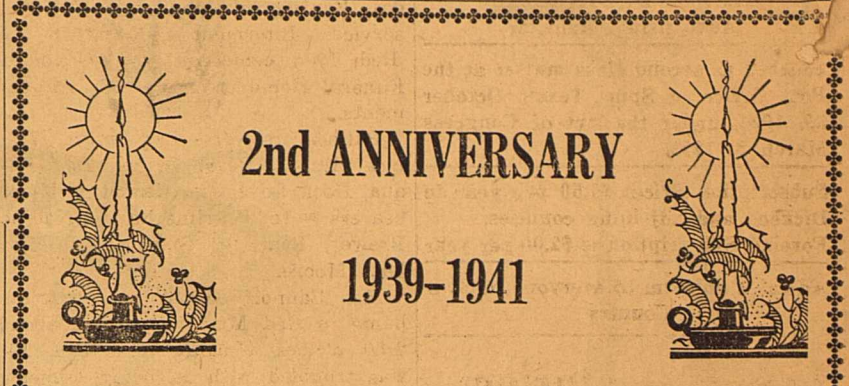
The Parent-Teacher Association of the East Ward School held their regular meeting Tuesday afternoon. There were about 60 in attendance and a very fine meeting.

In a report from Washington Representative George Mahon states that he voted for the bill designed to prevent defense strikes which passed the House last week. He said that a handful of racketeers should not be permitted to wreck the program of the overwhelming majority of the American people; that the legislation was also designed to be helpful to the great mass of patriotic workers. The American people are aroused, he asserted, and action is necessary in order to make the defense program effective and in order to promote unity among our people.

The bill passed the House by a vote of 252 to 136 and was referred to the Senate. A majority of those opposing the bill were from industrial areas.

Lesson Eight — HOW TO CHANGE VERBS
"Buenos Dias, Señores, Señoras y Señoritas".
In our last Spanish lesson we studied about words of action or verbs. We said that they were all divided into three groups. We classify these words according to their ending. If a word ends in "ar", like "hablar", we say that it belongs to the first group or conjugation; if the word ends "er", like "comer", we have in the second group; and if it ends in "ir", like "vivir", we put it in the third group. Of course, the purpose in classifying these words is to make our study easier. When we learn one representative word, we learn many others that belong to the same group. When we learn the changes we mean when we change the form of the word to be used with each

person. We may change the person from "yo" (I) to "usted" (you) or to "nosotras" (we). When we do this, that is change the persons, we must also change the verb just as we do in English in a great number of cases. For example, "hablar" means "to speak", but if we want to say "I speak", we have to change the word to "hablo" and with "usted" we have "habla", the change made is slightly more than with "yo" or "usted". To the word "habla" we add the ending "mos" which means "we" so we say "Nosotros hablamos", we speak. With words of the other two groups, like "comer" and "vivir", we have the same thing, except that we have a different vowel. Instead of "a" we use "e". We say "Yo como", "Usted come"; "Yo vivo" and "Usted vive". When we come to "nosotros"

(we), the vowel used is different in each group. We have "Nosotros hablamos", we speak, "Nosotros comemos", we eat, and "Nosotros vivimos", we live. So you notice that the main difference is in the ending, but we also use a different vowel. We have a different ending for a different person; also a different vowel. The "a" for the first group, "e" for the second, and "i" for the third.
Let us now use these words in sentences, which you should be able to do very easily by this time. You may learn the numbers, uno, dos, tres, cuatro, cinco, seis, siete, ocho, nueve, diez.
1. El señor habla español.
2. Yo hablo español muy poco.
3. ¿Habla usted español en la casa?
4. Nosotros hablamos es-

pañol mucho.
5. ¿Come usted en la casa?
6. No, señor, como en el cafe.
7. ¿Vive usted en San Antonio?
8. Mi amigo vive en San Antonio, pero yo vivo en la ciudad de Corpus Christi.
9. Yo como en el café, pero me gusta comer mejor en la casa.
10. Me gusta mucho vivir en la ciudad de Corpus Christi porque (because) es muy grande y muy bonita.
You can now try to make sentences with words like "cantar", to sing, "comprar", to buy "bajar", to go down, "tomar", to take or drink, "mandar", to send, "comer", to eat, "leer", to read "vivir", to live, "subir", to climb or go up, and "escribir", to write.

