### Will The People Ask For a Change

Recently the Supreme Court of Texas upheld a case wherein it is stated any merchant, manufacturer, etc. would be violating the laws of our state if they sold an article of merchandise and then delivered that article to the purchaser in the truck of the merchant or manufacturer. The court ruled that such a firm becomes a common carrier on the highways of Texas and must be registered as such before the Railroad commission of Texas.

This law would just as easily apply to a farmer who cer is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. would buy his neighbor's maize and then sell and deliver it to Jim Robertson. another party over the highways of the state. If a stockman bought a farmer's cattle and shipped them to another party had all of his meat stolen. The loss for profit, the court's ruling would apply in that case just as well. In many business where an article of merchandise, whether manufactured, grown on the farm or ranch, is sold for profit and the use of a truck is needed in that transacting, the person delivering said merchandise must have a registered cotton pickers who came here from truck to do it, or be subject to a penalty.

The women have been interested in vegetable cookery though not as many eached the co-operator goals as should have. The canning program has lagged this year due to lack of vegetables and fruits to can.

Twenty-seven per cent of the club girls in the county reached all goals this year. This is a marked increase over previous years. Results in the farm fruit plot demonstration have been disappointing this year for so many of the grape and berry vines set did not survive the dry summer. There are a few good orchards started among the demonstrators and more will be started.


