The Black Experience. Wednesday is Martin Luther King Jr. Day - The 46th birthday anniversary of the man who led a movement which helped change the course of history. The apostle of non-violence and freedom, who lived by a noble dream of liberty for people — black, brown and white. A warmhearted and temperate man, he fought perpetually for the simple recognition of human dignity, and he maintained his convictions about the ultimate reconciliation of all men, color notwithstanding.

As Mahatma Gandhi challeng-ed the British Empire without a sword and won, Martin Luther King Jr. challenged the interraciat injustice of America without a gun. He had faith to believe that he would win the battle for social justice. Moral courage was both one of his noblest virtues and most potent weapons. Though pro-foundly committed to a program of emancipation for blacks, he had a love and a deep concern for all people. He drew no distinction between the high and the low, none between the rich and the poor. He believed especially that he was sent to champion the cause of the man furthest down.

Dr. King dreamed a dream of world brotherhood and unlike most of us he gave himself absolutely to work for the fulfillment of this inspired hope. As one bellringer put it: "In that lighthouse of hope, God lighted in him a torch of love."

Each year, thousands of com munities across the nation observe this special day with memorial services and pro-grams. Perhaps your church will want to honor the aged citizens in the community or your group conduct a voter registration drive or a clean community campaign. These are the kinds of things Dr. King wanted to be remembered for. And perhaps the best way to honor him on his birthday is to re-commit ourselves to the fullfillment of his dream by actively participating in activities which will carry forward his ideals and his work.



Americans, despite social upheavals, Watergate horrors and economic gloom, remain confident and upbeat about the basic worth of this country Perhaps the worst blot upon America has been the discrimination against blacks. Yet it now can be stated that more than half of all black Americans have entered the middle class, a stupendous achievement that has received little attention." (From Jack Anderson).

"And so Hank is dead." Thisis the substance of a message received recently over long distance telephone from a devout bellringer. "Hank" was a great football player and a handsome all-around a th lete when we were in college together back in the bleak and fearful thirties at Lane College in Jackson, Tenn. After graduation he went into the teaching profession and like his sainted father, entered the ministry in Memphis. Soon wider fields called and he gave up teaching to enter full time pastorate in Chicago. Then on to even larger fields of service, he was assigned to the pastorate of one of the C.M.E. Churches' largest: St. John in Detroit.

Post Of Honor His name: Walter H. Amos and after almost 20 years at John, he was elected to St. the highest post of honor the church could give him: that of bishop. He was assigned to the West Coast, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona area and served well for 12 years. He labored well, building ocautiful and modern church edifices where none had existed before and enlarging the Christian witness on several fronts. He told me once, "Bob, if I can live for four more years, I will be satisfied that perhaps my work is complete." I did not know what an old friend and schoolmate meant then. I am sure he did. He lived almost to the point of four more years. And now "Hank" is gone. Those of us who remain will miss him. And so will many others whose life he touched in so many ways. Why not a con-tribution in his memory to the American Cancer Society? Peace!

November, proposed on Wednesday an increase in the state gasoline tax from 8 to 18 cents. He said the proposal would save energy and could raise up to \$500 million to help close a budget gap that he says may run up to \$1 billion.

Vermont's Democratic Gov. Thomas P. Salmon, beginning his second two-year term, proposed expanding the state's 3 per cent sales tax to include hard liquor, cigarettes, tobacco and motor fuels. Beer, clothing and groceries would remain exempt from the tax.

#### **Budget Cut Promised**

Salmon said he expects state revenues to drop \$11 million by next year and said the wider sales tax - along with several other revenue-raising proposals - are needed to raise extra money.

He also promised to cut the state budget, saying he would ask for \$163 million for the upcoming fiscal year - a \$1 million decrease from the current budget.

Washington's Gov. Dan Evans, a Republican in the middle of his third term, urged an assortment of tax changes, including removing the 4.5 per cent sales tax from groceries and raising it to 5.5 per cent on all other taxable items. Evans estimated the sales tax plan

health experts generally agree that toothpaste containing fluoride reduces cavities, if used regularly. But after several decades of research, scientists are uncertain whether toothpastes without flouride have any advantage over a wet brush sprinkled with table salt or baking soda.

"If you're going to use a dentifrice, there is absolutely no reason it shouldn't be a fluoride dentifrice," said Dr. Stanley B. Heifetz of the National Institute of Dental Research.

It was 10 years ago that the American Dental Association's Council on Dental Therapeutics endorsed the first fluoride toothpaste to win the coveted council stamp of approval.

A second brand was accepted ia- 1969, and a third fluoride oothpaste now is under study by the council, dental association officials said.

As for nonfluoride toothpastes: "Brushing your teeth with toothpaste is pleasant, there's no doubt about that," said Dr. Herschel S. Horowitz, another National Institute of Dental Research public health dentist. "It tastes good. It's foamy. Your mouth tingles. It's definitely a part of our culture."