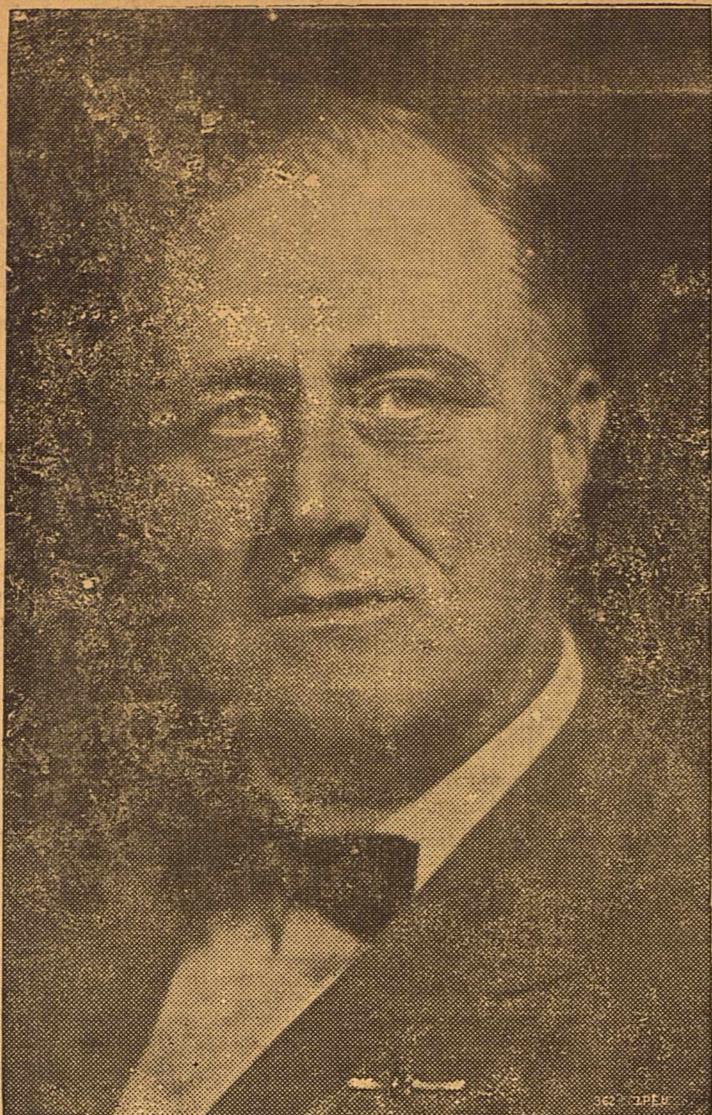

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Many Nations Declare War on Japan

The declaration of war on Japan by the United States at noon Monday was followed by many other countries making similar declarations of war. The record of the United States Congress in declaring war on Japan Monday was the greatest record in history. With only one dissenting vote Congress voted the declaration within one hour and 29 minutes after President Roosevelt started his special message to both Houses.

Other countries declaring war on the Nipponese government were, Costa Rica, Panama, New Zealand, Australia and the United Kingdom with five Latin American countries declaring 2 state of war. Argentina, Uruguay, Colombia and apparently Brazil are ready to permit the United States to use their ports for war. Brazil took over eight of 12 Italian ships in her ports, and Mexico and Colombia have broken off diplomatic relations with Japan.

Chile asks that all American nations get together in a conference and work out a plan of action against Japan and the Nazi forces. This conference probably will be called soon with representatives from all American nations to formulate agreements of action and supplies.

Turkey Prices To Be Investigated

"Turkey prices in Texas are being set by buyers, processors and packers," E. R. Alexander, General Manager of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, charged in a telegram to Attorney General Gerald C. Mann, November 17, as he urged investigation of an alleged agreement between turkey handlers.

Allocation of buying territories was the basic charge Alexander included in his telegram to the Attorney General. The telegram read as follows: "Widespread indication of agreement among buyers, processors and packers of turkeys, in allocation of buying territories and fixing prices paid producers. Respectfully request investigation of these matters."

Alexander said that while the parity price on turkeys has not been established by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the price paid in Texas are "not commensurate with the high demand for turkeys and the apparent shortage in this year's crop."

"Regardless of how far below standard the prices are," Alexander said, "the chief point is that when buyers, processors and packers allocate territories, the threat of a monopoly on the turkey market becomes a reality."
