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

Three flocks that average 195 birds produced 3,983 dozen eggs at 13 cents per dozen above the feed cost, or \$580.23 was left for labor and equipment after expenses were deducted for feed



Dickens County farmers have shown unusual interest in water and soil conservation this year. County Agent G. J. Lane conducted fortythree terracing demonstrations during January, February, March and April, and three hundred thirty-nine farmers attended. At these demonstrations farmers were instructed in running terrace lines and in the proper methods of terrace construction. From the training received at these schools, and previous school, conductd, terrace lines were run on eight thousand nine-nine acres on eightysix different farms. On these eightysix farms terraces were constructed Eighty-two other farms ran terrace lines for contouring eight thousand eight hundred and eighty-two acres. Six farms ran lines for ditching four hundred and ninety-one acres.

The cost of constructing terraces on farms in Dickens County ranges from twenty-five cents on the plains land to \$1.50 on the more rolling lands under the Caprock.

The terracing program in Dickens County, which has resulted in ten times the number of farms being terraced this year as compared with any previous year, is due to the combined efforts and close cooperation of farmers, vocational agricultural teachers and the county agent.
