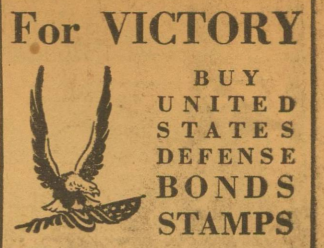

### Rationing Board Opens Office in Spur

The Dickens County Rationing Board have made Spur their headquarters with office in the City Hall. Mrs. G. W. Grimes has been selected as secretary to the Board and will be at the office during office hours every day to take records necessary to the duties of the Board.

The Board holds meetings every Monday morning at ten o'clock to take care of the tire situation of the county. When it comes time for rationing of sugar they will give service 24 hours per day.

Relative to the sugar rationing program Mark McGee, State Rationing Administrator, has the following to say:

"We have secured the full cooperation of the Texas Food Store Organizations in the 'Re-Purchase Sugar Program.' Mr. Albert L. Walters, counsellor for the Texas Chain Store Association, which includes chain drugs, variety and department stores, as well as A. & P. and Safe-Way; and Mr. Sam Hanna, Texas Wholesale Grocers Association; Mr. A. L. Becker, of the Texas Merchants Association and Mr. Roger Q. Flournoy of the Texas Retail Grocers Association have all by wire or telephone pledged their full cooperation in the Re-Purchase Sugar Program."

The State Administrator, also, is issuing by medium of the press a plea to all food stores that are not members of the organizations listed above to cooperate to the fullest extent in getting those who have bought sugar in excess of the legal rationing amount, to encourage the customers to "bring the sugar in." Mr. McGee stated that when customers apply for the rationing booklet they will be required to certify the amount of sugar which they have in their possession. More than 50 pounds per person will be considered as hoarded sugar. Penalties for false statements are up to \$10,000 fine or ten years imprisonment.

### R. N. Swenson Killed In Train Accident

While driving through Benjamin, county seat of Knox County, last Thursday afternoon, the car of Rudolph M. Swenson intersected a Santa Fe train at the highway crossing and was killed instantly. He suffered a skull fracture and concussion of the brain with chest injuries which resulted in instant death.

With him were Mrs. Eugene Pettus, Jr., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gates Williams, and Miss Irene Randolph, both of St. Louis. Mr. Swenson had met the ladies at Wichita Falls and they were driving to the Pitchfork Ranch 12 miles west of Guthrie when the accident occurred. Mrs. Pettus suffered painful bruises and Miss Randolph received head and leg injuries which rendered her unconscious. They were taken to the Knox City hospital at Knox City for medical aid.

Mr. Swenson, who was executive manager for the Pitchfork Ranch, was the youngest son of A. J. Swenson of Stamford, vice president of the Swenson Land and Cattle Company. He was secretary to his father before taking over the management of the Pitchfork Ranch nearly two years ago. He was vice president and a director of the Texas Cowboy Reunion Association at Stamford and had been manager of the rodeo since the first reunion.

A number of people of Spur attended the funeral services at Stamford Saturday. Mr. Swenson had a great number of friends at Spur and among the ranchmen of this country. He is survived by his father and three brothers: J. E. Swenson of Spur and W. G. and A. M. G. Swenson of Stamford. He was born near Anson April 5, 1902, was 39 years of age and unmarried.

Mr. Williams, one of the owners of the Pitchfork Ranch, flew down from St. Louis to be with his daughter and friend at the hospital. The report is that they have a fair chance of recovery.

### Courts Meet on New Welfare Plan

Commissioners Court from six counties met with representatives of the State Department of Welfare Wednesday morning to discuss a new plan of public welfare assistance. The six counties represented were Crosby, Dickens, Kent, Garza, King and Stone-wall.

C. B. Hodges explained the new plan in which each county is to participate with a small fund. The Government thinks the new plan will cut down overhead expenses and at the same time give the people a better service and one that will be more appreciative. Amarillo is to be the district headquarters, and the purpose is to link in these six counties with about 25 other counties for administrative purposes. Then they who need the assistance of the Welfare Department will be awarded food stamps through recommendation of the area Welfare Office and when they need anything at the grocery store, they take their stamps to the groceryman and get the articles they need.

There will be further explanations later on this plan. The main object of the meeting which was held at Dickens Wednesday, is to get the cooperation of the various Commissioners Courts on the plan. All Courts signed approval except Dickens County, and they will meet today (Thursday) to make a final decision.

The plan comes under the supervision of the Agricultural Marketing Association at Austin. The Welfare offices will be maintained and people will buy their commodities with stamps at their grocery stores.

### More Than 100 Animals to be Shown

The Spur High School FFA Fat Stock Show will open at the Football stadium at 11:00 o'clock Saturday morning, March 21. All animals shown will be those fed and cared for by the FFA boys under the supervision of Cecil Ayers, Vocational Agriculture instructor, except three. These three animals have been fed and cared for by Miss Dorothy Schussler, a 4-H Club girl, under the supervision of County Agent Mack Woodrum. She seems to be the only 4-H Club member who entered this projects show.

