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Lubbock To Build **Homes For Officers**

Coincident with announcement of the award of conditional contract for construction of the first forty houses to be made available for rent to officers to be stationed at the Air Corps Advanced Flying school under construction west of Lubbock, it has been announced that contracts for architect and engineering service for the \$515,000 low-cost housing project have been approved by the U. S

Housing Authority for Lubbock. Architectural work on the latter project will be under supervision of three Lubbock firms-Haynes and and Strange, Walker and Atcheson, and John B. Roberts and engineering work will be directed by Harry N Roberts, Lubbock consulting engin-

H. C. Pender, chairman of the Locial Housing Authority said he has recived no indications that the national defense program will delay the project, which will be designed to last for 60 years, and will include an administration building, landscaping and possibly a recreation area.

Contract for the 40 houses for Army officers was let to the Maxey Lumber Company of Lubbock, subject to approval of plans by the Board of Directors of the Lubbock Homes, Inc., sponsoring organization, and to approval of these plans by the Federal Housing Authority, where 90 percent of financing will be sought.

Lubbock Homes, Inc., of which Homer D. Grant is president, was organized recently to sponsor the pro-

The houses, to cost approximately \$4,500 each, are to be located in an addition known as "Green Acres," lying a block or two west of College Avenue between 26th and 31st streets, in southwest Lubbock. Streets entering the addition will conform to existing thoroughfares, but inside will follow a winding, landscaped course. All utility lines, wires, etc., are to be underground. No two houses of the development are to be exactly

"Business deserves to be immeasurably more free from bureaucratic regulation than it is. No medium is in such good position, so well equipped, as the newspapers to preach and to teach the value of free enterprise."

A free press exists only where free enterprise exists. In the total state, the newspaper is of necessity the voice of the clique in power. It dances to the dictator's song. It spreads lies and advances corruption in high places. It is used for the selfish ends of the few-not for the service of the

Here in the United States the free press has done a magnificent job in building and perpetuating the democratic, free enterprise system. It was the newspapers of America, small no less than large, which encouraged private industry. Our electric power development, oil production, coal, and metal mining, and a thousand and one varieties of enterprise have had the aid of a free press, to the great benefit of the public. And this same free press has been the first to ferret out and publicize graft whenever it appeared in industry or in govern-

Socialism would mean the destruction of the free press-presisely as it would mean the destruction of free enterprise in all fields, because it necessitates a dictated press and a dictated industry. As President Roosevelt has said, a free press "must be maintained against all costs." And the only way it can be maintained is to preserve and protect the free enterprise system which gives it life.



Organization Month | Eggs For Defense! For Farm Bureau

November has been proclaimed as organization month for community es Government. 300,000,000 dozen and county Farm Bureau units in extra eggs by June 1943 is the goal! Texas, according to J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation.

Hammond advises that the American Farm Bureau Federation, which is primarily the composite strength of 41 state Farm Bureaus, was directly responsible for the passage of 85 per cent parity loans on 1941 wheat, cotton, and rice crops. "Farmers who are members of the Farm Bureau deserve the appreciation of all other farmers and business men of Texas interested in the welfare of these fair prices in 1941 but the loan is for this crop year only—we expect thousands of other farmers to join with our organization during Novemproducts deserve."

"Farm Bureau members and their leaders are demanding only a parity price for farm products, but we do expect this each year." Reference was nade to the Senator Thomas' conference a few days ago wherein inflationary prices on farm products were advocated, and the "walk-out" by President Ed A. O'Neal of the American Farm Bureau Federation. 15,000 members of the Texas Farm Bureau are staunchly supporting this action by our National President," Hammond asserted. "We know that farm prices are affected by inflation after all other prices advance, and deflation comes first to the farmer. We want our democracy to be representative of industry, labor and agriculture. We want the parity concept to be extended to the three big groups alike."

Farm Bureau members in near 200 Texas counties will make the drive for a higher membership and plan for a stable program, Hammond pointed out. The official 194e program of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation will be determined by the voting delegates at the state convenion in Fort Worth, December 2-3,

However, he added, price control should principally be exercised as near the source of goods as possible, and should not be exercised over distribution except in acute situations.
