Bulldogs Defeat **Dragons** In **Hard Battle**

Coach Wadzeck Deserves Much Praise For Team

The Spur Bulldogs brought home another conference victory Armistice Day by defeating the Paducah Dragons in one of the most difficult contests of the season. The Dragons received and went down on their 38-yard line. They made two first downs and then the Bulldogs took the ball. After three downs they kicked to Paducah's 35-yard line. Paducah took five yard penalty. Spur gets five yard penalty and Paducah made first down. 



The oil activity in Dickens County and adjoining counties seems to be taking on new life. The Morrissey well on the Bird Ranch is drilling at around /1820 Msterday evening. This is a lime information and is as hard as can be found.

The Litchfield well on the W. A. Harris place is held up waiting a shipment of drill pipe. The bill of lading has been received and it is thought it might arrive this week in time to get work started. The formation in this well is so hard that the drill pipe which was used in eastern fields proved to be inadequate for this well. The well is down to 1600 feet and it is thought that it will require core drilling the remainder of the depth.

Location has been made for another well in the Red Mud community. People there feel hopes of getting this well started in the near future. Local lumber companies have had several inquiries relative to material for building derricks, and the chances are that within the next two or three months several other wells will be started.



A Nice Lawn At A Small Cost

"For only \$6.15, I have succeeded in growing a good lawn of Bermuda grass, and all of the foundation shrubs which I need," was a statement in the report of Mrs. Ben Overstreet, Yard Demonstrator of the Dickens Club, on her yard work for this year. "In January I set out all my shrubs. I have crepe myrtles, Armoor River privits, spirea, Japanese quince, butterfly bushes, and two wax leaf Lyciddiums.

"During this same month, I have planted my grass. We levelled out the lawn, filling in with barnyard fertilizer. We did not disturb the grass already growing, but sowed fifty cents worth of Bermuda seed of the cleaned quality which comes up from two to four weeks sooner than the ordinary seeds, husks and all."

Mrs. Overstreet plans to continue her yard improvement this next year by planting the entire back yard in grass to make a playground for her two small boys.



"Figures compiled by a national safety organization disclose that approximately 2,000 or 2,500 persons lost their lives in collisions at railroad grade crossings last year. A like or perhaps larger number will lose their lives under similar circumstances in 1937, due to increased motor travel and faster train schedules. This does not take into consideration the thousands that were permanently crippled or injured and the additional thousands that suffered only temporary hurts. The property damage, both real and human, caused in these scores of needless "accidents" will off-set many times the cost of providing day night. grade separations at the most dan-

"During each of the next two years the federal government has made an extra allocation of \$2,724,825 to Texas to finance railroad grade separations and install warnings and other preventive devices at railroad grade crossings having a bad accident record. The Texas Highway Department will furnish the plans, specifications. award the contracts and supervise their construction and installation. The ordinary practice followed in construct either an overpass or an underpass. In the main, this procedure will be followed in Texas, although there will be an important variation

Grade And Staple **Report For Texas** Grades of cotton to date this sea-

son for Texas continue somewhat higher than those of last season for the similar period. Smaller proportions are reported this year over last year for staple lengths 15-16 and 31-32 inch and for those 1 inch and longer. The proportion is also less this season than last for staples shorter than 7-8 inch, whereas the only staples representing larger proportions are 7-8 and 29-32 inch.

White Middling and higher grades constitute 57 percent of all cotton classed so far this season against 49 percent last season. Strict low Middling and lower White grades represent smaller proportions this season to date than last season; however. the proportion of all spotted grades is slightly larger this season. Staple lengths of the crop to date this season are: shorter than 7-8 inch, 16 percent; 7-8 and 29-32 inch, 49 percent; 15-16 and 31-32 inch. 28 percent; 1 inch and longer, 7 percent. A larger proportion of the crop is tenderable this season than that of last season, the percentage being 83 and 77 respectively.

This report is based on statistics released last Thursday.

The Grammar school is making preparations to have a part in publishing the Rowel. The editorial staff is to be selected soon and the school will be presented in the school publication.




