Dr. Lowdermilk, who was chosen the research division. by the Department of Agriculture to begin a survey of the experience of bile and afoot in 17 countries of the Old World. He visited 124 areas of special interest.

His studies took him into Egypt, Algeria, Tunisia, Lybia, Trans-Jordan, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, Iraq, as well as several European countries. As a background to this survey he previously had made five agricultural explorations into northwest

Born in Liberty, North Carolina in 1888, Dr. Lowdermilk studied at Park College, Missiouri, and later at the University of Arizona, at Oxford University in England, and at the University of California.

Following completion of his studies at the University of Arizona, Dr Lowdermilk received a Rhodes Scholarship. When he had completed three years of study at Oxford, with field studies in Germany ,he received, in 1915, degrees in the School of Forestry and Geology. From December 1914 to January 1915, he served on the Commission for Relief in Belgium.

Returning to the United States Forest Service, as a forest ranger in Arizona and New Mexico. When war was declared, h ejoined the 10th Engineers, .A. E. F., and became timber acquisition officer for the Northeastern district in France. Then he served for a time on the special commission in Paris to assist the American Peace Commission in determining damages to forests and farm lands in battle field regions of France.

In 1927, Dr. Lowdermilk returned to the United States and entered the University of California where he did graduate work leading to the degree of Doctir of Philosophy, which he received in 1928. Then he accepted a position in the Forest Service as project leader of studies in erosion and stream flow in the Califor-

Dr. Lowdermilk was a delegate to Congresses of the Pacific Science Association at Tokyo, Japan, in 1926 and in Canada in 1933. He is chairman of the standing committee of land classification and utilization of this assoc iation. He was an official delegate

Soil Science in England in 1935.
In October 1933, Dr. Lowdermilk Wind Break was named vice-director of the Soil Erosion Service of th eU. S. 




