



## EPP Finals Pecos Area Oil Strike

Energy Producing Properties, Inc. of Midland has completed No. 1-Q Iowa Realty Trust as a Queen sand oil discovery in Pecos County, 24 miles northeast of Fort Stockton. The 24-hour pumping potential test produced 30 barrels of 24.5-gravity oil and 70 barrels of water, through perforations at 1,790-2,024 feet. The section had been acidized with 1,100 gallons and fractured with 10,000 gallons and 15,000 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 5,000-1.

It was drilled to 2,944 feet, and has 4 1/2-inch casing set on bottom. Top of the Queen sand was picked at 1,790 feet, underground elevation of 2,434 feet.

Well site is 1,650 feet from northeast and 2,310 feet from northwest lines of section 21, block 19, H&GN survey, surrounded by production in the Pecos Valley multiphase field.

## Pecos, Scurry Get Prospector Sites

Exploration has been planned in Pecos and Scurry counties. Texas Oil & Gas Corp. has staked site for No. 1 Virginia Crockett, a 3,600-foot wildcat in Pecos, 12 miles southeast of Imperial.

Drill site in 467 feet from northeast and northwest lines of section 94, block 10, H&GN survey, 1/4 mile west of the Katlynn (Clearfork and Tabb) oil field.

**Scurry Test**  
Bruce A. Wilbanks of Midland has filed application to re-enter and clean out to wildcat depth of 5,000 feet, at No. 1 Sears, Scurry County failure, 12 miles west of Snyder.

Originally drilled by J. E. Jones as No. 1-C Sears, it was plugged and abandoned in 1961 at 4,218 feet.

Location is 1,200 feet from north and 1,900 feet from east lines of section 261, block 97, H&TC survey, 1/4 mile northeast of the depleted one-well Log-Pat (Wichita-Albany) field, but separated by a 5,500-foot failure.

## Outposts Slated In Sutton Field

J. Cleo Thompson of Dallas has filed applications for permits to drill six outposts to the Ooma, Northeast (7,250-foot Canyon) gas field of Sutton County.

The projects have a projected depth of 6,000 feet, and are about 12 miles northeast of Ooma.

No. 4-A J. R. Bailey Estate, one-mile south of production, is 1,200 feet from north and west lines of section 8, block EF, GC&SF survey.

No. 3-A J. R. Bailey Estate, a one-mile east outpost, is 1,200 feet from north and west lines of section 6, block EF, GC&SF survey.

No. 5-A J. R. Bailey Estate, 1/2 mile south of the nearest well, spots 1,320 feet from north and east lines of section 19, block GH, GC&SF survey.

No. 1-A J. R. Bailey Estate, 1/2 mile east, is 1,320 feet from north and west lines of section 3, block EF, GC&SF survey.

No. 3-A J. R. Bailey Estate, a 1/2-mile south outpost, is 1,320 feet from north and west lines of section 6, block EF, GC&SF survey.

# June-In-January Menu Continues

Texas relished a touch of June-in-January weather across parts of the state again today, and it was generally mild in other sections.

Dry west winds sent thermometers soaring Sunday, and moist breezes from the south reinforced that trend today, also spreading clouds inland from the Gulf of Mexico. Overcast skies pushed as deep into the state as San Antonio, Austin and College Station in early afternoon and were expected to move farther toward the north. It was clear elsewhere.

Forecasters saw prospects for more normal temperatures by Tuesday. They looked for the latest cold front to push into western areas of the state tonight.

**Near 80 Today**  
In Midland, record high temperatures were predicted by the National Weather Service for the Tall City today. The mercury climbed to a high of 79 degrees Sunday and is expected to reach 80 today. The record temperature for a day in January here is 84 degrees.

## Senate Votes To Raise Lid For Retirees

**AUSTIN (AP)** — Senators voted overwhelmingly today to help retired people fight the cost-of-living squeeze. The Senate agreed 90-0 to lift a 6 per cent constitutional ceiling on the amount of a teacher's or state employee's salary that may go into a retirement plan. The new figure is 10 per cent, which would be matched by the state.

This proposed constitutional change will be voted on in a statewide election April 5. A related bill appropriating \$102 million for retired teachers and state employees was adopted 74 by a Senate committee. The Senate also voted 39-2 to (See SENATE Page 6A)

## First United Methodist Pastor Sets Retirement

Dr. Timothy Guthrie, pastor of the First United Methodist Church here, announced Sunday he would retire in May after 18 years of service.

Dr. Guthrie, who came to Midland in June 1957, has been an active minister since September 1981. He came to Midland from the First Methodist Church in Vernon and has served as minister in several other cities, including Dallas, Greenville and Cooper and Sweetwater, and other West Texas cities. Dr. Guthrie earned his undergraduate degree at McMurry College in Abilene and his graduate degree in theology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. Announcement of his retirement was made during the 11 a.m. service Sunday. Dr. Guthrie said he has no immediate plans at this time and will make a statement concerning his retirement at a later date. Dr. Guthrie is a member of the Downtown Rotary Club and active in other civic affairs.