All lambs entered into the show will be judged in the forenoon. Hogs and calves will be judged in the afternoon. All animals will be kept on exhibition until about four o'clock in the afternoon. Ray C. Mowery, of the Department of Animal Husbandry at Texas Technological College, will judge all animals.

There will be 60 lambs entered in the show. 55 of these lambs will be shown as individuals, pens of three and pens of five. The other five lambs are milk fed during their period of suckling the ewes, and go into a different type.

In the class of breeding hogs there 13 Chester Whites, five Durocs, two Poland-Chinas, one Berkshire, two cross bred type and six Hampshires.

In the class of breeding hogs there will be six Durocs exhibited, four Hampshires, seven Chester Whites and two Poland-Chinas.

There will be 25 calves entered in the show. These take in cross bred, light weight, medium weight and heavy weight beef steers. Other animals will be entered during the show in addition to these.

Ribbons will be awarded to the first five places in all classes. Prizes will be given as far as funds will permit.

**Aid to Dependent Children Added To Welfare Work**

Since Texas, in cooperation with the federal government, initiated a program last September for aid to destitute children, approximately 10,000 needy children have been placed on the rolls and 17,772 children in 7,540 families have applications pending. Applicants and recipients of aid reside predominantly in the larger cities.

When the death, continued illness, or absence of one or both parents leaves the family without any means of support or parental care, the Aid to Dependent Children program provides monthly cash payments to the mother or other close relative with whom the children may live for the maintenance of the home. The 47th Legislature appropriated money to finance the program, with the federal government matching funds dollar for dollar.

The law sets certain requirements for the receipt of assistance by dependent children. First: it must be proven that need exists. A family is considered to be in need if it lacks sufficient resources to maintain itself. A child must have lived in the state for at least a year before hand, or, if it is an infant less than a year old,

the mother must have lived in the state a year before it was born. Although the federal social security act provides for matching funds in giving aid to children up to 16 years of age, or 18 if the child is still attending school, the Texas constitution excludes benefits to children who have already attained the age of 14 or over.

Applications for aid to dependent children may be made at the local office of the State Department of Public Welfare. The same workers who administer Aid to the Needy Blind and Old Age Assistance also administer the children's program. Applicants must supply certain information about the family and its circumstances so that the welfare office can determine whether the children may receive aid. The local office has available a Question and Answer pamphlet which gives full information concerning eligibility requirements and how to get through an application.

When an investigation shows that the family is in need, and how much assistance will be required, a monthly allowance is granted. The amount varies, depending on the need in each case. If the decision of the welfare office, either in fixing the amount or in refusing aid, seems unfair the applicant may request a hearing before a representative of the State Office and evidence given at this

"This program aims to give every dependent child in Texas the privilege of growing up in his own home," J. S. Murchison, Executive Director of the department said. "Home life is the highest and finest product of civilization. It is the great molding force of mind and of character. Children should not be deprived of it because of poverty. Cash assistance, and other services of this kind, enables young boys and girls to develop into useful and reliable citizens by making possible the maintenance of normal family life. ### Your Spanish Lesson

**Lesson 19—Practice in Speaking Spanish**  
Buenos Días, Señores y Señoras.

Espero que todos estén muy bien y que todos hablen español. Si ustedes gustan, podemos hablar en español. No es muy difícil ahora porque ustedes tienen suficiente preparación (sufficient or enough preparation).

¿Saben ustedes que significa la palabra "preparación"? "Preparación" significa "preparation" en inglés. Si ustedes practican (practice) mucho el idioma, pueden hablar mucho más. La práctica es muy neces-

aria para aprender un idioma. You should now be able to increase your vocabulary (vocabulario) very easily because you are able to pronounce the words and naturally, you have to learn only the meaning (el significado). This should not be at all difficult because we have to do the same thing in our own English language. When we do not know the meaning of a word in English, we look it up in a dictionary. You will remember that a good dictionary is necessary and that a good dictionary will always give the irregular forms of the words of action or verbs. We are about to close our Short Course in Spanish. We have gone over the essential

forms and in our next lesson, which will be the last, we are going to have a general review.

Before we finish our course, however, I want to mention a form in the Spanish language that is not very common, but is used occasionally.

This form occurs when we use the English word "would". We have already studied part of it when we studied the conditional. It is somewhat of a conditional tense or form and the usage of it is in conditional sentences. It is ordinarily used in the past time. For example we might say in English "I would speak Spanish better, if I studied more". In Spanish we would say "Yo hablaría español mejor si estudiara más".

You may notice that "hablaría" is the conditional form and "estudiara" which goes with it is a past tense. So you have this construction every time that you have a condition expressed in the past time.

If we may illustrate with some sentences:

Yo iría (from "ir", to go) a San Antonio, si tuviera (from "tener", to have) tiempo.

Me gustaría hablar más español si pudiera (from "poder", to be able) hablar mejor.

