927 Registrants In The County

R. C. Brown, chairman of the County Draft Board, stated Tuesday that 927 people had registered in Dickens County in compliance with the recent act of Congress.

Mr. Brown stated that there would be a few more register since they had received instructions to accept all persons who voluntarily presented themselves for registration before the first drawing which now seems to be about October 29. If anyone in the county has failed to register, it will be best to register at once. Farmers who have Mexicans picking cotton for them should instruct these Mexicans to register if they have not done so. Some of the Mexican population may have misunderstood, and thinking their registering at the post office for citizenship is what is required at this time. That registration has nothing to do with the draft registration. This should be explained to

There is a very serious penalty placed on those who fail to register. Failing to register for army training places a penalty on the person consisting of a fine of \$10,000.00, or five years imprisonment in the federal penitentiary, or both such fine and imprisonment as evidence in the case may be brought out.







BRUISING AROUND FARMS: FINDS A REAL FARMER

J. Otha Winslar, Jr., County Supervisor for the Farm Security already 1 1/2 million farm families unemployed, due to the tendency to large farms operated with hired labor and tractors. "This is bad for the owner as well as for the farmers who are forced of the land," says Mr. Winslar. "You can't have business without people," he says. "A thousand acres run by one man is not so good as that same thousand acres run by a dozen amilies." Following is one of the stories of successful small farm operators has been collected by the FSA supervisor.

Out on a bare hill near Hamilton, Texas, lives Bruce Summerford, working 38 acres of land and making a living at it which is two or three times as good as the living which most Texas and Oklahoma farmers make on 100 acres.

Summerford has only one complaint. "I have to much land," he says. "I have 38 acres, and I

could get along better with 20." When Summerford bought the farm in 1927, it had been in cultivation for 40 years, and was gullied and grown up in Bermuda grass. Such corn as it raised was about 18 inches tall and "most of that was tassel."



Planning a One-Room Apartment