## High Oil Prices Push Trade Deficit To Near-Record High

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Higher oil prices tumbled the nation's trade balance to the second biggest deficit on record last year, the Commerce Department reported today.

The department said December's seventh monthly deficit in the last eight months left the trade balance \$3.065 billion in the red for 1974. That was the biggest deficit since 1972's \$6.4 billion and the second biggest deficit on record. The December deficit was \$606 million.

The major factor in the poor trade showing for the United States was a threefold increase in its bill for imported oil.

The nation spent \$24.6 billion for imported petroleum products in 1974 compared to \$7.8 billion in 1973, prior to sharp increases implemented by the cartel of oil-exporting nations. The U.S. oil bill increased even though the quantity of petroleum imports dropped 3.4 percent last year to 2.23 billion barrels. The Commerce Department

said exports increased 2 percent over-all last year, but imports rose even faster — 3.5 percent.

Thus, the effect was to reverse 1973's \$1.3-billion trade surplus, the only trade surplus the nation has had in the last four years.

By another measure, the trade deficit in 1974 totaled \$5.8 billion. That figure was the trade balance figured on a balance of payments basis, which excludes military sales through

## South, Midwest Involved; Judge Enjoins Unions

A wildcat strike hit railroads in the Midwest and South today as shopcraft workers walked off the job, apparently protesting the lack of a contract.

The Burlington Northern, Chesapeake & Ohio and the Louisville & Nashville were the key targets of the walkout.

But within hours after the walkout began, a spokesman for the St. Paul-based Burlington system said operations began returning to normal after a federal judge issued a temporary injunction ordering four craft unions to end their wildcat strike against the railroad.

"Things are gradually getting squared away," a Burlington spokesman said. "I assume the craft unions will comply with the order."

### 6,250 Union Workers

Burlington has about 47,000 employees and the spokesman said the four craft unions represent 6,250 workers. Of that number, about 4,000 were said to be members of the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen.

Also affected by the walkout was the Louisville & Nashville Railroad and the Chessie System, consisting of the Chesapeake & Ohio and Baltimore & Ohio lines.

A Chessie spokesman said some 3,000 railroad workers were affected at C&O yards and offices in the Tri-State area of West Virginia, eastern Kentucky and southern Ohio. The C&O also was struck in Michigan.

The strike did not affect Chessie's Baltimore & Ohio division.

### Pickets Appear

Pickets also appeared at Louisville & Nashville yards in Atlanta, Mobile, Ala., and Nashville, Tenn., and Louisville, Ky.

No passenger trains appeared to be affected during the walkout.

Judge Joseph Sam Perry of U.S. District Court in Chicago issued a restraining order in Chicago at 4:45 a.m., CST, calling for an end to the Burlington Northern walkout.

### Hearing Feb. 3

The order is effective until 6 p.m. Feb. 5, and a hearing on the order was scheduled for 10 a.m. Feb. 3.

Picketing began at midnight by members of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Brotherhood of Railway Carmen, International Brotherhood of Boilermakers and Blacksmiths and International Brotherhood of Firemen and Oilers.

The reason for the walkouts were unclear, but major rail unions have been negotiating contracts with the nation's railroads in Washington. Burlington spokesmen said the national negotiations over wage increases apparently figured as a cause of the walkout.

## Levi Slated To Receive Senate Nod

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — All signs point to a prompt Senate confirmation of Edward H. Levi to be U.S. attorney general, a survey of key senators has disclosed.

Levi went before the Senate Judiciary Committee today for formal questioning after having met privately with many senators in the past month.

Levi, 63, an antitrust expert, has been president of the University of Chicago since 1968 and dean of its law school before that.

President Ford nominated him for the Cabinet post to replace William B. Saxbe, leaving after a little over a year as attorney general to become ambassador to India.

## Egypt's Sadat Seeks Arms In France

**PARIS (AP)** — President Anwar Sadat of Egypt arrived in Paris today seeking French weapons and diplomatic support in the Middle East conflict.

Sadat, on his first visit to a Western country since he became president in 1970, was greeted at Orly Airport by President Valery Giscard d'Estaing.

Sadat and Giscard d'Estaing conducted their first working session late today. The Egyptian president is accompanied by a high-powered delegation including War Production Minister Ahmed Kamal el-Badri.

## Secret IRS Unit Slated To Disband

**PHILADELPHIA (AP)** — A top secret Internal Revenue Service investigative unit that collected personal information on thousands of U.S. citizens has been ordered to disband immediately and destroy its confidential files, the Philadelphia Bulletin reported today.

In a copyright story from its Washington Bureau, the paper reported the existence of the Intelligence Gathering and Research Unit, known within the IRS as IGR.

The Bulletin quoted high government sources as saying the unit was set up "during the first Nixon administration and was in partial operation in 1972 before Mr. Nixon began his reelection campaign."

One of IGR's original leaders, and chief of its Miami bureau, the newspaper reported, was Tom Lopez, who has since been moved out of the unit.

