





County Health Nurse Examining Children

Approximately every school in Dickens County has been visited by the County Health Nurse, Miss Evelyn Richter. Thursday, inspections will be made at Twin Wells, Peaceful Hill and Red Mud; Monday, February 12th, inspections will be made at Espuela, and Wednesday, 15th, inspections will be made at Dickens Schools.

Forty-four children had the first dose of diptheria toxid at Highway School, and eighty-five colored children in Spur were given the first dose. Six camps have been visited in Dickens during the past week. Every school in Dickens County is to be given an inspection during the survey of the health department if time

permits. We are urging that all children be given the diptheria toxid, typhoid serum, and be vaccinated for smallpox. Let's not wait for an epidemic to break out before having the children vaccinated. Prevention is so much more satisfactory than cure. In about six months after a child has had the diptheria toxoid, have a doctor do a shick test to determine if immunity has been perfected.

The cards that are being sent home by the nurse after school inspections are to bring the parents' attention to the defects which in the Nurse's opinion need medical aattention. Visit the doctor or dentist and give the child the benefit of a treatment which might be indicated, especially eyes, teeth and




