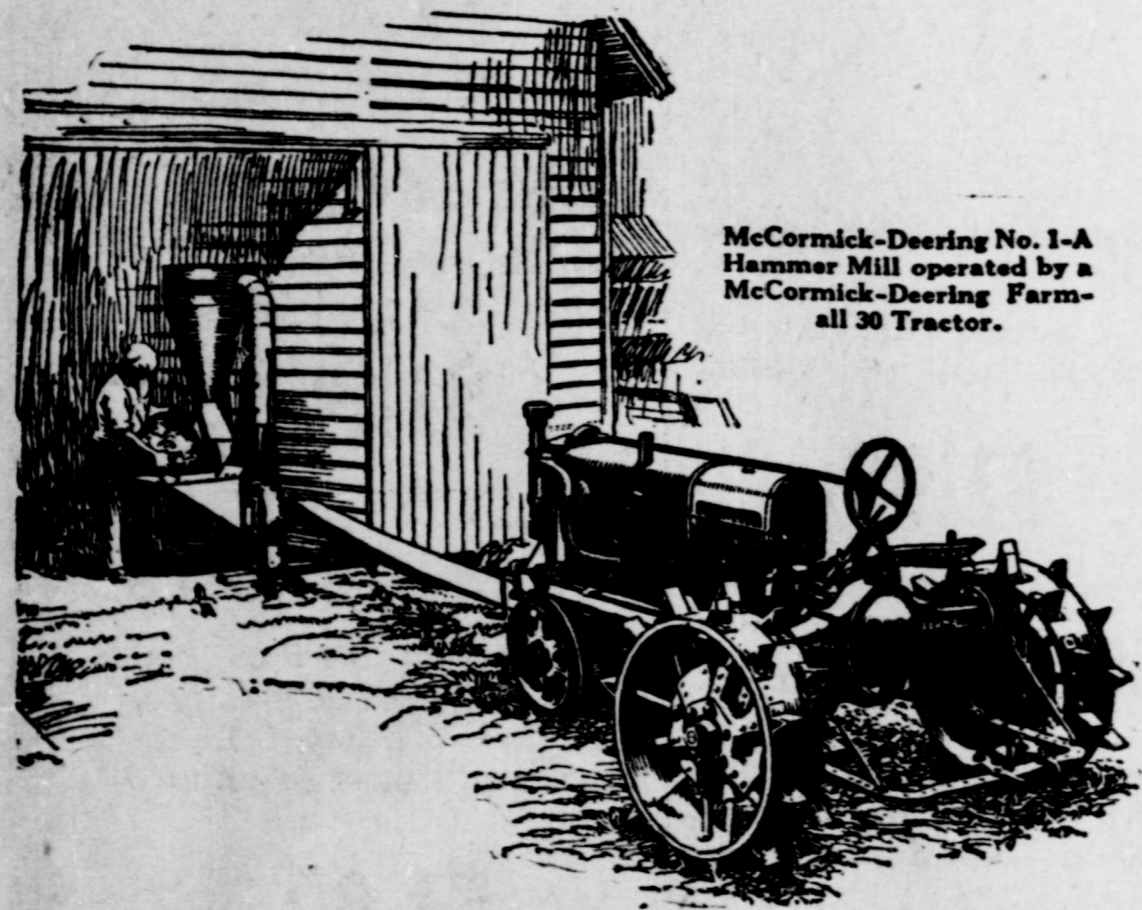

SCHOOL NEWS

(By S. C. Hall, Supt.)
O. C. Arthur, County Administrator CWA returned from Austin last week with the welcomed information that the authorities had tentatively approved the Gym Athletic Field Project for the Spur Schools, work to begin at the earliest convenience to all concerned. The project is composed of the construction of a Gymnasium 122'x76' in which can be built auditorium features that will accommodate over 1200 people. The Athletic Field adjoining the Gym can be used for football, baseball, tracks, tennis, playground ball and various outdoor sports. It is thought the tennis courts will be constructed of concrete.

The Gymnasium, which has been needed by the Spur Schools, will be a means of furnishing Physical Education to both Junior and Senior High School pupils. Nothing is needed in the Educational Work more than a means of physical development and play for the entire student body. Many parts of our moral derelictions in America are due to an unbalanced life from which amusements are largely omitted. The "bad" boy in the streets is usually following his instinct for amusement, of which the lack of playgrounds has deprived him. The playground and Recreational Association of America has found that play, under leadership, will cut down juvenile delinquency, and quotes court records to show the practical elimination of mischief and property destruction in various American cities following the establishment of public playgrounds. An "occupied child" is essential to his full development. Play, work, study, and recreation of the right sort are the means of keeping the child occupied. After all the present adult generation lives only for the building of the future adult generation which is the childhood of today. This General Recreational Field for the Spur Schools, which will serve a wide territory, is but another means of paying the debt of the adult generation. A child shall lead us!

