Spur Boy Gets Wide Recognition

Henry Scoggins, former Spur football star, finished this fall a college football career as one of the best tackles in the state of Kansas, playing with Pittsburg State Teachers College. Scoggins was a regular tackle from the first game of his freshman year to his final game against North Texas State Teachers at Denton.

"Tex" started making football history in his sophomore year at Pittsburg when he made an all central conference tackle position by unanimous vote of sports writers and coaches in the loop.

In the four years Scoggins was out of only two games, those because of injuries. During his entire football career he was virtually a 60-minute man in every game.

Scoggins played three years in high school before his football career. This year he was picked on the majority of all-conference selections, and when not, was given the captain's position on the second.

Weighing 195 pounds and standing over six feet, Scoggins was the most rugged fighter in Kansas college football.

Agricultural Association Has Interesting Meeting Monday; Sets Goal For 200 Members

A very interesting meeting of the Dickens County Agricultural Association was held at the court house Monday afternoon. After a number of talks on the benefit of the organization and the advantages it affords the farmers in Dickens County, membership renewals were called for. 34 members paid dues for another year which was practically all that were present at the meeting.

Groups of volunteer workers organized to solicit members in the various communities until about January 1. The goal of membership has been set at 200 active members. After the membership drive has been completed

another meeting will be called and further discussion of the advantages of the organization will be made.

The Dickens County Agricultural Association is affiliated with the Texas Agricultural Association which in turn is affiliated with the National Farm Bureau. This gives the farmers in Dickens County the advantage of a very strong farm organization and the dues in all of them are trivial. By farmers uniting for mutual benefit they will be able to get recognition before the legislative bodies of the country and business consideration with the big business institutions of America.
