#### **Butter Makers Will** Have Field Day At ly as each John Smith raises his Tech September 13

Texas butter manufacturers, butter makers, and field men for the dairy industry of the state are invited to attend a one-day short course in butter manufacturing at Texas Technological College Friday, September 13.

Demonstration of the new "moldmycelia count" method used by the Federal Food and Drug division to determine quality of cream used in butter manufacture will feature the day's program, which opens at 10 a. m. and closes at 4 p. m. Purpose of the meeting is to acquaint manufacturers of Texas with the effect different types of cream have on mold count.

Laboratory facilities of the Texas Tech dairy manufacturing department are being expanded to make these counts for manufacturers in this area. A nominal fee will be charged for the service. Speakers include M. E. McMurry of Fort Worth, general manager, and Henry Tuebel of Tulia, chairman of the West Texas branch of the Texas Dairy Products Association; Professors Renner, M. G. ederson, and L. G. Harmon of 'exas Tech dairy manufacturers epartment. 