Now we will have some "frases":

### Food For Freedom

New steps to increase the production of vital war foods in Dickens, Kent and King Counties was announced today by Roy L. McClung, Rural Supervisor of the Farm Security Administration, with the statement that the Farm Security Administration, had begun making loans under its extended "Food-for-Freedom" program on February 9th.

"To help meet the heavy new responsibilities which Pearl Harbor brought to the nation's food producers, FSA has completed plans for a rapid extension of its program, both among its present borrowers and to new groups of potential producers," Mr. McClung said.

FSA's first obligation under its new program, Mr. McClung explained, will be to the farm families now cooperating in the rural rehabilitation program in Texas. Increased food production goals will be set up with each FSA borrower family to boost the output of essential foodstuffs such as dairy and poultry products, pork and other meat, oil-producing crops and garden produce. Supplemental loan assistance will be available for production goods, repair of buildings and livestock shelters, seed, feed and cooperative facilities.

The new FSA program, however, extends beyond the borders of its present borrowers group to reach new and untapped sources of food production, Mr. McClung said.

"Every tenant, farm laborer, small owner-operator and part-time farmer who has sufficient acreage available to produce war foods will be eligible for a special loan to purchase a cow, hogs, chickens, garden tools, canning equipment, feed, seed, and many other food-producing facilities," Mr. McClung said.

Part-time farmers include those who derive only a portion of their income from agriculture, supplementing it with off-the-farm work.

The new FSA "Food-for-Freedom" loans may run as high as \$500.00 per family. Loans for livestock and equipment will be repayable over not more than five years, while loans for seed, feed, fertilizer and similar items will be repayable in one year, with inter-

### Victory Food Week

This week, March 17, is Food for Victory Week when Dickens County families should be getting garden plots plowed and prepared for planting, and should be getting poultry houses and equipment ready for baby chicks. Even though the weather is still quite cold, it is not too early to thoroughly clean and disinfect the brooder house that was left dirty last year, or to close up those cracks in the wall that cause a draft on the chicks. Then two days before the chicks are put in the house, the brooder should be started and regulated so that an even temperature of 95 to 98 degrees is held.

"And what would be more practical right now than a frame garden with green vegetables growing right on despite the cold," asks Fae Bass, County Home Demonstration Agent. One may be easily made from scrap lumber, with a cover made from muslin or cloth sacks, in as little space as 4 or 5 feet by 15 or 20 feet. A well constructed frame garden which is sufficiently fertilized and watered will produce abundantly all year. Vegetables especially adapted are those which mature quickly, such as lettuce, radishes, parsley, tendergreens, and others.

This year it is especially important that all the food which is produced be saved. One way of being sure to have equipment for canning is to get that equipment repaired at

est at 5 per cent.

"Financing of cooperative projects to undertake purchasing of seed, feed, equipment and other needed agricultural items and the development of marketing facilities and outlets also is included in the FSA expanded war program, the Supervisor said.

He explained that, since FSA is not in competition with private financial institutions, loans will be made only to farmers and stockmen who cannot get adequate credit from other sources.

FSA officials have worked out simplified application forms so that the new loans can be made quickly, easily and with a minimum of "paper work."

## CCC Camps Are Fewer

Private employment and the Army have caused camp after camp of the Civilian Conservation Corps to be closed in Texas. This program has now been changed to training for defense industries, war production, and conservation work which relates directly to building up our war strength. There are now only four camps in Texas left.

However, the work continues and Texas is being called upon to furnish 2,000 more boys for this work. Boys must be of ages of 17 to 22 1-2 years of age, of good character and unemployed. They are eligible for six months enlistment and may re-enlist and serve as long as 24 months. The local county welfare office accepts these enrollments. Boys who are needed in the Army or in agricultural work are not wanted in this program.

Boys who enroll in this work must agree to be sent to any camp in continental United States. All persons who enroll will be trained in some trade which will qualify them to cope with difficult work effectively.

Every eligible white and colored boy in Texas is needed for this work. Boys below the draft age can make a valuable contribution to the war cause by joining the CCC. The salary is \$30.00 per month. \$12.00 is paid in cash, \$8.00 placed in savings until the boy is discharged and \$10.00 is sent home if there be dependents. Otherwise \$18.00 is placed in a savings account until the boy is discharged.

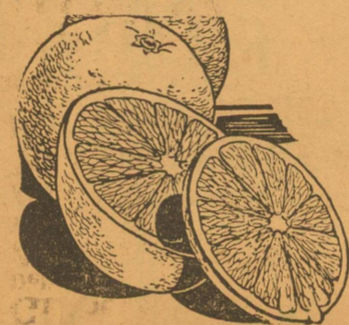

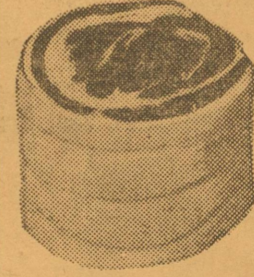
