New Opinion Express Voting Age Laws

A few months ago papers throughout the state reported various rulings governing the exempted voting ages, a few days ago however, the Attorney General's office changed its opinilon with reference to the new law requiring young men and young women becoming 21 years of age before the primary elections in any year to secure an exemption certificate before they would be allowed to vote.

Mr. McCraw's office had formally ruled that it would be absolutely necessary for such young people to have an exemption certificate before they could lawfully vote. However, upon more mature consideration and after a conference between the Attorney General and all members of his department, this ruling has been changed.

It has now been rled that any person becoming 21 years of age after January 1st, 1935, and before January 31st, 1936, must have secured an exemption certificate before he is entitled to vote in the coming primaries. It is frther held that any person becoming 21 years of age after January 31st, 1936, and before the dates of the coming primary elections may vote in such elections regardless of whether or not they have taken certificate.
