WHOOPING COUGH A DANGEROUS DISEASE

Whooping cough was formerly regarded as one of the infectious diseases of minor importance. According to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, this is not so. Each year many children die of this disease; in fact it causes more deaths than scarlet fever, measles and small pox combined.

Whooping cough is a treacherous disease. It resembles the proverbial wolf in sheep's clothing. Illness begins gradually, causing parents to feel that the symptoms are those of an orwhoop appears. Unfortunately, the dinary cold, until the characteristic disease is most infectious during the early stages. Children in the first years of life are in the greatest danger of developing pneumonia, the most severe complication.

The chief hope in controlling epidemics of whooping cough lies in those measures which help to prevent the sperad of disease. Children with the isolation for a period of twenty-one disease should remain at home and in days. Children with the disease should be reported to their family physician or local health officer.

Dr. Brown further urged parents to do everything they can to protect their children from whooping cough. Keep them away from playmates who have colds, especially when whooping cough is prevalent. Teach children not to put things in their mouths that have been handled by others and to wash their hands before meals. In spite of all precaution, if your child seems to be catching whooping cough, call your doctor at once. He can do much to relieve the patient's distress if treatment is begun early and will advise about diet, rest, exercises, and fresh air for the patient.

TECH JUDGING TEAM PLACES SECOND AT FT. WORTH

Texas Technological College livestock and dairy cattle judging teams placed second and fourth, respectively, in contests held at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show March 10. The Tech team placed first in cat-

10. The Tech team placed first in cattle and sheep, third in horses, and fourth in swine. Fourth and fifth places in the livestock judging contest were held by Casey Fine of Posey and Herbert Davis of Silverton. Other members of the team are Henry Elder of Cuero, Billie Murray of Lubbock and Coach R. C. Mowry.

Kansas State Agricultural College, holders of first places in livestock judging from the American Royal at Kansas City and the International at Chicago, won first place with a total of 4,491 points against Texas Tech's 4,415. Texas A. and M. ranked third with 4,368, Oklahoma A. & M., fourth with 4,368, Oklahoma A. & M., fourth with 4,363, Louisiana State University, fifth with 4,061, and Texas College of Arts and Industries placed sixth with 3,947.

NEW GAS TAX LAW INCREASES STATE REVENUE

Gasoline tax evaders "coughed up" more than \$3,000,000 in extra revenues to the state during the first nine months the new enforcement law was in operation, the Texas Good Roads Association estimated today from Comptroller Glorge IH. Sheppard's

complete report for 1933. Three hard-pressed state departments-schools, bond refunding and nighways-share in the captured boun ty, the first two at the rate of \$750,-000 each and the last named at \$1,-

The impressive sum, regarded at the capitol as "just like finding money" because it took nothing from any other bureau and required no new taxaion, came entirely from sources which had been able to avoid gas tax pay-ment until violation was made a fel-ony and the comptroller provided with

adequate enforcement machinery.

A comparative table of gas tax payments, month by month, for both 1932 and 1933, compiled by J. W. McReynolds, the comptrollers chief of gas tax operations shows vividly the value of the new law.

Gasoline tax collections fall \$200,000 month below 1932 during the first three months of 1933. The law was enacted March 21. April payments were off only \$63,000, while in May they jumped \$33,00 ahead of the previous May. June was \$122,000 ahead, August \$189,000, September \$303,000 and December \$465.000.

The improvement in gas tax payments ranged from a 10 per cent decrease in January to a 20 per cent increase in December.

An additional \$189,000 is involved in gas tax claims in the courts, the comptroller reports.

Salads to Serve in the Spring Help to Whet Family's Appetite
