

Saturday's Election Provides Upsets And Landslides In County

Sheriff Koonsman Polls Landslide **Vote To Win In First Primary; Formby** Leads Ticket In County Judge's Race

Dickens county voters marched to the polls Saturday to cast what proved to be almost record breaking voting in most of the seventeen boxes and resulted in an unusual landslide for the re-election of Sheriff Johnnie Koonsman, with more votes than his three opponents combined to eliminate a run-off.
