Beyond the Reach of the Voters of Texas

Senator Jesse Martin of Fort Worth has introduced a bill at Austin proposing creation of an appointive oil and gas commission to take over regulatory functions of the elective Railroad Commission, thus taking out of the hands of the people their right to choose their public servants for their all important task.

Texas is a grea oil producing state and the affairs of the oil and gas division of the Railroad Commission have been handled in a very efficient manner. Of corrse, there have been rulings that have not met with the approval of all of us, but there will never be hree men who can please all at all times.

Just such a woman is Ethel Dun-ham, a pioneer in the crusade to, save premature babies. Dr. Dun-ham's great work which has spread from Portland, Maine, to Portland, Oregon has been vividly written for the readers of the March issue of Cosmopolitan Magazine, by Maxine Davis, well-known commentator on medical subjects. nedical subjects

Today, Miss Davis says in her article, about 100,000 babies, or five per cent of all babies born, are premature. Of these at least one half premature. Of these at least one half die immediately or soon after birth. To cut down this alarming total has been the lifework of Ethel Dunham, and in the twenty years of her career she has succeeded in tracking down the reason for these deaths; and spreading her findings to hos-pitals all over the country. pitals all over the country. The American Pediatric Society only last November accepted Dr. Dunham's definition of a premature baby, which is not always a baby born before expiration of the term. According to Dr. Dunham, any baby weighing less than five and a half pounds is premature and demands special care. Furthermore the doctor pecial care. Furthermore the doctor

rejects as an old wives' tale the theory that premature babies are apt to grow up mentally deficient. They will develop normally unless they suffer birth injuries.

Dr. Dunham has resolved the three main problems in saving the life of a premature baby. "The first is to keep him warm. The second is to protect him from infection, and the third is to find the best way to feed him."

LATE THURSDAY DIGHT

PUR'S new telephone system will be placed in Service late Thursday night. Friday morning, when you lift your receiver to call, the operator's "Number, please?" will come to you from the new "flashlight" switchboard at the telephone office.

There will be no interruption in service when the "cut-over" is made from the old system to the new. Due to careful advance planning and coordination, the cut-over will be a matter of a few seconds.

As the zero hour approaches, crews of operators and workmen will be stationed at both the old and the new switchboards. When there is a momentary lull in the flow of calls, the cut-over signal will be given. Quickly, the connections to the old switchboard will be broken ... expert workmen will pull the plugs from the new flashlight board ... operators will slip into place before the new board, eyes alert for the first flashing signal light ... and Spur's new telephone system will be in operation.

Lights Signal Operators

You will receive faster and more accurate service over the new system. The instant you lift the receiver, a light will flash on the switchboard, signalling the operator, and her answering "Number, please?" will come to you more quickly than ever. Another light will tell her when your call is answered.

Return the receiver to the hook, and again a light will tell the operator that the conversation is finished, and your line is open for another call. You will not have to turn a crank to call, nor is a "ring-off" necessary.

New System Completed

The cut-over Thursday night will climax the improvement and expansion program of the telephone company to give Spur one of the most modern telephone systems available for cities of this size.

Shortly after the cut-over, an installer will call to replace your present telephone with a new "common battery" instrument which requires neither dry cell batteries nor a crank for operation.

Your telephone will continue under the local staff of operators, with Mrs. Jessie Kyle, chief operator, in charge. As at present, J. C. Keen will be in charge of installations and repairs.







His first commercial success in decorative plastics was in turning soybeans into instrument board susters. With certain other crops

structural plastics that he says he will be building a wholly plastic body within a few years—a body that will be lighter and stronger than steel. "Only door locks and hinges will be of metal," says Mr. Ford. Possibly a growing shortage of steel and the dwindling foreign markets for agriculture will hurry along the plastic car.