"In 1971 and 1972 Lopez was in regular contact with John W. (See IRS Page 6A)

Sadat is seeking planes, tanks and guns from France to offset the refusal of his traditional supplier, the Soviet Union, to re-equip his arsenal. Arab sources here said he will also ask Giscard d'Estaing to consider a European diplomatic initiative in the quest for a settlement with Israel.

Sadat has said he still trusts Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, but Kissinger's peacemaking efforts must be speeded up. He has also said that Egypt will not go to war with Israel again unless Israel attacks first.

The airport greeting today took place about half a mile from where Arab terrorists twice tried to blow up Israeli airliners two weeks ago.

Sadat has said the attacks were meant to undermine his visit. He condemned terrorist raids and said their perpetrators should be brought to trial.

A few hours before Sadat's arrival, former Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban arrived for what the Israeli Embassy said

was a three-day private visit.

Sadat's visit to France is part of an effort to show the superpowers he has alternatives to reliance on either of them, Arab sources said.

"By repeating that the Russians have not given Egypt arms, he puts the onus on the Kremlin if anything happens," one source said. "And by trying to buy arms here, he is telling Moscow it had better hurry in satisfying his demands."

The Egyptians think Kissinger will put more pressure on Israel to make concessions if he feels that France and other European nations are likely to get into the peace-making act, the source added. The sources confirmed reports from Beirut that Sadat would ask the French for Mirage jet fighters and tanks. His shopping list is also believed to include missiles, radar systems and nuclear power plants. But the sources said they doubt an arms deal will be concluded during this visit.

In the Middle East, meanwhile: —President Hafez Assad of

Syria told a group of American businessmen visiting Damascus that he might agree to a demilitarized zone along the Golan Heights for a period of time, "but not if it is imposed on us."

—The Israeli state radio reported geological surveys indicate there may be as much as 7 billion barrels of oil under the West Bank of the Jordan River, which Israel took from Jordan in the 1967 war.

## Pretrial Hearing Set For Montoya

**AUSTIN (AP)** — A Feb. 5 pretrial hearing was set today for Rep. Greg Montoya, D-Elsa, charged with theft through mis-application of his legislative payroll.

The new hearing will be on a revised indictment of Montoya, which Dist. Atty. Bob Smith obtained last week from the Travis County grand jury. The new indictment wiped out today's scheduled trial of Montoya.

## Court Backs Abortion Ruling

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The lower court striking down a regulation adopted by a hospital in Massachusetts restricting abortions.

In other actions the court: — Called for oral arguments on a court-appointed-judge's report recommending federal dominion over rich oil reserves off the Atlantic Coast. The court will consider objections filed by coastal states to a recommendation that the federal government be given dominion over submerged lands more than three miles from shore.

— Struck down a U. S. District Court-ordered legislative reapportionment for the State of North Dakota which contained a 20 per cent variation in population between the most populous and least populous districts. The Supreme Court ordered the lower court to draw up a plan adhering more closely to population equality.

— Agreed to review the extension of federal overtime and other work regulations to non-supervisory state and city employees. (See ABORTION Page 6A)

## Eastland Denies Hunt 'Payoff' Story

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. James O. Eastland has branded as "totally false" a report that he received \$50,000 to \$60,000 to intervene with the Justice Department on behalf of Texas oil billionaire Nelson Bunker Hunt.

The report, contained in a syndicated column by Jack Anderson and Les Whitten, said Hunt and his brother, W. Herbert Hunt, were charged with hiring a private investigator, Patrick McCann, to wiretap some employees of their father, the late H. L. Hunt.

**Suspicious Of Father**  
The Hunt brothers allegedly sought the taps because they were suspicious that some people were influencing the senior Hunt to turn over control of the Hunt Oil Co. to his second wife's family.

After the Hunt brothers were indicted, they went to Eastland and took steps to get a parole for McCann, who already had been jailed on the wiretap charge, the Anderson column said.

**Asked Only 'Square Deal'**  
Eastland, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, acknowledges calling Richard Kleindienst, then deputy attorney general, about the case but says he asked nothing but "a square deal" for Hunt.

The Anderson column says Courtney Pace, Eastland's administrative assistant, also contacted the Parole Board about a parole for McCann.

According to the Anderson column, Jerry Partchen, an attorney in the case, has testified

before a Dallas grand jury that "Sen. Eastland received a \$50,000 to \$60,000 payoff" for his efforts on behalf of Hunt.

Pace, contacted by The Associated Press, declined to comment on the allegations. "I have nothing to say on the matter," he said.

Eastland was unavailable for comment. But, he was quoted by the Jackson, Miss. Clarion-Ledger as saying: "The implications and statements (in the Anderson column) are totally false. I have never taken a bribe from anyone, anytime or anywhere."

## Two South Viet Bombers Downed By Red Missiles

SAIGON (AP) — Two South Vietnamese A37 bombers were shot down today by North Vietnamese anti-aircraft missiles during a battle west of Saigon near the Cambodian frontier, the South Vietnamese command said.

