Bulldogs Put Up Fight, Lose 6-0

The Armistice Day game between the Paducah Dragons and the Spur Bulldogs was one of the hardest fought battles on the grid field of the 1936 Class B season. Both teams were game until the last shot which closed the game. Throughout the first half both teams fought valiantly without either side gaining much advantage. Both teams fought hard but clean as was shown by the penalties, Spur receiving one 5-yard and one 15-yard penalty, and Paducah receiv-

ed only one 5-yard penalty. In the third quarter Irons of the Dragons, intercepted an aerial pass from which point Moore made a left end run for the marker. The Dragons failed to convert and the game stood 6 to 0 in favor of Paducah.

In the elementary plays Spur made six first downs and Paducah made five. Spur punted six times for an average of 35 yards, Paducah nine times for an average of thirty yards. Spur attempted 14 passes, completing two with six being intercepted; Paducah attempted 16 passes, completing five and had two intercepted.

Stop for School Bus County Supt. Warns

"All vehicles used for the transportation of pupils to and or from any school or college, shall have a ign on the front and rear and on each side of said vehicle, showing the shall be plainly visible, showing the words "School Bus" and said words shall be plainly readable in letters not less than six (6) inches in height. It shall be the duty of the operator of such school bus vehicle to see that such signs are displayed as above provided unless such signs are so displayed thereon. When any such "School Bus" vehicle is receiving and or discharging, a motor vehicle or motorcycle is to come to a full stop before proceeding in any direction; and in event such "School Bus" vehicle is receiving or discharging passengers, the said operator of such motor vehicle or motor cycle shall not start up or attempt to pass in any direction until the said "School Bus" vehicle has finished receiving and or discharging its passengers.

Any party who violates any of the provisions of Section 1 of this act be fined not less than ten (\$10.00) coun' jail not to exceed ninety (90) and raced to the Spur 5-yard line, days, or both such fine and imprisonprovisions of this act, then and in the finney tribe occassionally. that event ,the party or parties so offending shall be punished as is now provided by law." 

With a flock of 23 White Leghorns he obtained an income of \$656.58, or a profit per hen above feed cost of \$1.79. His feed cost per dozen eggs was 6.5 cents. Feed cost per hen amounted to 97 cents. He sold his eggs on the general market, the average for the year was 18.4

cents per dozen. At the beginning of the year, he started his demonstration with a flock of average English strain of White Leghorns, and employed the best method of poultry management as outlined by G. J. Lane, County Agricultural Agent. Mr. Ross attributes his success to observation of minor details and careful methods of feeding and proper housing. 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
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


