John L. persons locally. received 9 1-2 cents per pound for the calves making a total of \$172 .-John L .stated that he purchased the calves from his father when he was making a shipment last fall, the calves cost him \$105.60 and after feeding the 139 days made a \$66.60 gain over what they cost. The feed for the feeding period cost approximately \$36.00 which left John L. a profit of \$30.60 for feeding the two calves 139 days.

The following is the feed mixture that John L. feed. Ground kaffir corn bundles with heads, milo heads ground, cotton seed, cotton seed meal and cake.

John L. stated further that he believed he could have made lots more money if he just had the cattle to feed, and thinks he will feed some more soon.

Enumerators for the 16th decennial cenusus of the United States were being trained Wednesday and Thursday at Dickens for the enumeration of Crosby, Dickens, Kent and King counties. J. P. Woodward ass't. district supervisor of Lubbock, was in dharge of the two-day school.

The population, agriculture and housing census will begin the morning of April 2 and preliminary re sults are expected to be announced early in May. Woodward unced early in May. Woodward unged co-operation of the citizenry of this section in the forthcoming census to facilitate the work of the enumerators and assure that none would be overlooked in the population count.

The 1940 census is the greatest ever attempted since the first count of the infant republic was made in 790. In addition to the population, farm and housing census to be taken beginning April 2, a complete survey of business and manufacturing has een in progress since January 1. Jpon completion of the entire census the government expects to have the most complete record of the human and material resources of the nation that was ever made.

Grover B. Hill who was named Assistant Secretary of Agriculture in December has, been a Texas rancher and farmer since 1911. Claude R. Wickard, newly appointed Under Secretary of Agriculture, has farmed a general grain and livestock farm near Camden, Ind., for nearly a quarter of a century. Both men have been associated with the administrative work of the AAA Farm Program in

Mr. Hill, 51 ,was named a field representative of the AAA in 1934, after serving on a committee which drafted the AAA Range program. Since 1936 he has been in charge of the range program for the Southern Region of the AAA. During the drought of 1934, he directed the regional cattle-buying program in New Mexio, Texas, and Oklahoma. He studied at the University of Texas from 1909 to 1911, after which he went into ranching and farming near Amarillo.

The new Under Secretary first became connected with the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in 1933 and in 1936 he was made director of the North Central division of the AAA. As director of the division, which includes the Corn Belt States, Mr. Wickard stressed farmer-administration of the AAA. Mr. Wickard, now, 47, has operated the same Indinana farm which was farmed by his father and grandfather. 




