The basic thing in the whole agricultural scheme is keeping the farm production rolling—piling a 1942 high production record for all time on top of the record production of 1941, as that was piled on top of a record production in 1940.

The size of the production job facing farmers is indicated by the fact that there are only two items of farm production where 1942 output is not expected to be increased over 1941. Wheat acreage is down. Hay production the same. All other products are to be increased.

Not only the production goats, and the obstacles in the way of reaching them, are bigger now. Shortages of farm labor, machinery, and production supplies will become more serious. 
