

### Offer For Sale Of Cotton Tags

The government is making another offer to buy participation trust certificates, Form C-5-I, from the original holder or from the transferee according to recent reports. Severa of the farmers who placed their 1933 cotton in the government pool have already received quite a sum of money for their tags. It is quoted that the amount of one dollar per bale will be paid this time on the 1933 option cotton.

Farmers who still hold tags are to turn them in at the County Agents office. 
