

To the right of the center of the stamp facing the left is a reproduction of the painting by James Abbott McNeill Whistler, entitled "Portrait of My Mother." Along the top of the stamp at the left in solid Old English lettering are the words "U. S. Postage." Directly below, arranged in four lines in solid gothic letters is the inscription, "In Memory and in Honor of the Mothers of America."
