C. Brown Trial **Postponed Until April Term Court**

The trial of Clarence Brown, indicte by the Dickens County Grand Jury in December, has been postponed until the April term of court. Brown's case was transferred from the 110th District to the 99th District at Lubbock along with Virgil Stalcup, who was given the electric chair by a 99th District Court jury at Lubbock last week for the murder of Sheriff W. B. Arthur, the same charge upon which Brown was indicted. The case was post poned because of some alleged irregularities in the selection of jurymen for this term of court. The State did not desire to take any chances on the case being remanded for re-trial in the event of a conviction.

District Attorney Alton B. Chapman returned the last of the week from Lubbock where he had been leading the prosecution of the indicted murderers. Brown, who has been held in Lubbock since his capture last November, is being kept under heavy guard at Lubbock, pending the trial.

Stalcup is being held at Lubbock pending an appeal from his conviction, but according to newspaper reports will be transferred to the state penitentiary soon to await the action of the higher courts.

Mrs. Clarence Brown, who was arrested at Snyder about three weeks ago for conspiracy in the murder of Sheriff Arthur, was held in Lubbock until Saturday, February 9, when she was transferred to Dickens jail by Sheriff J. L. These checks were all given to farmers signing up Volunteer Contracts for the reduction of cotton acreage in 8-inch water mains for the City of 1934. There are between fifty and sixty more second rental and parity payment checks to be received. The Agent stated that they expected these checks within a few days completing the 1934 program, except for payment of cotton exemption certificates sold in the pool.






