



Candies for Christmas

MITH CHRISTMAS just a few short weeks off, it's high time we began to take inventory of our holiday needs. Ahead lie dizzy days of shopping and Christmas gayety, and unless we make careful plans before the eleventh hour rush, we will all be swamped in the merry confusion. So let's consider the problem while we are still calm and collected. First we need candy-plenty of candy! Enough to fill all the generous boxes and bon-bon dishes placed casually around to tempt everyone, with a few dainty tid-bits to tuck in expectant stockings besides. And Christmas just naturally means homemade candy to us. It's such fun to make and pack in pretty boxes, then tuck away in a safe hiding place until Christmas Eve. So, if you are wise you, too, will plan to make your candy before the last minute rush. And while you are looking around for some good ideas, try these splendid new recipes for Christmas candy. You will enjoy their delightful variety.

Mexican Patties-Place 1 cup of sugar into hot frying pan and stir constantly until sugar is melted. Add ¼ cup boiling water to melted sugar and boil until sugar is dissolved. Add 2 cups more of sugar and 1 cup more boiling water, then add 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon Pure Cider Vinegar. Cover and continue boiling until soft ball stage (236° F.) is reached. Let stand until boiling ceases, then add 2 cups pecans and stir until candy begins to cream slightly. Put out in patties on waxed paper to cool. Store in tin.

Vermont Fondant Base—Combine 3 cups sugar, ¼ teaspoon salt, ½ 1 small can condensed milk, or ¾ tablespoon Pure Cider Vinegar, 1 cup top cream, 3 tablespoons corn cup maple syrup and 1/2 cup water syrup and a pinch of salt. Stir and stir thoroughly. Cover and until well blended. With a clean cook slowly until sugar melts, then cloth, wipe down the sides of the cook rapidly until the syrup forms pan, and bring slowly to a boil. a soft ball (239° F.) when tried in Add 3 squares unsweetened chococold water. THE BANKHEAD ACT ELECTION

An election unprecedented in American politics and economy will be held throughout the cotton belt on Friday, December 14. At this time the cotton producers will decide by referendum vote whether the Bank head ginning restriction act shall be continued in force for the crop of 1935. Every farmer, whether tenant, sharecropper or operator of his own farm, who grows cotton will be entitled to a vote, as will each landowner upon whose soil cotton is produced. No poll tax or other qualification is imposed under the regulations prescribed for the referendum.

Although the cotton acreage reduction program of the department of agriculture is to be continued in any event, it appears that the Bankhead Act offers the only effective method of siubstantally reducing cotton production. It places a virtually prchibitive tax of 50 per cent in value on cotton ginned above quotas allotted. Because of the drouth in Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma this year it was not necessary to impose this tax, since the total yield of cotton was about a million bales below the aggregate allotments under the Bankhead bill. But next year may be and probably will be different. The secretary of agriculture has already decided that the acreage reduction from the five-year base prior to 1933 shall be 25 per cent instead of 40 per cent. This means that the cotton acreage for 1935 will be increased by one-fourth over that of 1934. And there are no restrictions preventing intensive culticess is due to the interest of J. B. It would appear that unless the father of Guy Speck, manager of the drouth or some other crop disaster occurs next year, mere acreage reduction will not accomplish the end sought.

Another advantage of the Bankhead Act is that it effects to an appreciable extent a sort of crop insurance. Under it the farmer whose yield is reduced below his allotment by adverse weather or other conditions may share a portion of the good fortune of the farmer who makes a bumper crop. This year, for instance, Faulkner county is producing some 8,000 bales below its allotment, whereas the delta counties of the state have made far more than their allotments of cotton. The surplus ginning certificates of such counties as Faulkner are being sold to those with excessive production at the rate of \$20 a bale and the proceeds of these sales will be distributed back to farmers in the short-crop areas.

The influence of cotton buyers and brokers and of ginners is very naturally being sought to bear against continuance of the Bankhead act. The profits for such interests as these depend largely upon the number of bales produced, since they realize about the same amount per bale, whether the crop is large or small or whether the price is 6 cents or 15 cents a pound.

There is little doubt that with an enormous carry-over still on hand a crop of 15 or 16 million bales in 1935 would drive the price back to the 5 or 6 cent level again. It is believed that the continuance of the Bankhead act is the safest insurance for a reasonable price for next year's cotton crop .. -Extract of Editorial in Log Cabin Democrat, Conway, Arkansas.

THE OTHER SIDE

Those who oppose keeping in effect the Bankhead Act say that it takes away all of the farmer's liberty and forces him to do what some one else tells him to do. The opponents to the Bankhead Act also say that they are making the cotton farmers of the United States cut down production while foreign countries are increasing production.

An article published in the Star-Telegram a few days ago stated that various concerns of Brazil and other South American countries were trying to secure contracts in the United States for used machinery such as used cotton gins, tractors, cultivators, etc. to be used on cotton plantations of those countries. These concerns are under the impression that the Southern States have given up the idea of growing cotton in the future and are wanting to dispose of all machinery.

Of course, such an idea is foreign to the South, but such is the opinion formed by cotton growers in South America.







It is understood that King A number of citizens in a meeting Wednesday morning discussed a campaign of eradicating the ranges of coyotes, bob cats and other animals which have proven destructive to the gainst wolves is launched. If this county with our neighbor county joins in with our neighbor county then the wolves will be forced

to go farther away. There have been a great number of

There have been a great number of calves killed by wolves especially in the spring of the year while they are young. Again, think of the number of chickens, turkeys and other farm fowls which are destroyed each year by wolves. A few calves off each ranch and a few fowls off each farm each year amounts to many times what it will cost to kill out these pests.

The federal government will go half the expense of the campaign and it is hoped by many that the Commissioners' Courts of the various counties will cooperate in this movement. E. T. Personett, Assistant District Agent of Game Management, was in the county Wednesday and stated that beginning just after the first of the year is the best time to rid the country of these pests. He stated that the season is approaching when the the season is approaching when the mother wolf would be carrying the litter or the pups would be cared for in dens, and in either event the capture of the old wolf would mean the destruction of many pups which could become pests next year if not destroy-

Upon being asked the question if killing the wolves will cause rabbits killing the wolves will cause rabbits to become more numerous, he said, that a study of this shows the opposite. That when rabbits become too numerous that disease breaks out among them and causes many to die, but the wolves always catch the diseased rabbits and keeps the disease from spreading to other rabbits. In this manner the wolves prevent the different disease from killing rabbits and usually there are more rabbits in countries where wolves are not killed


