County Men Named On Committee For Farm Debt Service

These men, who are the county committee appointed for this area, are supplied with Form 100 which when filled out will place those concerned in better position to receive help from the Farm Dept Adjustment Section of the Resettlement Administration.

Debt Adjustment for this section of Texas is Room 204 Federal Building, Wichita Falls. Mr. Homer E. Carrico is district Farm Dept Adjustment Supervisor.

Patton Springs High Granted Three More Affiliated Units, 21 1/2

Recent communication from the State Department of Education conveys the information that the Patton Springs school has been granted three additional units of affiliation to bring the total to 21 1/2. Units granted were Vocational Agriculture II for one and half credits, Home Economics I for one unit, and Texas History for half unit.

Starting with two credits in 1934 the school, under the direction of Superintendent O. C. Southall, the school acquired 16 1/2 credit affiliations before the 1934-35 term was closed, to bring the total to 18 1/2. The term of 1935-36 was devoted to work of qualifying for the three units granted this summer.

The Patton Springs school board in a meeting last week decided to open the 1936-37 term on Monday, August 31, according to announcements coming from the officials this week.

C. L. Harris of McAdoo Takes Lead In Race For State Representative 118th District; Westfall Is 630 Votes Behind

Leading the field by more than 600 votes C. L. Harris, candidate for State Representative of the 118th district and citizen of the McAdoo community, Dickens County, gained the top position in the scramble for placement on the August ticket throughout the six counties which compose this district. Aspermont man received a count of 977, with Merritt taking 217 and Craddock 82. The only other county in which Westfall received more votes was Borden and there the difference was found in one ballot when the returns showed 70 to 71 favoring Westfall.

Mr. Harris, a young man, 28 years old, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Harris, well known and admired citizens of the McAdoo community. The young politician is best known here as Cloris. He is married and the father of a few months old son. He and family reside in McAdoo.

The Dickens County man is in Snyder today after visiting in Post and Garza county Wednesday where he has already resumed his campaign work toward the August Primary. Before leaving Harris called at the Times office and expressed his appreciation for the nice support given him at the Polls Saturday.

"I am proud of the support citizens of my home county have given me," Harris said, "and trust I may merit their continued confidence and influence at the polls next month." In conducting his campaign for the run-off, in case Westfall should continue with the race, Harris plans to make a thorough canvass of the county and district and hopes to contact every voter before August 22nd, he informed the Times Wednesday morning. Those who supported the less fortunate candidates last Saturday are being solicited to turn their votes to the Dickens County man.

Life Guards Engaged For Remaining Half Swimming Season At New Pool; No Dedication Ceremonies Arranged

Without further delays required to arrange dedication and celebrating ceremonies, the Spur municipal swimming pool at Swenson Park will be opened to the public for the first time next Saturday, August 1st, city manager L. R. Burrows announced early this week.

The pool and park, which is a Works Progress Administration project was originally contracted to be completed May 15th, but delays caused from faulty orderings of pipes and labor conditions resulted in the late opening of the pool, it is understood.

City Manager Burrows and Mayor Cowan were in Lubbock Monday of this week closing purchasing deals for the suits, towels and other equipment needed for the opening Saturday.

Two life guards have already been employed to be stationed at the pool and at least one will be on duty at all times, according to plans. Richard H. Dodeke, of Lubbock, and Morris Lane of this city are the two swimming experts.

The pool, located in the heart of the beautiful Swenson Park and overlooked by the giant Charles A. Jones Memorial Stadium, is of concrete construction. It is 15x120 feet and ranges in depth from 2 feet to 11 when program plans are fully completed fresh water will be supplied at all times by way of a circulating water system, which has not yet been installed.

The bath house is a beautiful structure 20 feet wide by 80 feet long and

It's Good Old Days; Horse Thief Again Operates In County

The good old-times of the good old west were lived again in Dickens county last week end when a horse theft appeared on the charge books at the Sheriff's office after Claude Flippin's mount was taken during the Old-Timers' picnic at the county capital Friday.

