All taxes for County Treasurer, I first wish to are supposed to be paid on or before

> All persons who have reached their 21st birthday since January 1, 1937, will be entitled to vote in the election this year without a poll tax receipt provided they secure an exemption certificate at the Tax Collector's office. There is no fee for issuing this certificate but the law requires that all persons voting as unders without a poll tax receipt have their exemption certificates.

Another thing about this year. It is election year and all officers in Texas from the Governor down are to be elected. Also, every Congressman is to be elected this year. People should pay their poll taxes and be eligible to vote. You can pay your poll taxes without paying your property taxes if you can cannot pay both, but you cannot pay your property taxes unless you do pay your poll taxes.

Anyone who does not have time to go to the county seat to pay their poll taxes can mail the amount to the Tax Collector's office and have their poll tax receipt issued to them. They should include the following information in their letter: Your age, how many years you have lived in Texas, how many years you have lived in Dickens County and the place you cast your vote-whether it be at East Spur, or West Spur, Dickens, McAdoo

A poll tax is \$1.75 for each person. For a man and wife the amount is only \$3.50. People should be willing to pay their poll taxes and have thority as citizens. 

Leonard P. Ayres, one of the nation's top-flight economists. recently described the railroads as our "20 per cent in-"AOHdustry."

That is, the lines represent about 20 per cent of our industrial assets. Railroad securities constitute 20 per cent of all listed stocks and bonds. Railroads purchase 20 per cent of output of a number of our largest industries-steel, soft coal, fuel oil, and lumber.

Mr. Ayres further pointed out something that is not generally realized—that transportation contributes more dollars to our national income than does agriculture. For each seven dollars that farming adds to the national income, transportation adds eight. And railroad transportation is by far the largest element in the transportation industry.

It was not an accident that during the recent hearings held by the interstate Commerce Commission concerning the railroads' application for a 15 per cent rate increase, representatives of other important industries appeared and spoke on behalf of granting the request. We have reached a dangerous crisis in railroad finance, with almost all lines earning next to nothing in net profit, with further reductions in buying forced on the roads, and with a number of lines coming periously close to bankruptcy.

All experts agree that it would be substantially in excess of a billion dollars for 1938, and Frank McNinch, for many years head of the Federal Power Commission, has placed the figure at one billion and a half. The only way that utilities can raise the necessary money is by the sale of securities. The present unfriendly government power policy has made such sale impossible.

If the current conferences between the President and utility representatives reach a successful fruition, the cause of recovery will be immeasurably served.







There is no fee for issuing this certificate but the law requires that all persons voting as unders without a poll tax receipt have their exemp-

tion certificates. Another thing about this year. It is election year and all officers in Texas from the Governor down are to be elected. Also, every Congressman is to be elected this year. People should pay their poll taxes and be eligible to vote. You can pay your poll taxes without paying your property taxes if you can cannot pay both, but you cannot pay your property taxes unless you do pay your poll taxes.

Anyone who does not have time t

go to the county seat to pay their poll taxes can mail the amount to the Tax Collector's office and have their poll tax receipt issued to them. They should include the following information in their letter: Your age, how many years you have lived in Texas, how many years you have lived in Dickens County and the place you cast your vote-whether it be at East Spur, or West Spur, Dickens, McAdoo, A poll tax is \$1.75 for each person. For a man and wife the amount







Various estimates have been made as to the amount which the utility industry could expend in the near future for deferred construction. All experts agree that it would be substantially in excess of a billion dollars for 1938, and Frank McNinch, for many years head of the Federal Power Commission, has placed the figure at one billion and a half. The only way that utilities can raise the necessary money is by the sale of securities. The present unfriendly government power policy has made such sale impossible.

If the current conferences between the President and utility representatives reach a successful fruition, the cause of recovery will be immeasurably served.


