Hobert Lewis. Mr. Ellis, who had been critical ill about four weeks, died suddenly at his home at 1006 West Harris, about five o'clock, June 12. He was thought to be improving, but had suffered a bad spell that morning. Heart trouble was considered the cause of his demise.

Mr. Ellis was a native of Mississippi and was born near Corinth July 14, 1861. His father was killed in the battle of Corinth in April, 1862. Mr. Ellis came to Texas with his mother when he was three years of age. The family settled in Ellis county. He came to West Texas in 1881 and became a citizen of Archer county. He began riding the range at the age of 13 years and worked for T. M. Moore three years on his first job.

Mr. Ellis was married at Harold in Wilbarger county, to Miss Jennie Dodson, December 22, 1885. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary December 22, 1935. Six children came into their home, all of whom are living. They are: Harry Ellis of the Rocking Chair ranch, Dudley Ellis of Swenson, Mrs. Agatha Locke of Miami, Mrs. Rachel Bingham of Spur, Mrs. Dulaney Davis of Spur, and Miss Zell Ellis, a teacher at Fort Sumner, New Mexico. There are three grandsons, three grand daughters, and two great grand children. All of the children were born in Collinsworth county except Miss Zell, who was born in Kent county.

Mr. and Mrs. Ellis lived near where Wellington now stands until 1903. In that year they moved to Kent county and established the Rocking Chair ranch where they lived until 1936, when they moved to Spur. Their home was always open to those who went their way. They always observed the old type of West Texas hospitality, and today it is often you hear people say they spent a night, or two nights in the Ellis home in early days.

Mr. Ellis never affiliated with any church organization. However he expressed a faith in his Maker, and his daily life was a testimony of his profession.