But the rigorous clinical trials that would prove other major advantages of toothpastes without fluoride - for example, controlling chronic bad breath - haven't been conducted, say Dr. Heifetz, Dr. Horowitz and others at the National Institute.







One thing the long-time Midlander is sure of is his allegiance. "I'd like to see Pittsburgh win for Art Rooney's sake. He's a great guy and did a lot of good. I would like to see him win just as a climax for all those years of waiting."

Potts, fresh out of Villanova in 1933, was one of the original Steelers, playing three seasons back in the days of the fabled Johnny Blood.

"Rooney won most of his money at Saratoga and until 1933 he had an all-star sandlot team in Pittsburgh. Many of the Steelers that first year were holdovers from the allstars. In fact, it was a little bit political. Harp Vaughn, the quarterback, is typical. He owned a night club in the Bedford Ave. area and controlled the votes in that section of Pittsburgh," said Bill.

Recalling those early days, Potts added, "After that Blood came in as quarterback and things changed for the better."

There was no draft in those days and "You signed a straight blue sheet contract with the standard 24-hour release clause," said Potts, "There was no protection in the event of injury."

Potts went on, "Rookies were paid \$75 per game and that was it. There were no negotiations. It wasn't until 1939 that Whizzer White (the Rhodes Scholar who made All-America at Colorado and is now a Supreme Court judge) initiated the first good contract. I think it was around \$25,000, plus a bonus for signing and protection if he was injured.

"However, Art was real good to his players. Once I lost a bunch of teeth and he took care of it," said Potts, who also suffered a broken back at Villanova. "When I recovered the back was stronger than ever."

The Steelers played in Forbes Field and when the team traveled, it was for three weeks at a time.

"We'd hit Detroit, Chicago and Green Bay on the western swing and then Boston, the Redskins played in Fenway Park then, New York and Brooklyn. In between we'd play teams like the Philadelphia Yellow Jackets and the Canton Bulldogs."

Potts, new 63, went on, "Our exhibition schedule usually consisted of playing some college all-star team on a slag mound at night in a mining town."

Potts played on a state championship high school football team in Greensburg in western Pennsylvania. He was then bundled off to Kiskee Prep with nine other players recruited by Carnegie Tech.

"That's the way they red-shirted a player in those days, but only one of us wound up at Carnegie Tech."

"Sure, I'd like to play today. I think the cash incentive in the playoffs is great. I think Commissioner Pete Rozelle has done a great job and he has the power to fight people who otherwise would dominate the game

While Potts feels he may have come along 40 years too soon, he prefers the old game where a player went all the way.

"I played halfback on offense and backed up the line on defense," said Potts, who at 235 pounds was one of the really big people in pro ball in those days.

"I but a stop watch on a defensive lineman during a tv game in which his team was getting beat by about 40 points and he logged just 17 minutes. The game today is a big business. Most

of the owners are in it as a tax writeoff. Green Bay is the only exception I know of." Potts pointed out that, "We had a small squad back then, just 23 players. You might start out as a back and wind up as a guard. "The ball was round and hard to throw if

Alabama Civil Defense Director C.J. Sullivan estimated that 50 persons were injured at Pell City and 12 at Ragland. He also said a twister was reported at Pelham south of Birmingham. High winds were reported at Lanett.

#### Mobile Homes Damaged

Near Fort Walton Beach, Fla., about 20 mobile homes were heavily damaged by another tornado, but no serious injuries were reported.

The tornadoes were spawned by a squall line which developed near the Louisiana-Texas border Friday morning and then moved rapidly eastward over Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and the Florida Panhandle

#### Sprawling System

The twisters were only part of a sprawling storm system that also triggered damaging winds and torrential rains in a sweep from the middle Mississippi Valley through the eastern Great Lakes. To the west, a blizzard pounded the northern Plains and all but isolated sections of eastern and central Nebraska and northwest Iowa.

Temperatures that hit the 50s and 60s over the Midwest on Friday were expected to plunge to zero or below there by Sunday morning.

Wind gusts of 50 to 60 miles per hour shook numerous areas from the Plains to the lower Great Lakes. Scattered damage and power outages were reported from northeastern Illinois to western Pennsylvania.



January is an ideal month to begin planning the backyard food garden to help save money on food bills. Plan a drip ir rigation system if you have 900 square feet or more. Plant the following vegetables indoors to produce transplants for early planting: Cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce. Plant them in seed flats and place in a south windowsill for transplanting later to growing flats. When the first set of true leaves appear (after the initial seed leaves) transplant single plant of cabbage or caulflower to Jiffy pots. With lettuce, transplant to a narrow growing tray of Peatlite or potting soil. Put pots or trays back on the window sill until Feb. 15 to March 1, for transplanting outdoors. For help in planning and growing the garden ask your county agent for the following publications: "Vegetable Planting Calendar for Southwest Texas," "Home Vegetable Garden: Row Width and Drip Irrigation."
