



Bulldogs Face Whirlwinds At Floydada Today

The next sale of horses and mules at the Spur Livestock Market will be Friday of this week and will



Every Monday the Spur Livestock Sale is conducted at the McArthur and Sons Barn just west of the Consumers Fuel Association. The sale of cattle last Monday was lively and the stock that was offered brought a good price. People who attended the Spur sale Monday attended other sales in larger centers Tuesday, and the cattle on Spur market brought as good or better price as in the larger places.

In speaking of the conditions those in charge of the sale stated the greatest drawback is the lack of cattle to supply the buyers. It is hoped people who have cattle in the country they want to sell will bring them in next Monday and try to supply a part of the market demand. About 135 cattle passed through the ring last Monday, and while that is a very nice weekly sale, yet there were many buyers who had to go elsewhere to get their required number. Many people brought cattle several miles to the sale, but even at that there was a lack of cattle. Bring more cattle next Monday because the buyers will stop coming to Spur unless they can get at least a reasonable number of cattle each trip.

The sale of cattle and hogs will be next Monday at one o'Clock in the afternoon and each Monday thereafter. Remember the Spur Livestock Market is a permanent market, and those who have sold their stock at Spur feel they have received a good price for it.

Mr. Bradshaw spends most of his time at his office at the sales barn, and he will be glad for any one to discuss the sale with him. He wants the people to get the top market for their stuff.




Ag. Meeting At **Patton Springs** Well Attended




