Open season on Yellowhammers began Friday night, September 12, at 8:00 pm. The Bears, searching for a bit of good bird hunting, traveled to Rotan, home of the Yellowhammers. The Bears handily caught their limit and won the football game, 34-20.

A soft rain was falling, as the second game of the high school season unfolded with the Bear's kickoff-

to Yellowhammers Rotan's receiver was quickly downed by Baird Bear Dusty Barron. The Bears' defense worked hard as a unit to hold the Yellowhammers and keep them from scoring, even when they seriously threatened. For five plays it was goal to go for the birds, but the Bears held with a tight defense and eventually took over on their own 11 yard line. Leading Baird's defense were Shane seniors Devenport, Britt Johnson, Jim Scott, Robert Gunn, Kolt DaPron, Lee Reyna,

and Shannon Campbell. Other key figures in the first quarters' defense were Jeremy Riney, Jason Gomez, Justin Rivera,

and Logan Russell. Baird controlled the ball and game for the remainder of the first quarter. Running backs, Shannon Campbell, Jeremy Riney, and Justin Rivera advanced the ball down field for the Bears. Campbell's 30

yard run put theBears in good scoring position. With one minute left in the period, Jeremy Riney streaked 20 yards to make the Bears' first score of the game. CenterBritt Johnson kicked the extra point and the scoreboard showed 7-0 in theBears' favor. With 46 seconds remaining, quick action on the part of theBears added two addional points to their score as Britt Johnson kicked theball deep into Rotan territory, in their own end zone. The Bears, catching the Yellowhammers behind the line of scrimmage scored a safety. The first quarter closed with Baird leading Rotan, 9-0.

Early in the second quarter, Rotan took over deep into Bear territoryafter blocking and recovering Baird's punt. The Yellowhammers did not stop until they scored a touchdown. The successful two point conversion brought the score to 9-8 in the Bears' favor.

Baird's Shane Devenport was receiver of the Yellowhammers' kick-off.

Even though Baird collected two more first downs before the half, they could not or agai ir o defense held the Yellowhammer and at the end of the first half

The Baird Bear Marching Band, led by Drum Major Alisha

Stephenson, presented an enjoyable halftime show. As usual, our band is wonderful.

Director for the Baird Band is Mike Devenport.

The second half opened with Baird's Dusty Barron receiving Rotan's kick-off. Baird managed to collect seven first downs during this quarter.

Three nice pass connections between quarterback, Jim Scott and tight end, Shane Devenport, racked up seventy-seven yards for the Bears.

Runningbacks,

Shannon Campbell, 14. Jeremy Riney, and Justin Rivera collected 56 yards in rushing for the period. Baird's only touchdown of the quarter evolved, with 7:31 seconds left, as Shane Devenport scored on a 25 yard pass play from Jim Scott. Baird's kick for the extra point was unsuccessful, making the score, Baird, 15 and Rotan, 8. Rotan, taking advantage of Baird's fumble on the Bears' 32 yard line, had good field position for the touchdown that followed. The scoreboard changed to 15-14, but still in the Bears' favor. The extra point kick was void.

Baird's receiver, Justin Rivera, marked Baird's 32 yard line as the point of play for the Bears. Baird's offense seriously trudged on into Rotan territory. One large gain was for the Bears was a 40 yard pass play between quarterback, Jim Scott and tight-end, Shane Devenport. The Bears were on the two yard line as the buzzer

sounded the end of the third quarter. The score remained, Baird, 15 and Rotan, 14.

The opening play of the fourth quarter proved fruitful for the Bears.

Baird's line opened up a hole for Shannon Campbell to push through and cross the magic line. Baird's score vaulted to 22. The attempt to kick the extra point was not successful.

Baird led Rotan 29-

It was pay back time for the Bears as Rotan's Guy Duke ran 87 yards to score for the Yellowhammers on a kick-off return. The exta point conversion did not count and the tally stood 28 - 20 in Baird's favor.

Now, for Baird's turn, with only one minute left, Baird's Jeremy Riney scampered 70 yards for an additional touchdown which hoisted the Bears to a 34-20 lead over Rotan. The two point conversion failed. There were no more penetrations by either team. The game ended with Baird getting their



Getting Your Money's Worth Anyone who has ever lived in a rural commu-

nity knows that physicians are a precious commodity. While some surburban areas might have a glut of primary care physicians, most rural areas face just the opposite problem; we don't have enough.

Unfortunately, one little-noticed item in the new Balanced Budget Law threatens to take us in the wrong direction on solving this problem. There were dozens of good provisions included in that package, but one that I did not agree with was changing Medicare policy to pay eligible teaching hospitals not to produce doctors.

Sponsors of that change argue that we are experiencing a glut of physicians nationally. While that may or may not be true for the country as a whole, any tour of the rural counties in the 17th District reveals chronic conditions of being under-served by health care professionals, not over-served. Successful strategies for physician recruitment and retention have challenged rural communities for years. The government does not need to make their task more difficult.

This week I joined some of my colleagues in the Rural Health Care Coali-

tion in an attempt to correct this illogical policy. The amendment we sought on a Health and Human Services (HHS) Department funding bill would require HHS to certify that reducing the number of residents in medical programs will not lead to a reduction in the number of primary care physicians available to practice in undeserved rural areas.