Many new pupils have enrolled since the first of the year and several have dropped out because of moving from the community. The total enrollment of the four schools, including the colored school, still remains around the thousand mark.
The Spur Schools need a more in-

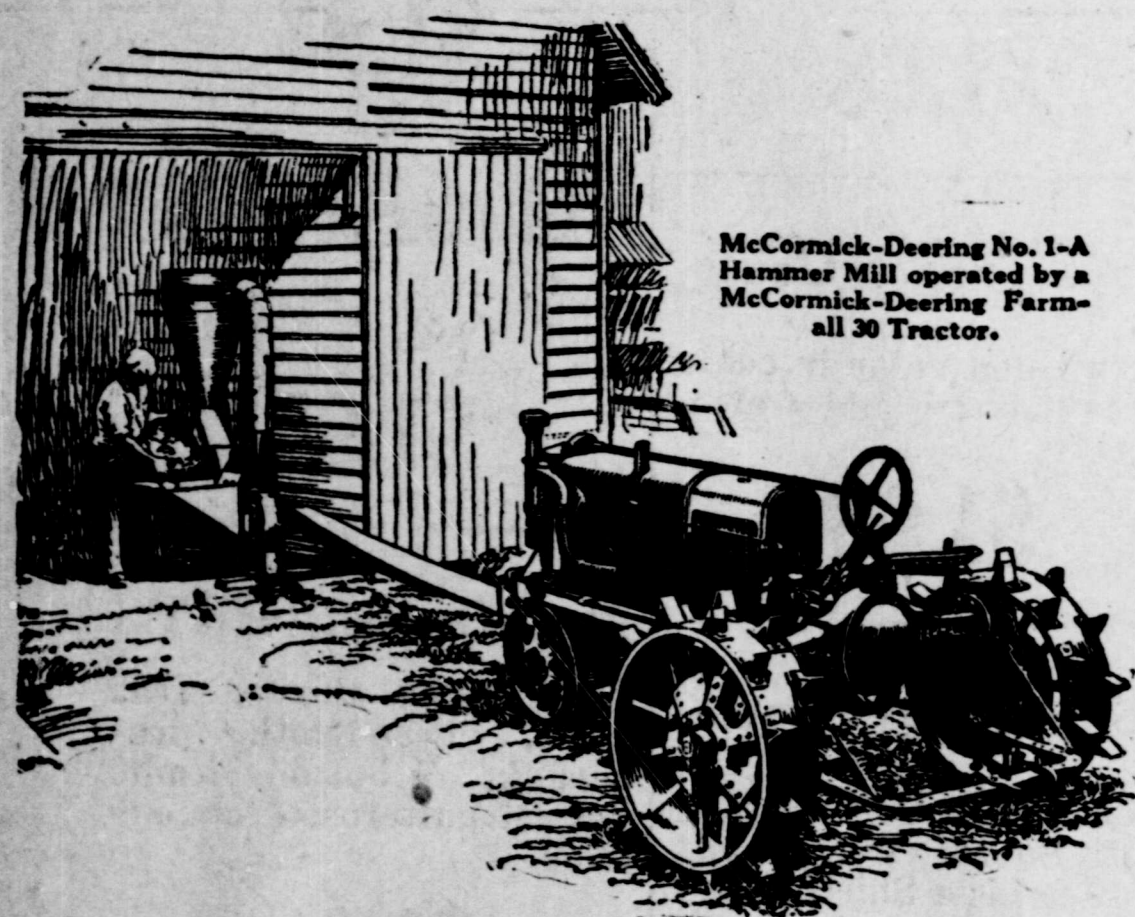

EDUCATION COMMITTEE MAKES ANNUAL REPORT

"More real interest has been shown in club work this past year than ever before in this county," said Mrs. W. M. Hunter when making a brief report on the organization and achievement of the work to the Commissioner's Court Monday. The Education Committee of the county home demonstration council make a six months' progress report in July and at this time gave a report based on the home agent's annual report.

Mrs. Thurmond Moore gave the report on the girls' work stating that of the 117 girls enrolled last year 94 reached most of the goals in the bedroom work in the county but due to the poor garden year they were not able to make that record in garden work.

Mrs. F. B. Crockett gave the report of the farm food supply demonstration, explaining the planning of the food budget to meet the needs of the family, and then planting the garden to provide enough vegetables to use fresh and canned. Mrs. Crockett told of her own pantry and how they doubled their budget requirements in their canning. The 14 food demonstrators show a combined report of 5,463 quarts canned food valued at \$1,436.10 with an average of 390 quarts valued at \$102.58. The cooperators turned in a report of 378,800 quarts or an average of 276 quarts valued at \$72.64. From the reports of the non-club members turned in we have an estimated total for the county of 534,263 quarts valued at \$71,481.74.
