James V. Allred **Inaugurated As Governor Of Texas**

With the booming of cannon and cheering by the 10,000 spectators. James V. Allred became Governor of Texas at noon Tuesday. Judge William Pierson, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas, administered the oath of office at twelve o'clock and the youthful former Attorney General became the chief executive of the state.

Five ex-Governors and a number of high officials attended the inauguration ceremonies. A throng of people estimated at 10,000 viewed the ceremonies. Approximately 450 persons in West Texas and New Mexico began the task of enumerating Farms and Ranch es in this territory Tuesday. Nearly 25,000 Federal Census employees will be engaged in this huge task of enumerating the six million Farms and Ranches of the United States, in what is probably the most important agricultural census in the nation's history, according to a statement released by Director William L. 





Dinners for Everyday Dining

NOW that the feasting and fun of the holiday season are over, we settle down to plain living again. Creamed Macaroni and Steak-Cut 1 lb. thinly sliced round steak into one inch squares and cook in 2 tablespoons butter until tender. Sprinkle with 1 tablespoon w lifted bread flour, 1 teaspoon sal and 1/8 teaspoon pepper, and brown. Stir in 1/2 cup milk and cook until a thick, smooth gravy is formed. Line bottom and sides of a medium size casserole with 1 medium can Cooked Macaroni in Cream Sauce with Cheese. Place meat in center, pour in gravy and cover with very thin slices of onion. Onions will brown easily if spread with cream or melted butter. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) for 40 minutes.

Apple Butter Drop Cookies-Cream 1/2 cup butter, add 11/4 cups sugar, and mix together thoroughly. Add 1 unbeaten egg and beat until smooth. Stir 1 teaspoon soda into 1/2 cup Pure Apple Butter, and blend with the butter mixture. Add 1/2 cup broken nut meats, 12 maraschino cherries, chopped, and 1/2 box shredded cocoanut. Sift 21/4 cups all-purpose flour-sifted once before measuring—with 1 teaspoon baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt, and add to butter mixture alternately with 1/4 cup milk, a small amount at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. In Texas there are more than 2,000,000 boys and girls who would come under the direct control of the federal government should a national labor law be enacted. This is a problem that belongs to the various states, and it is doubtful that if the people of Maine could well decide a condition relative to child labor in Texas, nor Texas for

There are about 400,000 married women in Texas who would come under the provision of a child labor law enacted by Congress since that law would try to control labor of people up to 18 years of age. Would a citizen of Texas desire the federal government to tell his wife just how much work about her home she may do each day? Our opinion is that should a federal agent go about telling some wives how to run their homes that it would not be long until they would feel the pressure and hear the ring of a frying pan over his head and a very concrete order would be handed to him to leave the premises and let the women, who know how, run their homes as

Many years ago child labor was at a disadvantage when factories were not properly lighted and ventilated, but most of that trouble has been cleared away long ago. Few parents of today force their children to work under reasonable conditions, and these conditions, and these cases can be adjusted by the courts under present child labor laws. In Texas an orphan child between the ages of 12 and 16 years may work for its support or to support a widowed mother in event the child has as much as fifth grade education. The chief reason for the child labor law is to protect the education of children. This is good, but there are conditions when it is necessary for the children to do some work in order to have food and clothing. The proposed amendment to the Federal Constitution does not make provision to feed and clothe children when they are taken off the


