SENATOR CONNALLY PRAISED FOR HIS HANDLING OF INQUIRY

Senator Connally may rest assured that the Texas public has had the intelligence to perceive that the senatorial committee investigating the elec tion of Senator Overton of Louisiana did a good job under most trying con-

It is obvious to every one that regardless of who is right in Louisiana passion and rash action are rampant on both sides of the political controversy now afflicting that state.

In view of the treatment accorded it, the senate committee might well have surrounded itself with United States officers and conducted a military-like court. It had, however, the human tolerance to put with a lot of criticism and violence of expression from opposing factions in order to give everybody a chance to be heard, in order to give the Louisiana public the benefit of an open hearing, democratically conducted.

The committee, it seems certain, as done all that it was empowered to do. Contrary to popular impression it was not sent to Louisiana to conduct hearings on the Huey Long regime, nor was it taking testimony in ouster proceedings against Senator Overton, since no formal contest of his election has ever been filed. It had the function solely of investigating expenditures in elections, with a view to reporting its findings to the standing senate com-mittee on elections. This committee, in recent years, has taken as its obligation a review of expenditures wherever serious charges of abuse are

This committee, conceivably, might find the expenditures in Louisiana so gross, and so improperly handled, as to lead it to propose the ousting of Senator Overton, Again it might find in the testimony evidence only of the need of amendment to the federal election laws; or it might find no cause whatever for action.

When this background of the Louisiana hearings is borne in mind the conclusion is very clear that the senatorial committee acquitted itself with considerable credit, and that a great deal of this credit must accrue to Chairman Connally. -Houston Chron-

NEW FOOD AND DRUG BILL BEFORE CONGRESS

Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, in speaking of pending legi-lation in this session of Congress, stated that the new Food and Drug Bill submitted by Senator Copeland last June will be brought before the Senate. From a public health stand-point its enactment is highly desire-

Nearly twenty-seven years enforcement of the present food and drug act has revealed many deficiencies in its provisions through which many abuses have been practiced. The pending bill is designed to correct these abuses by strengthening and extending the present law. All false and misleading advertising of foods, drugs, and cosmetics, through any medium whatsoever, is prohibited. Labels must be completly informative. An important feature of the new law has to do with the prohibition of added poisons in foods and establishment of safe tolerances.

Not only are cosmetics as a class brought under the regulatory control of the government, but also, all substances and preparations other than food and all devices intended to affect the body structure. Thus, such nostrums as the highly dangerous thyroid preparation, which now enjoys an unrestricted sale as a "slenderizing agent" can simply be taken

off the market. Under the new bill the interests of consumers are of paramount interest. but ethical manufacturers have been quick to recognize that they are also protected. The fate of the new bill rests with the public. If you as a consumer whom it is designed to protect, believe that this bill should be enacted, write to your Senator and Congressman and let them know

SENATOR CONNALLY PRAISED FOR HIS HANDLING OF INQUIRY

Senator Connally may rest assured that the Texas public has had the intelligence to perceive that the senatorial committee investigating the elec tion of Senator Overton of Louisiana did a good job under most trying con-

It is obvious to every one that regardless of who is right in Louisiana passion and rash action are rampant on both sides of the political contro-

versy now afflicting that state. In view of the treatment accorded it, the senate committee might well have surrounded itself with United States officers and conducted a military-like court. It had, however, the human tolerance to put with a lot of criticism and violence of expression from opposing factions in order to give everybody a chance to be heard, in order to give the Louisiana public the benefit of an open hearing, demo-

ratically conducted. The committee, it seems certain, has done all that it was empowered to do. Contrary to popular impression it was not sent to Louisiana to conduct hearings on the Huey Long regime, nor was it taking testimony in ouster proceedings against Senator Overton, since no formal contest of his election has ever been filed. It had the function solely of investigating expenditures in elections, with a view to reporting its findings to the standing senate committee on elections. This committee, in recent years, has taken as its obligation a review of expenditures wher-

ever serious charges of abuse are This committee, conceivably, might find the expenditures in Louisiana so gross, and so improperly handled, as to lead it to propose the ousting of Senator Overton, Again it might find in the testimony evidence only of the need of amendment to the federal election laws; or it might find no cause

whatever for action. When this background of the Louisiana hearings is borne in mind the conclusion is very clear that the senatorial committee acquitted itself with considerable credit, and that a great deal of this credit must accrue to Chairman Connally. - Houston Chron-



writers often hear the question, "which comes first, the words or the music?" In our particular case the answer is er writers of popular songs use the same method while many reverse the process and fashion the words to fit the tune. There's no set formula. But for musical shows the former procedure is used more than the latter because the numbers must be built around the idea that fits in with the plot and the director's plan of staging.
As a good example for illustration let's take the "Dusty Shoes" number