Unfortunately we were not able to get a vote on our amendment, but I will continue to work to correct this provision which offers little logical sense and even less promise to needy rural areas.



'Texas will be the forum to guarantee the industry is held accountable," Morales said.

The state seeks as much as \$14 billion in health-care costs in its suit, naming as defendants American Tobacco, R.J. Reynolds, Brown and Williamson, B.A.T. Industries, Philip Morris, Liggett Group, Lorillard, United States Tobacco, the Hill and Knollton cover such damage.

Bomer ordered the company to honor claims after the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals held that State Farm did not have to pay.

Bank Profits Show Increase

The Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas reported last week that as of June 30 Texas bank profits were up 11 percent over the first half of

Officials attributed the difference to an increase in loan volume. For Texas' 872 banks, loans were up 6.3 percent — for a total of \$118 billion - for the first half of 1997.

Banks in Texas are in "a period of historic loan demand again, something we haven't seen since probably the early '80s," Chris Williston, president of the Independent Bankers Association of Texas, told the American-Statesman.

More State Troopers Promised More state troopers will patrol Texas highways during the next 18 months, the head of the Public Safety Commission said last week.

Chairman James B. Francis said he outlined the plan to Gov. Bush after state auditors blamed the shortage of troopers on the DPS spending money earmarked for new officers on other things.

Francis said plans are under way to put more than 100 additional troopers on state highways during the next 18 months.

There is no word at this time as to a future renewal of such a wonderful offer. Six (6) percent loans are available to Veterans discharged before 1977 who have been out for less than thirty years. Regular home loan rates are 7,425% for a fifteen year loan and 7,925% for 20, 25, or 30 year loans. All TVLB originated loans are subject to an 85% of the loan to value ratio. This means the TVLB will lend only 85% of the home's appraised value, up to a maximum loan of \$45,000.







I did not join the Sea Bees out of desire to help win the war. I joined because I had been sent Army draft papers and would do almost anything rather than let others tell me what I must do.

I was born in the hills of West Virginia and always held in my heart the state motto. "Mountaineers are free men." While I have a trace of Hatfield in my genealogy I carry far more of Hatfield in my personality, to the degree that my own dear Mother, rest her soul, told me the personality trait she despised most in me was that if ever affronted by anyone I would NEVER forget it and would suddenly, even a year or so later, cut them down regardless of how shocked it might leave polite company.

Recalling as I consider the question of economic revitalization of Eastland County, there was a time on a train taking recruits to boot camp that offers sat with each man to ask what kinds of work experience each of us had, what machines we had operated, etc. At that time I stated that I had been my father's helper in refrigeration repair. (Note that one of the reasons for going Navy was the Depression Era recruiting posters, "JOIN THE NAVY AND LEARN A TRADE.")

I believe it would be wonderful if such a skill inventory of citizens of Eastland County could be made to such extent as citizens would wish their experience and abilities known, but avoiding the "Big Brother" attitude.

Sad to report, when I reached boot camp every school I asked about was either full, or only offered in advanced training. The catch there was that I was never given advanced training and after three weeks marching around muddy, often frozen corn fields, 500 men were thrown in with those who had been trained and shipped to the West Coast to embark for Guadalcanal.

One of the schools I wanted was refrigeration. Applicants were assembled and asked what if any experience we had. Those with no experience were summarily dismissed as a show of hands indicated there were thirteen with a bit of refrigeration and twelve were needed to fill the class.

The selection process ended with myself at age 20 and a man of 40. Though my experience was with electrical and his was gas refrigeration, the fact that the services only used electrical was discounted because the boatswain (bo'sn') stated that it wouldn't look good for an older man to have only seaman's stripes and a

He ordered me to report to another lieutenant at the dock.



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
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Winners Of Writers Club Contest Presentation Awards







CAM GULLEY CAPITAL GAINS SUBJECT TO

NEW RATES AND RULES The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 cuts the top rate on long-term capital gains from 28% to 20%, and it allows a larger exclusion for home-sale gains. But, as you might expect, the new law isn't as simple as that. Here are some details.

The new capital gains rate of 20% applies to taxpayers in all but the lowest tax bracket. Taxpayers who pay 15% on their regular income will pay 10% on their long-term capital gains. The new rates do not apply to gains from art,

antiques, and other "collectibles." Otherwise, the new rates apply retroactively to sales made after May 6, Under the old law, an asset was considered "long-

term" if it was held for at least 12 months. Under the new law, assets sold after July 28, 1997, will be considered long-term if they have been held for at least 18 months. Assets sold after July 28 and held for between 12 and 18 months will be taxed at capital gain rates from the prior law (either 28% or 15%). To further complicate matters, assets sold from

May 7 through July 28 will still be considered longterm if they were held for just 12 months. Married taxpayers of any age who meet certain

eligibility requirements may now exclude up to \$500,000 of home-sale profits (or \$250,000 for single taxpayers). This provision is generally effective for home sales after May 6, 1997, although transitional rules apply to some sales. To qualify, you must have owned the residence and occupied it as your principal residence for at least two of the five years preceding the sale. In general, you may take advantage of this tax break as many times as yo like, but you must wait at least two years between sales. This new provision replaces the rollover provision that allowed deferral of home-sale gains and the once-in-alifetime \$125,000 exclusion of gain on a home sale for taxpayers 55 and older.

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