A spokesman said one pilot was killed and the other rescued. In the ground fighting, a communiqué said 41 North Vietnamese and 6 government troops were killed and 29 government men were wounded.

The action, on the second anniversary of the signing of the cease-fire accord in Paris, was part of a 9-day-old counter-offensive by 2,000 South Vietnamese trying to block a North Vietnamese division threatening Kien Tuong province.

From Tay Ninh City, 55 miles northwest of Saigon, Associated Press photographer Huynh Cong Ut reported no substantial progress by forces trying to recapture Nui Ba Den mountain overlooking the city. South Vietnamese bombers continued attacks on enemy forces on the 3,200-foot mountain.

## President, Burger Attend 'Red Mass'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford and Chief Justice Warren E. Burger attended the annual Roman Catholic "Red Mass" invoking divine guidance in the administration of justice.

Accompanied by their wives, the President and Chief Justice heard Bishop James Rausch preach Sunday that abortion "directly attacks the right to survive." Bishop Rausch also said the continuing arms race is a threat to the survival of mankind.

## Oil Exporters Agree To Hold Talks With Consumer Nations

ALGIERS (AP) — The oil-exporting countries have agreed to a meeting with their customers or nations and plan a summit meeting of their own in four to six weeks to try to work out a unified position.

These decisions were announced Sunday at the end of a three-day meeting in Algiers of the oil, finance and foreign ministers of the 13 members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

A communiqué said the OPEC members "welcome the dialogue between the industrialized countries and the developing countries and are, in this spirit, prepared to participate in an international conference such as that proposed by the government of France which will deal with the problems of raw materials and development."

This indicated opposition to the American view that the conference should be confined to the oil crisis and that negotiations to ease it should not be complicated by discussion of other raw materials. But a member of the OPEC secretariat said the oil countries realized they cannot force subjects of discussion on the United States and the other industrialized countries.

The source said the communiqué "says what the OPEC countries would like to happen, not necessarily what they expect to happen. The essential thing is that we have accepted the principle of a dialogue with the importing countries."

The communiqué said the chiefs of state of the 13 nations will hold OPEC's first summit meeting between Feb. 21 and March 3 in Algiers to thrash out their position. Reports from Paris said a preliminary conference might be held in late March to draw up the agenda.

Planned points of departure are San Francisco; New Orleans; Helena, Mont.; Minneapolis-St. Paul; Oklahoma City; Carson City, Nev.; Atlanta; Lansing, Mich.; Augusta, Me.; Miami, and Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. Wagons from Hawaii and Alaska will be shipped to the West Coast to join the expedition.

Persons interested in joining the wagon train should contact the local Bicentennial Commission, Wilcox said.

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## Partially Paralyzed Grecian War Hero Going Home At Last

WASHINGTON (AP) — Partially paralyzed and almost unable to speak, Spyridon Moustaklis is going home, a Greek war hero returning to a country where one government decorated him for bravery and another government tortured him.

Moustaklis, 48, has just completed several weeks of medical treatments at Walter Reed Army Medical Center for the lingering effects of torture he suffered under the recently deposed military regime in Greece.

**Due In Athens Tuesday**  
"We must go home and continue working," said Christina Moustaklis, his wife, who is a dentist. They arrive in Athens on Tuesday.

At the mention of going home, Moustaklis smiled with the one side of his face that isn't paralyzed, and his deep blue eyes grew wide. "Natali," he said, obviously pleased at one of the few words he can still pronounce. Natali, the couple's only child, remained in Greece during her parents' trip here. She will be three on Wednesday.

**Displays Torture Scars**  
Asked how he was tortured, Moustaklis pulled back his shirt to show scars on his neck and shoulders, ugly reminders of the time he was burned with electric cattle prods. Asked if he would like to see his torturer punished, Moustaklis squirmed and made a motion with his hand. His wife said that meant, "Yes, machine-gunned to death."

The career military officer was left paralyzed on his right side and unable to speak when he was struck in the neck while in jail. He was arrested by the

Greek military police in May 1973, following a naval mutiny that was to have been a protest against the military regime. He said he had not participated in the protest.

The U.S. government aided that military regime, and there were signs both governments did not want Moustaklis to come here for medical help.

Mrs. Moustaklis said that day before they were to leave for Washington, they received telephone calls from the American Embassy in Athens and George Levidis, consul general of Greece in Washington. Both callers suggested they not make the trip, Mrs. Moustaklis said. She added she did not know why. A spokesman at the Greek Embassy said Levidis is in Greece and unavailable for comment.

"They knew his presence here was a bitter reminder of the strong association and support for the past seven years between brutal Greek military dictatorship and the U.S. Department of Defense," said Elias P. Demetracopoulos, a

former Greek journalist who led a campaign to have Moustaklis admitted to Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

Moustaklis was admitted to the hospital after a campaign by Greek exile leaders in the United States and several members of Congress.

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# Why Do So Few Remember Paul Muni?

CHICAGO — Who was Paul Muni, and how come so few remember him?

By the standards of distinguished directors like Howard Hawks and actresses like Bette Davis, Paul Muni was one of the finest, if not the finest, American actor of this century.