Mr. Flippin of the Croton community rode into Dickens for last day of the affair and tying his horse took to the mid-way. That night about 11:30 he decided to start home, but found both his horse and saddle gone. Sheriff Koonsman and deputies tracked the stolen animal through various parts of the Dickens country, through the Hanby pasture to a point south of Midway Saturday afternoon back to sections of Afton and East Afton before the rider was located through the aid of various citizens Monday afternoon about 2:30 o'clock at the Guy Goens place.

A 19-year-old youth giving his name as Johnnie Roan and his home as "any place he could hang his hat" and a person without relatives is in jail at Dickens charged with horse and saddle theft and cutting wire fencing in some dozen places—and the chance of obtaining a free trip to Huntsville soon.

Roan stopped at the Fuljinjim place five miles south of Afton Sunday afternoon and ate supper, about an hour later at East Afton he ate again at the Kidd place. There he took a bath and rode on to the Chamber's place and on due west out of Afton. Monday afternoon he was back at the Guy Goens place where he asked for his lunch. He was arrested in a lane near that farm by Wayland Lee and Hub Swan of the sheriff's office.

The youth is reported as having slept in the pasture shrubbery during the day and traveled at night. Upon approaching a farm house he would dismount and go on as if he was walking and ask food. He isn't asking food now—the county is feeding him—but in the good old days it would have been different.

Dickens Annual 2-Day Picnic Attracts Crowd of Near 13,000

Old-Timers, Others Trek To County Capital For Entertaining Program; Winners Announced Various Events

With a combined total of near 13,000 attending the Dickens Annual Two-Day Picnic in the county capital city last week new crowd records were believed established. Supervisor Fred Arrington estimated 6,000 attending the first day's show while near 7,000 crowded the grounds Friday afternoon and night.

Registration sheets show the names of 45 old-timers who attended and reported themselves as having been citizens of Dickens county for more than 30 years. It was estimated that near three times that number was on hand yet did not register. Names of those who did report to the picnic officials are to be found on this page.

A centennial theme was well established in the arrangements of the activities of the programs as large numbers of former citizens of this area toured across country to attend the celebrations. Prizes were awarded the oldest man and woman pioneer in Dickens county, and the oldest man registered as attending the round-up.

Awards Announced

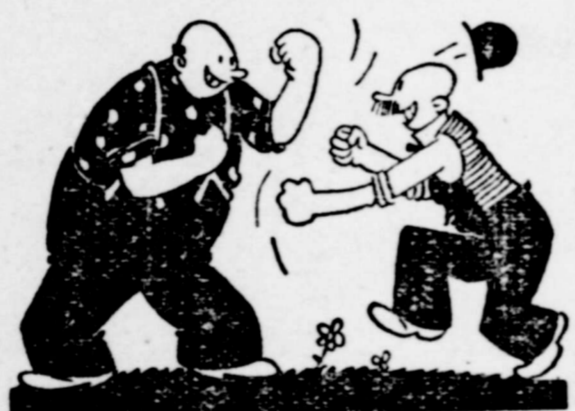

But the great failing point is going to be to elect enough members in the House of Representatives and in the Senate to carry through what Mr. Lemke would ask of the Congress then in power. Many other people who have come out on the Townsend plan—declared they were for it from the platform and through the press—and yet very few of them received the nomination for the House and Senate. In some Districts where approximately 90 per cent of the citizens petitioned for the Townsend Recovery plan to be put in effect, then reversed themselves and voted for candidates who stood in direct opposition to Townsend and told the people so—yet were nominated.

proposing an Amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by striking out Section 20 thereof; providing for local option on the question of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes; providing that spirituous liquors, or liquors composed in whole or in part of the products of distillation shall not be sold for private profit, except to the State; providing that the Legislature shall pass laws relative to the sale, possession, transportation and manufacture of such spirituous liquors; providing for the establishment of State dispensaries; providing for the manufacture, sale, transportation and possession of all liquors which are exclusively products of the fermentation process; providing that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold, bartered, or exchanged for beverage purposes in any county or political subdivision where the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters of such county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out Section 20 thereof and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Article XVII. Section 20:

