Fred Haile To Speak At Lubbock Today

Fred C. Haile, candidate for Congress, will address the voters in Lubbock at 7:30 o'clock this evening. Mr. Haile expects to get his position as to governmental policies explained to the voters of Lubbock County, and he has a way of telling things so everybody may understand.

Reports from reliable sources are coming in to the effect that Mr. Haile is making rapid gains in the counties of Haskell, Stonewall, Kent and Garza. A number of traveling men passing through the country report that Mr. Haile is the leading candidate beyond question.

He spoke last Saturday in Tahoka, Brownfield and Levelland. He will speak in Big Spring at 8:00 o'clock Friday evening. Saturday at two o'clock he will speak in Stanton and 5:00 o'clock he will address the vot- Relief Commission ers at Colorado.

WILL THERE BE RAIN IN JULY?

So far as the above question is concerned the only thing that can be said is, nobody knows. However, reference to the records of former years statistics shows that there has been rain in former years during the month of july.

Taking the record of July for last year it shows that on the sixth of the month there was .72 inches. On the 15th of the month there was .19 inches. There was .75 inches on the 18th of the month. This makes 1.66 inches for those three showers. We find by reference to records that the average rainfall during the month of July for the past 23 years is 2.01 inches.

During August of last year the rainfall amounted to 3.32 inches. The average for 23 years for August is 2.79 inches.

McCraw Warns Voters Aganst **Poilitcal Tricks**

Political tricks degrading to the high office at stake are being used against him by the special interests and their representatives, William Mc-Craw, candidate for attorney general, warned in a Central Texas campaign this week.

In vigorous speeches, McCraw denounced his opponent, Senator Walter Woodward of Coleman, as being loaded down with political debts and bitter with his hymns of hate, is trying to shift the public's gaze from his own record to false issues."

"I take pride in my constructive program in regard to the permanent school fund, taxation and control of the utilities," McCraw said. "I am gratified that Texas has responded. as I was always confident she would respond, with overwhelming approval.

"This is no time to put the people's interests, which should be more jealously guarded than ever before, in jeopardy by electing attorney general a man who has branded himself as a political tradester, who has been publicly quoted as wanting to be attorney general just so he could be governor.

"Dismay at the handwriting on the wall, in which he reads the story of his defeat, has gripped my senatoropponent from Coleman. He is vainly trying to divert the public from study-ing his record of utility domination, from the fact that he is the lawyer of the Coleman Gas and Oil Co. whose vice president and general manager is also vice president and director of the Lone Star Gas Co., and who is either vice president or director, or both, of 11 other big utilities.

IN LOVING REMEMBRANCE OF MRS. G. W. HARVEY

Mrs. G. W. Harvey, better known throughout the Afton community as 'Auntie Harvey" was borned February 14, 1846 in Tennessee. Later moved to Illinois, Indiana and Arkansas. Her maiden name was Sarah E. Arrington. She married G. W. Harvey in 1867, while in Iillinois. To this union two children was borned, Rupert ed in the 1934 Revenue Act placing an excise tax upon foreign animal and vegetable oils and fats. Helped all producers of cottonseed oils and fats.

Co-Author of the Jones-Connally Cattle Relief Act, placing cattle as a basic commodity under the provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act and allotting \$250,000,000 in benefits to the producers.

- Author, in the Senate, of the American Legion bill permitting coinage of memorial half dollars for Texas Centennial.
- Author of complete schedule of income tax rates in the Revenue Act of 1932. These rates sought to equal ize the tax burden, and increased the rate of tax upon the biggest incomes.
- Author of amendment to Tariff Act of 1930, increasing duty upon cattle to protect livestock raisers against

\$1,500,000 additional road aid.

- Proposed at Haskell, Texas, drought conference in 1929, crop production loans and continued activity in behalf of this kind of relief at the next session of Congress. Adopted by Congress in 1930.
- Author of amendment adopted by Senate, January 12, 1932, directing Land Bank directors to consider pleas for extensions on the merits of each application and not upon general conditions only.
- Author of amendment to Independent Offices Appropriation Bill in 1933 limiting reductions in compensation and pensions to World War veterans (service-connected cases) and to Spanish War veterans and widows to 20%. This amendment which was adopted when Vice-President Garner broke the tie voted for it, proved the basis for the compromise agreement which later reached between the House and Senate, liberalizing compensation to disabled veterans.







No more beautiful sight may be seen anywhere than a typica expanse of low-pruned coffee trees in bloom or bearing the ripe red coffee "cherries," over which, like protective sentinels, tall shade trees stand with beauty.
