By Relief Commission Texas Relief Commission canning plants were being closed in various parts of the state last week as the supply of government-bought cattle became exhausted, it has been an-nounced by C. Z. Crain, head of the

commodities department and supervisor of the plants. Seven of the 22 plants will remain open to process 10,000 head of cattle

and Waco. Mr. Crain said figures supplied him


by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration on drouth cattle purchases show the administration paid approximately \$10 per head.

proximately \$10 per head. Relief Commission canning plants processed 374,000 head, turning out 47,000,000 cans of beef, 1 1-4 pounds to the can, and affording employment to between 20,000 and 30,000 persons, counting extra employes required by slaughter houses.

slaughter houses. In addition, the AAA bought approximately 700,000 head of sheep and some 400,000 goats. County ad-ministrators gave away 75,000 head of goats one at a time to relief clients. Fifty cars of sheep pelts have been shipped out of the state and a like number remain to be shipped, Crain eaid said.


said. Relief officials were hopeful the government would authorize another large cattle buying program in the state in order that the operation of the canning plants may be continued. They pointed out that the canning plants are the biggest work project for relief clients in the state, serving particularly to decrease the number of unemployed women.

Mr. Crain said he hoped to keep equipment intact in closed plants for the next 30 to 60 days until it is learn ed definitely whether a new cattle buying program wil lbe ordered for l'exas.
