

After This Session C. B. Midleton, who has been in charge of the Vocational Agriculture department of Spur schools since the work was instituted, is not going to remain with Spur schools another year. Mr. Middleton stated that he did not know that he would teach any

longer since he has devoted 14 years to the work and feels like it is time to get into something else whereby he can have more than just a living. Before going into the teaching pro-fession Mr. Middleton farmed four years, superintending the work on the second largeest cotton farm in the world. The farm contains 35,000 acres and is located near Labdell, Mo. Mr. Middleton has been with Spur schools seven years and since coming here has developed much interest among the students in his classes in the farming industry. He has taught the youths of our community how to feed and care for baby beeves and how to secure the best profits for the money invested. He has never gone very strong in being a show winner, but has endeavored to give his students the practical things that can be used in life after they leave school.

Mr. Middleton served two years as a teacher in the Philippine Islands affected by the registration law, car under the directions of the federal government. Mrs. Middleton accompanied him on his tour to the Philippines and from there they visited, Hawaii, China, India, Summafees at the office of J. L. He was personally acquainted with the great Philippine leader, Aguinaldo, who probably caused the American government more trouble than any other one character in the Islands. It was Aguinaldo's men who killed General Henry W. Lawton in 1900. Also, Mr. President Quezon who is now in charge of governmental affairs in the Philippines.
