Terracing, contouring, strip cropping, or reverting sloping lands to pastures has long been advocated by specialists of the Texas Extension Service as a means of controlling erosion. 

Making Good Reports from colleges and universities of Texas which participated in the National Youth Administration College Aid program last session tend to support the oft-expressed theory that studens who earn part of their

expenses make better grades than students who have all expenses paid Sixty-eight of the 87 colleges participating in the program have already filed annual reports with J. C. Kellem, state NYA director. In 38 of the reporting colleges, students provided with NYA employment made better average grades than the entire student body. In 20 colleges the average grades of the two groups were reported to be approximately equal, while in nine colleges NYA workers were making slightly lower average grades than the student body. One school did not answer the question.

The reports that have been tabulated indicate that 66 per cent of the students employed were assigned to work which directly facilitated the teaching program. These students worked as clerks, teachers' helpers, library assistants, stenographers, and laboratory and shop assistants. About eight per cent of the students were employed on campus improvements, and seven per cent in the athletic department. The remaining students were assigned to various other jobs. About one-half the colleges reported that NYA employment was responsi-

ble for increases in enrollment. The students employed on the College Aid program were selected by the college officials for employment because they needed assistance in order to enter or remain in school properly. They were assigned to socially disirable work under the supervision

of the teachers and were paid a prevailing hourly wage rate. Their earnings were limited to an average wage of \$15 per month During the month of May 8,336 students were employed in the 87 Texas colleges and universities participating in the program.



Aliens Prove Handicap To U.S. **Employment** Acts

By Dr Gerald B. Winrod Wichita, Kansas

Statisticians declare that there are approximately 11,000,000 unemployed in the United States at the present time.

Congressman Martin Dies of Texas is authority for the statement that we now have within our borders 16,-500,000 foreign born "and 7,500,000.

Had the 16,500,000 not been admitted, there would be a large surplus of jobs today. Had the the 7,500,000 not been admitted, our unemployment situation would have bene normal.

It is conservative "to say that at least 1,500,000 of the 7,500,000 are on public relief at this moment. Uncle Sam is a very generous old gentleman! He feeds foreigners at the expense of his own children:

There are over 3,000,000 aliens here unlawfully. This number have been smuggled in by ships and airplanes, and across the Mexican and Canadian borders. Over 500,000 have come as seamen on shore leave to remain ninety days, but becoming "lost" in large eastern cities; they forgot to return to their ships.

No other country has ever wit nessed such an influx of foreign population except ancient Rome. And historians agree that this was one of the major causes of the decline and collapse of Roman civilization.

American consuls in forty-seven different countries report that they are holding requests from 992,000 other aliens who are knocking at our doors requesting entrance. Over 163, 000 were admitted "legally" last year and there is no way of knowing how many tens of thousands were smuggled in from Germany and other coun-

There is no nation in the world as lax on matters pertaining to immigration as the United States. That's why we have so much scum on the great American melting pot That's why our unemployment problem forbids solution in spite of the revolutionary social changes now in progress.

The two people more responsible than others for the present laxity are Samuel Dickstein, chairman of the House Immigration Committee, and Madam Secretary Perkins. Both have tried to get measures through Congress which would have made it easier still for immigrants from Germany and elsewhere to enter the country.

In 1933 there were 19,865 peporta-tions. But in 1934, Miss Perkins brought the number down to 8,879. On one occasion she eexrcised the power of her office to retain 1200 aliens as public charges. She is being criticized for having admitted Emma Goldman and other notorious anarchists. She reversed the order
