SIMPLE METHOD OF TAKING INVENTORY OF DEER COLLEGE STATION — Arthur Franklin Hailoran, graduate student in the A. & M. College Department of Fish and Game, has completed a shipp on the Aransan National Wildle life Refuge which indicates a simpler method of taking the annual inventory of deer on the Refuge and the proper management of both deer and cattle on the area.

Hailoran discovered that it is possible to secure a fairly accurate estimate of the number of deer on the Refuge by counting the deer from an automobile road for 20 minutes per day on 25 days in December or January when climatic conditions are favorable. Deer do not move about much during the colder weather, but are more active when the temperature is somewhat moderate or even high.
