





Undulant fever is one of the in-fectious diseases known to be trans-mitted from animals to human beings. In cows and hogs, the germ causes a disease of great economic importance known as contagious abortion. When this germ invades the human body, the resulting disease is undulant fever. Prevention is dependent upon (1) eradication of the disease in farm animals, (2) careful pasteurization of animals, (2) careful pasteurization of dairy products and (3) avoidance, inso far as possible, of direct contact with infected animals.