Who was Paul Muni? He ran the toughest mob in Chicago, discovered how to make milk safe to drink, heroically fought injustice in France, in Dayton, Tenn., and in Mexico; conquered Europe, wrote great symphonies and was one of the world's greatest woovers.

That is, he played, in order, Al Capone, Louis Pasteur, Emile Zola, Clarence Darrow, Juarez, Napoleon, Franz Schubert and Don Juan. Among many others.

Why, then, is he so little remembered, just seven years after his death, at age 72? In a recently published biography, "Actor, The Life and Times of Paul Muni," author Jerome Lawrence, co-author of "Inherit the Wind," which starred Muni on Broadway, wrote: "Was (is) the public's attitude toward Muni a classic example of America's actor sickness? We all crave heroes — presidents with charisma, sexy senators and governors, teachers, we can love, preachers we can turn into fathers.

"But mostly we want gods and goddesses on our stages, screens, and tv sets: idealizations of ourselves. If the face isn't a male collar ad or a female blonde Venus, then we want intellectual giants; mammoth IQs, instant answers, prefabricated philosophies, packaged religion, magic, fairy tales, Santa Claws, Superman.

"We idolize them; then we forget them." This fine, balanced book may or may not help to resurrect Muni, but at least it will bring him, for a time, from behind the backstage of late tv movies into a spotlight of sorts.

Muni was the consummate artist, according to Lawrence, who sat one night in a Chicago hotel room recently and spoke about his subject.

"I had hoped that this book would not only be a loving tribute to Muni the actor, but I wished it to be a kind of

textbook of acting," he said. Indeed, Lawrence dedicated the biography "To young learning actors: the Muni of tomorrow."

Lawrence gave an example of the depth of preparation which Muni brought to his performances. He recalled that Josephine Hutchinson, who played Pasteur's wife, had said, "that one of the mistakes young actors make today is to think they can go onstage or on

camera and do whatever comes into their minds. And it probably isn't as good as if they'd had a line or musical score in their heads beforehand. Muni prepared an entire symphony.

The bills for his research at the Los Angeles County Hospital were quite sizeable.

It was Muni's meticulous physical preparation which gave him his biggest break in the English-language theater, after spending years in the American

Yiddish theater, said Lawrence. When looking for the actor to play Al Capone in "Scarface," Howard Hawks thought of Muni. Hawks remembered seeing Muni in the Yiddish theater in a moving scene with his back to the audience, where he was such a purist he'd even made up his hands to fit the character, said Lawrence.

Hawks had a tough time convincing Muni to take the role. Muni felt that he couldn't play that kind of man because he wasn't that kind of person. Muni had, according to Lawrence, a deep integrity which attracted him to roles of people he could respect.

Hawks, however, appealed to Muni the actor, and said he could bring several dimensions to the Capone characterization. Muni did.

In later years, in 1942 after a Broadway performance of "Counselor-at-Law," Eleanor Roosevelt went backstage and told Muni, "In Great Britain, they give their finest actors knighthoods. In Japan, deserving artists are designated as national treasures. Here we have nothing to give you but our applause, and our affection and gratitude.

"But if I had the power, Mr. Muni, you would be declared an American knight and one

### Convict Eligible 38 Years Finally To Accept Parole

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Roman Olezniczak was content in prison so he stayed 38 years longer than he probably had to. Now, at the age of 75, Olezniczak wants to go home.

# Chinese Herbal Medicines Causing Serious Blood Ills

CHICAGO (AP) — Two California physicians report that certain Chinese herbal medicines, illegally imported into the United States, are causing a serious blood disease. In the Jan. 27 issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association, they describe four cases — including one which proved fatal — in which patients developed agranulocytosis after taking these herbal medicines. They say more cases can be expected. The authors, Drs. Curt A. Ries and Mervyn A. Sahud of the University of California at San Francisco, say the medicines originated in Hong Kong and Taiwan. The patients, middle-aged and elderly non-Chinese, took the medicines for relief of arthritis and back pains. They developed agranulocytosis and their white blood cell count quickly dropped. The disease is marked by high fever, prostration and ulceration of the mouth, vagina and rectum. The herbal medicines used by these patients were found to contain the drugs aminopyrine and phenylbutazone, anti-inflammatory pain-relieving agents that are known to cause agranulocytosis in some persons. Aminopyrine has been banned from over-the-counter sale in the United States since 1938 and no longer is used even in prescription drugs. But Ries and Sahud said there was no indication on the package that the offending drugs were part of the medication. The drugs are hard, round, brown or black pills and are packaged in brightly colored cardboard boxes. They are sold in Chinese stores and gift shops and in health food stores, the physicians said. Efforts by federal and state agencies to halt importation and sale have not been successful, and Ries and Sahud said additional cases of agranulocytosis can be expected.

