### Terracing Demonstration

Last Saturday morning approximately 100 Dickens County farmers saw eight tractors constructing terraces on the Neal Chastain farm north of Spur with the aid of eight different types of farm plows and terracers. This demontration was sponsored by the Soil Conservation Service and the local County Agent.

His parents received a wire stating his illness. That was the day before many automobiles in this country. They spent all night getting to Stamford to take the train out next morning. Mrs. Williams was ill at the time, but she endured, the long hard trip just to see her boy once more. She was sent back to Fort Worth and was placed in a hospital and was there when Lieut. Williams passed away. She never saw him again.
