#### Plan For Corn-Hog 2-Year Adjustment

Work has been started on the contract for the new two year adjust-ment program for corn and hogs, following conferences in Washington of producers, state agricultural specilists, and AAA officials on fundamental details. E. N. Holmgreen, administrative assistant of AAA at College

Station, has announced. Since a major adjustment problem is to prevent an excessive production of hogs in 1927, a contract of more than one year's duration is necessary,

it was pointed out by Mr. Holmgreen. The main objective of the new program will be to maintain a balance between the production and consumption of corn and hogs during the next two years. To accomplish this objective, it will be necessary to prevent an excessive production of corn in 1936 and 1937, allow an increase in next year's pig crop that would be at least as great as it is estimated would take place were no adjustment program in

rease in the 1937 pig crop.

The Adjustment Administration has recommended that corn production next year be limited to 95 million acres, or about 10 million fewer acres than would be likely without edirect. than would be likely without adjust-

Proposed hog adjustments are calculated to provide for a 30 per cent icrease in Federally inspected slaught r in 1936-1937 above the slaughter expected in the present marketing year which began October -, 1935. It is believed that a permitted hog production equal to 100 per cent of the base will allow for the desired intypes of playground amusement. crease in hog numbers next year.

#### Tech Judging Team Off To Kansas City

Plans have been made at Texas Technological College to send a cropjudging team to the annual Intercollegiate Crops contest at Kansas City November 22. The team, which consists of three members and one alternate, was selected a few days before the contest from students who have taken or are taking a course in grain-grading.

Colleges from all over the United States will compete in the events, which will include judging, identification, and grading of all grains having commercial importance, such as hay, corn, cereals, and feed grains. The national meet at Kansas City will be followed by an international contest to be held in connection with the In-ternational Livestock exposition at Chicago November 30.

#### **New State Prison** Head Dies After Short Illness

Dave Nelson, 47, the new prison convicts promised to bring drastic changes in the Texas system, died Saturday without having a chance to put his program into operation. He is survived by his wife, two sons, three daughters and his mother.

Double pneumonia, developing from a cold contracted at Houston Monday brought on death at 1 a. m. Saturday. Heart disease contributed to his lack of rallying power. The end came to him unexpectedly, in his sleep, an hour before he had awakened and said: "I feel fine now-I believe I feel much better.'

Then he dropped off to sleep and passed quietly away. Relatives took his body Saturday morning to Orange, his home for a dozen years, and arranged for funeral services at 2 p. m.

It was barely two weeks ago—on Nov. 1— that the veteran business-man, bubbling over with enthusiasm, took over the prison management job vacated by the resignation of Lee Simmons. He and Simmons had ser-ved together on the State Prison Board in 1930 and he knew the prob-

lem he was tackling.

Before his appointment as prison manager ,Nelson had established an enviable reputation as a successful administrator. He was head of extensive agricultural interests belonging to Lutcher Stark, Orange capitalist. In addition, he was a director of the First National Bank at Orange and was connected with the Sabine Packing Company and the Orange Products

Honors were bestowed upon him recently for his work in bringing a new industry—the manufacture of paper—

#### World War Veteran

Prison management was not his first service to the State, for he had been chairman of the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission. He resigned from the commission to take the nev

A World War veteran, Nelson conceived it necessary to have strict discipline in his prison work. No sooner had he taken over his duties than he announced he was bringing military precision to the walls. He said all guards hired in the future would be former soldiers—picked from membership of the American Legion.

"I want men who will do what I tell them," he explained. "If these I have can't, then I can get more."