## Lawyer Says Army Blew Murder Case

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Calif. (AP) — The attorney for Dr. Jeffrey R. MacDonald says his client has been charged again for the murders of his wife and daughters because the Army "let the real murderers get away." Bernard Segal of San Francisco said the government "has no new evidence and no new witnesses" against MacDonald. The former Green Beret, whose name was charged by the Army in 1970 with the murders, but the charges were dropped the same year after an investigation. A federal grand jury in Raleigh, N.C., indicted MacDonald last week. Segal charged that the case was reopened "simply because the Army refused to accept the results of the 1970 proceedings which said he (MacDonald) was not guilty." MacDonald was arrested here Friday. A removal hearing is set for Feb. 3 in U.S. District Court. MacDonald's pregnant wife and the couple's two daughters were stabbed to death in their home at Ft. Bragg, N.C., on Feb. 17, 1970. MacDonald has maintained that four young people broke into the home, knocked him unconscious and killed his family.

## Probers To Review Plane's Flight Tapes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal investigators plan to review flight tapes in an attempt to determine why a plane in Frederick W. Leveque, president and owner of several Columbus businesses, was flying so low that it struck a college radio tower. The twin-engine plane slammed into the tower and plunged onto the American University campus Saturday. Killed in the accident were

Edgar T. Wolfe Jr., 49, of Columbus, Ohio, board chairman of the Columbus Dispatch; Frederick W. Leveque, president and owner of several Columbus businesses; Carlton Dargusch Jr., a well known Columbus lawyer and pilot; Robert D. Hatem and Richard White, also of Columbus. President Ford sent a telegram to Wolfe's brother, John Walton Wolfe, saying, "Edgar Wolfe Jr. was an outstanding publisher and a patriot in the finest tradition of your great family. He will be long remembered as a man of achievement and dedication in the fields of commerce, communications and civic affairs." The President also sent personal letters to the families of Leveque and Dargusch. The plane was headed for National Airport, four miles to the south, when it struck the fog-shrouded tower, which rises about 765 feet above sea level. A Federal Aviation Administration spokesman said Saturday that the plane should have been at an altitude of 1,500 feet above sea level.

## Two Vehicles Slam Into Cow

One person was injured at 7:42 p.m. Sunday when two cars struck a cow a mile east of FM 715 on Interstate 20. Reported in good condition in Midland Memorial Hospital today was Pearl Smith of Big Spring, a passenger in a car driven by Mrs. Billie Jo Ramos of Midland. The Ramos car and a car driven by Billie Richard Neale of Dallas hit the cow. Department of Public Safety officer Jim Swain of Midland said the Ramos car hit the cow and then the Neale auto struck the dead animal.

## Jury Selection Under Way Today

Two juries from a 38-member panel were being selected today in Midland District Court for civil suits stemming from alleged injuries in vehicular mishaps. In the first case, Thomas H. Mitchell is seeking a \$30,000 judgment against Bill D. Powers and Steve Wayne Powers. Mitchell alleges he was injured in an Oct. 26, 1973, accident. In the other, Dorothea M. Allred is asking for \$50,000 in damages against Jon Percy Tate and Percy Q. Tate. Allred claims she was injured Nov. 2, 1972.

# Rocky Expects To Find CIA Violations

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller says he believes the commission he heads will find that the CIA violated its statutory authority by spying on American citizens and must determine who ordered the allegedly illegal operations. Rockefeller, the head of an eight-member commission investigating the CIA, said his panel's investigation will "go as far as any action leads us, to a Republican president, to a Democratic president or anybody else."

He said a chief question facing the commission is "have there been violations of or abuses of the statutes relating to the activities of the CIA in the United States... I think we are going to find the answer is yes." "And what we want to do is (find) where were they, how extensive, and who authorized it, and was this a direct presidential or attorney general order, and what were the reasons for it," Rockefeller said Sunday on CBS "Face the Nation."

The vice president voiced his belief on the eve of a Senate vote setting up a special committee to investigate the CIA, FBI and other U.S. intelligence agencies. Meanwhile, Rockefeller's commission resumed its investigation today with CIA Director William E. Colby returning for a second round of questioning.

turning for a second round of questioning. Colby was to be followed by Richard Ober, who once headed a counterintelligence unit which Colby has acknowledged kept files on 10,000 American citizens. Ober now is on the staff of the National Security Council and has refused all comment since his name was first mentioned more than a month ago in connection with domestic spying by the CIA.

The Senate committee being created today will conduct a more sweeping investigation of the intelligence community than Rockefeller's commission. It will investigate up to 60 government agencies which have intelligence functions, according to Sen. Howard H. Baker Jr., R-Tenn., who already has been named as one of five GOP members of the panel. The Senate committee will subpoena former President Richard M. Nixon, if necessary,

to get information about spying activities, Baker said. It also will dig through the archives of the late President Lyndon B. Johnson and the Johnson library to determine the "general relationship of the intelligence community with the White House," Baker said Sunday on ABC's "Issues and Answers." Baker said the Senate committee would be reluctant to subpoena Nixon, "who has fallen so far," but added, "Yes,"

the subpoena power could be used as an adjunct even with former President Nixon." Current plans call for the Senate committee's investigation to be concluded by September. As he left the tv studio Rockefeller pledged to make all of his committee's findings public. "And we'll put the whole report out. We'll make a report to the President and we'll release it to the public," he told newsmen.

