



## **U. S. Marine Corps** To Enlist 75 Men

The Times this week received a dispatch from the United States Marine Corps Western Recruiting Division Headquarters at Los Angeles, Calif., stating that the waiting list had been exhausted and that they were free to enlist seventy-five men immediately. Accepted applicants will report to Marine Base at San Diego, California.

The requirements for enlistment provide that accepted applicants must be not less than 18 nor more than 25 years of age, 66 to 74 inches in height. They must be of good habits and character, American citizens, and have had better than a common school

Mr. Spearman was a graduate of Texas Christian University in 1933, where he was a star halfback and mentioned for all-American. He was also all-Southwest halfback for the Frogs. He spent his freshman year at John Tarleton college, where he

lettered in four sports. Spearman's Cubs, of Olney where he coached the past years, won the district championship in 1936 and were defeated in 1933 by only the Crowell Wildcats, champions for that year. In 1934 Crowell and the Seymour Panthers were the only schools able to defeat Spearman's charges. Spur Bulldog fans and other dis-


A city under such an uncomfortable housing problem can never hope to grow substantially. People must be as contented in a rent house or apartment as you are in your own-owned home. It is their home, just as yours is yours. If your home wasn't pleasing in looks and modern comfort, would you be content? No, you would be no more contented than the average Spur schools. renter is. We argee there are some nice rent houses in Spur. but most of them are already rented under long leases, leaving little or nothing for the new arrival.

Without cost to the tax-payers, the mutual mortgage plan, established in the natinal housing act, is bringing about a transformation in the residential mortgage business of commercial banks and other large financial institutions through its provisions for a sound, conservative method of installment mind the prospective landlord, however, that the federal housing administration does not lend money, but it does insure SUFFERERS buying in other parts of the country. The Times hastens to reloans made by private financial institutions operating under the provisions of the national housing act.

Under the act the builder must own his lot first. After that actual construction financing is simple to arrange and pay for like rent. Example; On a \$1,000 lot you erect a \$4,000 house, in securing a mortgage loan to cover the structure you Compound For Acid can pay over a period of twenty years at the monthly rate of approximately \$40. Porperty with an appraised value of \$10,000, including the lot and structure, Colitis. could be paid at the rate of \$58.17 per month.

We need little convincing to say that the housing problem here is serious, and lest some capable, fair-minded, individual men come to the rescue soon, then our social and economic structure is in grave danger of tumbling.




