Lockney Wins District Title Last Friday By Defeating Spur 13 to 0

Home gridiron, mental set, plus two great running backs; all this had Lockney Friday to utilize in turning back a fighting pack of Spur Bulldogs to win the championship of district 4-B, 13 to 0.	
Lockney kicked off to P. Powell, who returned 8 yards. Hurst was off to a first down on the next play. The Spurs marched down the field to the 12 yard marker on drives by Willhoit and Hurst. Willhoit dropped a pass on the ten-yard line on fourth down. Lockney took over and advanced to twenty-yard line in Spur territory but fumbled when hit hard by Smart, Spur center.	
After exchange of punts, Lockney advanced to 15-yard line on a completed pass 19 yards from Hill to Gentry, as the first quarter ended. Early in the second quarter, Brotherton carried four yards for the first score of the game. Brotherton converted the extra point. Lockney again knocked at the goal line in this quarter but were held off by a scrapping forward wall of Bulldogs.	
The two elevens fought it out during a vicious third quarter. The Longhorns saw several goal stabs stopped dead by charging Spur players. Then with the last period Spur saw little Charles Hurst break into the open and race thirty yards before he was brought down from behind by the speedy Lockney safety. With only minutes to play, Brotherton batted a 65-yard punt far down the field to Haralson, who had been injured in the third quarter but was back in the ball game. Little Bill took the high punt but fumbled and Lockney's two ends recovered on the 14-yard line. Hill, big fullback, rammed to the three-yard line in two tries. A mighty stand by the Spurs was in vain after three attempts with no gain. Hill stumbled over behind powerful blocking for the second touch. Brotherton's kick for extra point was blocked. Score Lockney 13, Spur 0. Desperate drives by Hurst and his team mates were stopped with the gun ending the game.	
The entire Spur eleven fought every inch of the game to a man. Their vicious tackling knocked Lockney loose from the ball on several touch-down drives. Lockney presented Hill and Brotherton, two big and rugged backfield aces, that meant the difference between the two teams. Plagued with injuries and weary from committee room squabbles initiated by protesting schools, the Spurs were not mentally set for the inspired Lockney team that pointed all week to the game. Lockney represents district 4-B against Wellington, winner of 3-B for the bi-district title. Spur rests in third place in the conference with five wins, one loss, and a tie contest with Flomot. Flomot has two ties, for a loss of one game.

MATTRESS DEMONSTRATION

Tuesday morning of last week a group of industrious women met at the home of Mrs. A. G. Dunwoody for a mattress demonstration under the supervision of Mrs. Stella Winston, of Spur. Supt. of H. M. C. of F. S. A. The mattress weighing fifty pounds, made of new long staple cotton, was for Mrs. Mansel Hinson.

We did not arrive on the scene till late afternoon and the mattress was being finished. Surprised at the fine job they were doing, we asked them how it had been managed "We beat the cotton till it was fluffy enough and stuffed it according to directions," they replied. The mattress was not tacked, only the roll around the edges at the top and bottom. The cover was made of best quality blue striped Government ticking, and when finished was easily worth thirty dollars, at an estimated cost of only about six dollars. Yes, it was hard work, but no one, seemed to mind that and the day is not far distant when farm families will one and all enjoy plenty of good beds and bed coverings, for "comforts" and quilts may be made at a small cost to those who raise their own cotton. Farmers, of course, do not count their work. If they could only receive as much as twenty-five cents an hour for all the hard work the men, women and children do on the farm the year round, well, they would all be rich and that's that.

After chatting for awhile with the ladies we asked: "Was there anything left from dinner?" They seemed to all speak at once, "Yes; help yourself!" which we did. Kind hands quickly set an array of good things before us, chicken and dressing, meat loaf, vegetables and fruit, puddings and so forth, and no way-fading man at the back door ever enjoyed a meal better. Everything was delicious and our only regret was that we did not get there in time to eat with the ladies. Those present were:

In the next demonstration two mattresses will be made one each for Mrs. Emma Russell and Mr. Lester English, supervised by Mrs. Stella Winston of Spur. The place is not yet decided, but it will be somewhere in Spur, and those who are interested will have no difficulty in locating it, so come and bring a covered dish and enjoy the day with this group of enterprising women and help them to keep the home fires burning.

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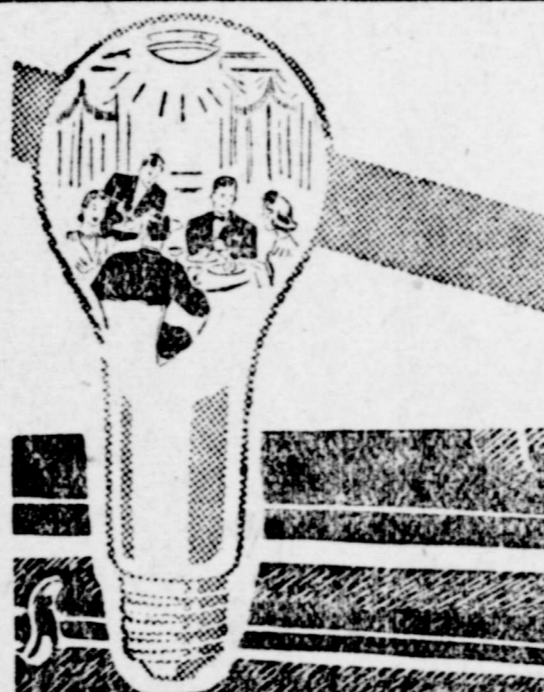
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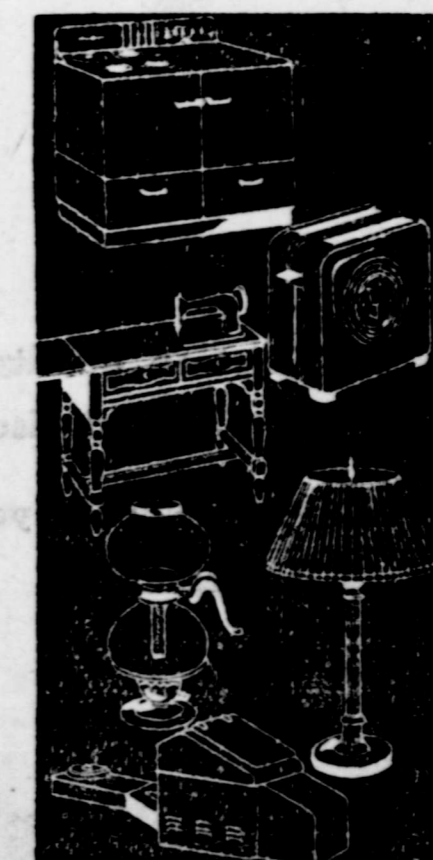