# 'Slasher' Claims Seventh Victim

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "One thing we know for sure — he's stronger than the average city dweller. It takes a lot of strength to cut a man's throat," said Detective Capt. Al Hegge. Hegge heads a special "slasher squad" investigating the death of Samuel Suarez, apparently the seventh victim of the "Skid Row Slasher."

The body of Suarez, 40, his throat slit, was found Saturday in a hotel room. Police said he was killed in the same way as six other men since Dec. 1 in downtown Los Angeles. "We haven't established a concrete link between these killings, but there are so many similarities we figure they're all tied together," said Hegge. Like the other victims, Suarez lived alone. Many have been drifters with little money. Suarez had checked into the aging hotel only two days before his death.

Investigators are trying to put together a psychological and physiological profile "that will give us a definite picture of the killer that we can use to seek public help in finding him," Hegge said. The killings have given area residents the shivers. "It's frightening," a balding man said, "but I'm not going to move. It sounds too much like work." "I'm not going to move," an elderly woman added. "When I go to my room, I lock the door and nobody gets in."

The victims have all been men ranging in age from 40 to 58. All the killings have taken place on Wednesdays or on the weekend, authorities said.

# Youth, 16, Admits Killing Two Policemen In Ambush

OCONOMOWOC, Wis. (AP) — A 16-year-old youth has admitted shooting two police officers in an ambush Sunday, Waukesha County authorities said today. The youth signed a statement late Sunday confessing to the two killings as well as the Jan. 11 slaying of a Summit man and four recent burglaries, they added. Sheriff Edward O'Connor and Dist. Atty. Jerome Cahill said

there was no immediate reason for the ambush of the two policemen, who were members of the five-man rural township police force in the town of Summit. Cahill's office said the youth was scheduled to appear at a juvenile hearing today in Waukesha, where prosecutors would seek a waiver in order to charge him as an adult.

The bodies of patrolman Robert Atkins Jr., 26, and part-time patrolman Wayne Olson, 32, were discovered near their patrol car in Summit after police in nearby Oconomowoc were unable to raise the pair by radio. Authorities said rifle shots punctured the car's windshield while it was parked behind the town hall which also serves as Summit's police headquarters. Officials said the assailant apparently rode a bicycle to the scene and hid in evergreen shrubbery beside the building. The bodies of the policemen were found outside the car. Authorities said Olson, apparently shot while in the driver's seat.

U.S. aid programs. In 1972 the balance on that basis set a record deficit of \$6.9 billion. The nation's December trade performance was marked by a 1.7 per cent increase in imports, while exports slipped 3.7 per cent. The Commerce Department said the increased imports resulted primarily from larger purchases of iron and steel. Imports of coffee, iron ore, natural gas and footwear also increased, overcoming decreases in imports of petroleum, sugar and motor vehicles. The Commerce Department said export performance was eroded by sizable drops in exports of coal and wheat.

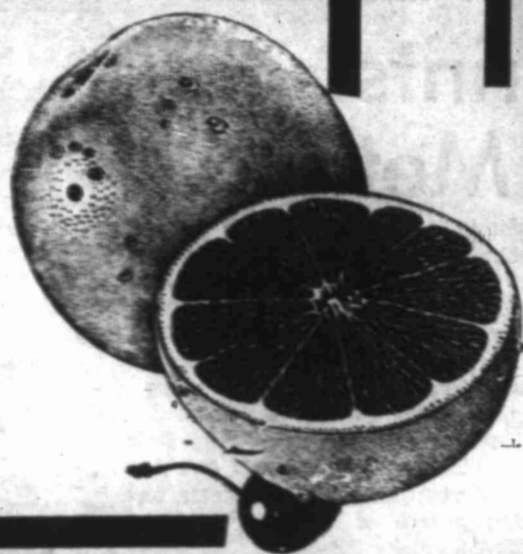

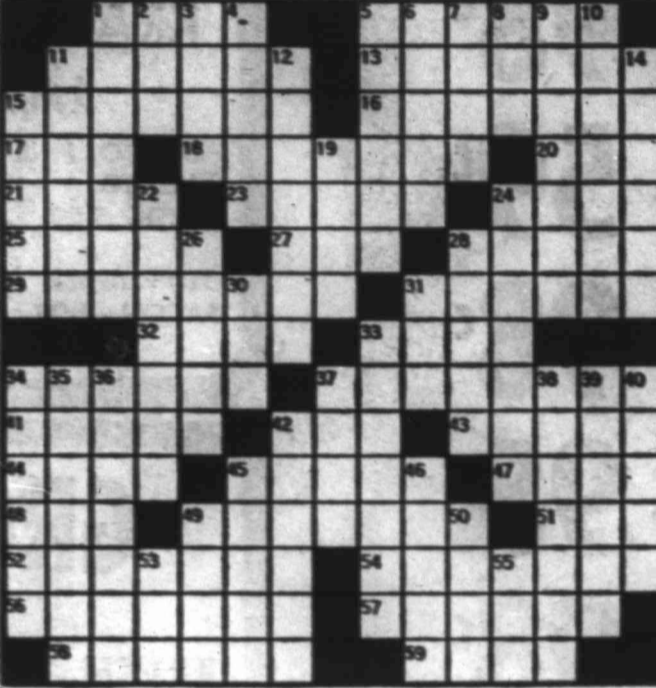

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The Washington Merry-Go-Round

WASHINGTON — Another coverup scandal, second only to Watergate and studded with many of the same celebrated names, is brewing behind the closed doors of a federal grand jury in Dallas.