"(a) It is hereby declared to be the policy of this State that the open saloon shall not be reestablished. The sale of spirituous liquors, manufactured in whole or in part by means of the process of distillation and/or liquors compounded and/or composed in part of such spirituous distilled liquors, for private profit, is prohibited within this State except when such sale is made to the State. The State of Texas shall have the exclusive right to purchase at wholesale and to sell at retail such distilled spirituous liquors. Such sale shall be made only in unbroken packages and no such liquors shall be consumed on the premises where sold. The Legislature shall pass laws to prescribe regulations relative to the manufacture, sale, transportation, and possession of such spirituous liquors and relative to the establishment of State dispensaries; provided, however, the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the sale for private profit and possession of distilled liquors for medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes.

"The manufacture, sale, transportation, and possession of all liquors, the alcoholic content of which is entirely and exclusively the result of the fermentation process is hereby authorized under such restrictions as may be authorized by law.

"(b) The Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited or legalized within the prescribed limits; and such laws shall contain provisions for voting on the sale of intoxicating liquors of various types and various alcoholic content.

"(c) In all counties, justice's precincts or incorporated towns or cities wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell, barter or exchange in any such county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication or any other intoxicants whatsoever, for beverage purposes, unless and until a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine such to be lawful; provided that this subsection shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties or political subdivisions thereof in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas, on the third day of November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment, shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A STATE DISPENSARY SYSTEM HAVING THE EXCLUSIVE SALE OF DISTILLED LIQUORS, AND PROVIDING FOR LOCAL OPTION."

And those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A STATE DISPENSARY SYSTEM HAVING THE EXCLUSIVE SALE OF DISTILLED LIQUORS, AND PROVIDING FOR LOCAL OPTION."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amend-

ment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

**S. J. R. No. 18
A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an Amendment to Section 48, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the establishment of Teachers' Retirement Systems, and making an appropriation for the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Section 48, a section to be known as Section 48a, and to read as follows:

"Section 48a: In addition to the powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, college and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and/or school districts, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty (\$180.00) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has not taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund of the moneys paid into the fund.

All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payments of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension, retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the

State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, which is November 3rd, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION AUTHORIZING RETIREMENT AND THE CREATION OF A RETIREMENT FUND FOR PERSONS EMPLOYED IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES SUPPORTED WHOLLY OR PARTLY BY THE STATE."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION AUTHORIZING RETIREMENT AND THE CREATION OF A RETIREMENT FUND FOR PERSONS EMPLOYED IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES SUPPORTED WHOLLY OR PARTLY BY THE STATE."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

H. J. R. No. 23

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of premiums on such policies of insurance; providing the State shall never be required to purchase insurance for any employees; providing for the necessary publication and election; making an appropriation to pay for same.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 59, to read as follows:

"Section 59. The Legislature shall have power to pass such laws as may be necessary to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for such State employees, as in its judgment is necessary or required; and to provide for the payment of all costs, charges, and premiums on such policies of insurance; providing the State shall never be required to purchase insurance for any employees."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State."

And all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

in charge of the program, while D. L. Granberry is in charge of the pool and park management for the affair. Jephtha Craig of the Texas Spur and Earnest Hayley of the Times are directors of publicity.

The water events will include dashes in both junior and intermediate divisions, such as 20-yard back stroke, 20-yard breast stroke, 40-yard free style and 10 pound weight distance plunge for the juniors and 30-yard back stroke, 60-yard free styles and 10-pound weight plunge for intermediates.

The relay events will require a 20-yard swim for the juniors and 30-yards for the intermediates with orders for each for free style, back stroke, breast stroke and crawl.

Diving in each division is to include the same requirements, such as front dive, back dive and optional dive, regulations announced regarding each event state.

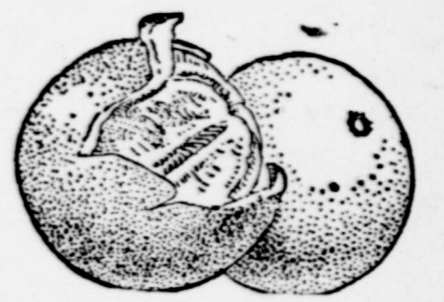
