MAKING LIFETIME GIFTS COULD REDUCE TAXES

If you want certain individuals to receive property from your estate, there may be advantages to making those gifts while you are still alive. Assuming you have adequate financial security for the remainder of your lifetime, consider these advantages of making lifetime gifts:

(1) The tax law permits a married individual to make gifts of any amount to a spouse without incurring any gift tax.

(2) Any post-gift appreciation in the asset is not subject to estate tax in the donor's estate. Any property that is appreciating rapidly is a good candidate for lifetime gifting.

(3) To individuals other than your spouse, you can transfer \$10,000 per year, per recipient, without incurring any gift tax. Such transfers not only reduce your estate, but if the property is income-producing, the future income is taxed to the gift recipient. If your spouse joins in the giving, you can transfer \$20,000 annually to each recipient.

Currently, estates of up to \$600,000 pay no federal estate taxes. If your total estate is less than \$600,000, there is one good reason for keeping the assets in your estate. Most property which passes through an estate gets what is known as a "step-up" in basis. If you have property which you acquired for \$10,000, but which now has a fair market value of \$100,000, the \$90,000 of buit-in gain would go untaxed if the asset passes through your estate. If you give the property during your lifetime, the recipient is considered to have a \$10,000 cost in the property and would pay income tax on the \$90,000 if he sells the property.

If the property passes through the estae, the tax law sets the cost basis at the fair market value in the estate, there would be no income tax due on the sale.

AUSTIN - Gov. George W. Bush and Secretary of State Tony Garza are touring the state, urging Texans to the polls Aug. 9 for the constitutional amendment election.

The proposed amendment, if passed, will reduce school property taxes by an average \$140 a year and increase the homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000.

The amendment also could free up funding for a 5 percent pay raise for about 60,000 of the state's 240,000 teachers.

Texas' largest teacher group, the Texas State Teachers Association, is mounting its own effort to urge teachers to the polls. The group,

which has 90,000 members, plans to operate phone banks in the state's five largest metropolitan areas.

"Texas teachers rank 37th in the nation in pay," said Annette Cootes of TSTA. "We want our teachers' pay increased at least to the national average so we can recruit and maintain quality teachers."

In May, the Texas Legislature rejected a plan endorsed by Gov. Bush that would have substantially cut school property taxes. Lawmakers instead opted for a scaleddown \$1 billion tax relief proposal that would give property owners an added \$10,000 tax exemption.

Sharp Stumps for Military Bases State Comptroller John Sharp called on Texas to develop a strategy for keeping its military bases to word off contemplated closures and cutbacks by the federal government.

"About 167,000 Texans work directly for the military," Sharp said last week. "By contrast, the top 10 corporations in Texas employ 123,000 people. But if any one of those businesses decided to pack up and move, we would shower them with abatement of fers or other reasons to stay. ..."

Sharp said Texas should work to be viewed by the Pentagon as the nation. And, he made proposals toward that goal, including:

Improve roads and railways running from bases to seaports and airports to reduce deployment time. Offer state incentives to

builders of affordable housing near military bases and to businesses that locate near bases and employ military spouses and other family members.

Designate military bases as wholesale electricity customers, freeing them to negotiate for lower rates for power.

Provide affordable higher education opportunities to military personnel and their families.

**Bullock: Bush Unbeatable** Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock predicted

last week that no Democrat - not even four term Land Commissioner Garry Mauro - would be able to unseat Republican Gov. George W. Push in the 1998 election.

A day after Bullock spoke to the Houston Chronicle, Mauro, who announced in mid-July he was contemplating a run for governor, said, "As I listen to people around the state, nobody talks about George Bush being unbeatable. "If I made the decision today, I would be inclined to run."

Bullock, Texas' highest-ranking Democrat, said, "(Mauro's) a fine can't do it."

Mauro said, however, he has "learned a lot from Bob Bullock, but the last time he told me a guy named Bush couldn't be beaten was when I asked him to help elect my friend Bill Clinton president." Mauro said he would announce

his decision whether to run or not in the fall.

Patterson Seeks Ag Post State Rep. L.P. "Pete" Patterson, a 20-year House veteran, last week became the first Democratic contender for the state agriculture post being vacated by Republican Rick Perry.

A four-term chairman of the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee, Patterson said he wants to continue finding ways to make sure young people and small farmers keep a place in agriculture. "From the time I chopped cotton

on my family's farm to today I have believed agriculture is the backbone of our society," said Patterson, who lives and farms in Brookston in Northeast Texas.

**Other Capital Highlights** 

State law says Lt. Gov. Bullock will have six years to parcel out his unspent campaign funds. The 68year-old Bullock, who has decided not to seek re-election, will leave office in January 1999. Ethics Commission files show about \$3

million in the senior statesman's campaign coffer.

 Comptroller Sharp has announced that the Texas Tomorrow Fund, the state's prepaid tuition plan that allows families to lock in the cost of their children's future college tuition, will be offered beginning in October by agents who market life and health insurance in Texas.

A federal lawsuit filed last week in Austin challenges a new law that bars state employees from giving advice and serving as expert

witnesses in suits against the state. A federal district judge granted a temporary restraining order to stop the law, which was to take effect Sept. 1.

Lt. Gov. Bullock suggested last week that state Board of Education candidates run on a nonpartisan ballot. The 15-member board has nine Republicans and six Democrats. Board Chairman Jack Christie of Houston, a Republican, said Bullock's proposal is "not a bad idea."

**Old Securities Certificates May Have Value** 

Could there be a fortune hidden in your attic?

Probably not. You might dream about discovering an old stock certificate worth thousands of dollars, but like winning the lottery, it doesn't happen to most of us.

It's hard to estimate how many old securities certificates -- for stocks, bonds or other corporate debt -- are hidden away, outstanding and unredeemed. Some 2,500 companies change names. merge or are bought out by other companies each year. Often, the original shares are never submitted for transfer. Old certificates may now represent ownership in another corporation. Even if the company is out of business, bankruptcies often leave assets.

Micheline Masse, founder and president of Stock Search International, says billions of dollars are available for unredeemed stocks and bonds. Her company specializes in researching old stock and bond certificates.

Before you ransack old desk drawers and file cabinets, be aware that the odds of finding a treasure are very low.

Masse says that out of about 3,000 certificates she examines each year, only 1,200 have any value. Half of those typically are worth only a few dollars to collectors. Another 300 have possible value. Only the remaining 300 - about 10 percent of the total -- have any significant value. But even with those odds, Masse has recovered more than \$5 million for her clients over the years.

The real value of old certificates may be in scripophily -- the hobby of collecting old stock and bond certificates. This growing hobby emerged in Europe in the late 1970s.

Scripophilists typically focus their collections within specific industries such as automobiles, railroads, banking, mining or entertainment. Newly discovered issues are continually turning up. Unlike coins, bank notes and stamps, the production of stock certificates is not monitored by governments. Collectors have found unknown, limited bond issues and certificates with important signatures. One investor found a bond issued by czarist Russia before it fell to communism. He couldn't collect any back interest, but it was a real collector's find.

If you come across old securities certificates, don't throw them away. Your financial professional can help you start the research process -- and if you're one of the lucky few, those certificates might have more than just sentimental val




