The Farm Security Administraend and see the Beaming Bargains tion is bringing its farm purchase program to Dickens County for the first time this year and tenant farmers who aspire to own land may make application from now to August 31, 1940, it was announced today by FSA supervisor J. O. Winslar.

Application blanks for these loans, made under provisions of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Albert (Buck) will receive six Act, may be obtained at the FSA weeks or two months training at office located in the Spur Secur-

The loans are repayable over a in poor years and larger in good years, is provided. "This method of financing farm ownership is successful," the supervisor said, "as is being demonstrated by some 1,000 farmers in Texas who have received these loans and as a group have repaid more on them than has come due." No down payment is required, Mr. Winslar said

"The program started small," he stated, "with a national appropriation in 1937 of only \$10,-000,000 to cover the entire United States. As its, success has been demonstrated this fund has been increased. The current session of Congress authorized \$50,000,000." Farmers to whom loans are made are chosen by a committee of county farmers,