It has most of the ingredients of the Watergate scandal, beginning with a bungled wiretap attempt. The wiretapper was caught on Jan. 16, 1974, and his trail led to oil billionaire Nelson Bunker Hunt.

Because the case has dragged on for five years and powerful people have intervened in Hunt's behalf, we began checking into the secret grand jury proceedings. We have spent several weeks interviewing witnesses in Washington and Texas.

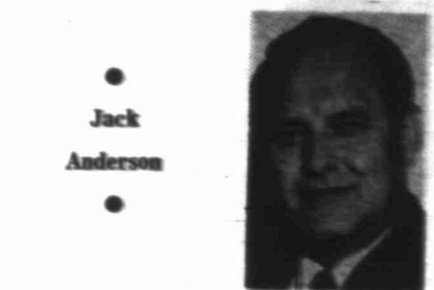
The most sensational charge is that the Senate's owlish, old president pro tempore, James Eastland, D-Miss., "received a \$50,000 to \$60,000 payoff" to intervene with the Justice Department in Hunt's behalf.

Eastland not only is the Senate's senior member; he is also chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, which gives him enormous power over the Justice Department.

Hunt came to him for help in the wiretap case. The senator called Richard Kleindienst, then the deputy attorney general. He, in turn, asked the head of the criminal division, Henry Petersen, about Hunt's involvement.

Petersen reported back to Kleindienst that both Bunker Hunt and his brother, Herbert, probably would be indicted. Kleindienst passed this information to Eastland, who notified Bunker Hunt.

After Eastland's inquiry, Justice stalled the case. But in 1973, the department realized the lid was about to blow and indicted the Hunt brothers.



A dangerous potential witness against them was the wiretapper, Patrick McCann, who already had been jailed on the wiretap charge. On Jan. 8, 1974, Hunt urged Eastland to inquire about the possibility of a parole for McCann.

"I have been told," the billionaire wrote, "it is not out of order for an inquiry to be made..."

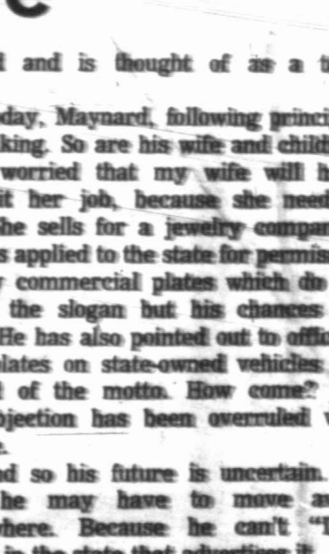
The Federal Parole Board, it happens, also comes under Eastland's sway as Senate Judiciary chairman. Not long after Hunt requested it, the senator's administrative assistant, Courtney Pace, contacted the board about a parole for McCann.

On Jan. 14, 1974, a "Dear Bunker" letter was mailed to Hunt, over Eastland's signature, advising him that the contact with the parole board had been made.

The evidence shows that McCann, meanwhile, had been told that Bunker Hunt had paid off Eastland to arrange the parole.

Massive Apathy!

An estimated 76 million persons stayed at home or "went fishing" instead of going to the polls last Nov. 5, date of the 1974 general election.

This represented 55 per cent of the record 141 million eligible voters.

This doesn't speak well for the United States of America, does it? In fact, it is bound to be downright disturbing to all those persons who believe in and work for good government.

The U.S. Census Bureau reports that four of five Americans between the ages of 18 and 21 did not go to the polls. Among all categories of voters, it is reported that only those approaching retirement age took the trouble, as a group, to vote.

In addition to the young people, minorities and women showed the least interest in the congressional elections and the selection of governors and local officials.

Many of the estimated 76 million who didn't vote said they either were uninterested or disliked politics in the post-Watergate era.

The preliminary Census Bureau report was based upon interviews of more than 100,000 eligible voters questioned two weeks after the election.

The report shows that not since 1958 has such a high proportion of eligible voters chosen not to express themselves at the polls.

That year, which was a recession year, only 43 per cent of the voters turned out.

And going on back to 1942, only 32 1/2 per cent of those eligible voted. That was the nation's lowest figure historically.

It is interesting to note that Larry Suter, who wrote the Census Bureau's report, said that of all the reasons given by people for not voting last November, Watergate appeared to be the overriding consideration.

It would seem that this would have worked just the opposite... causing Americans in record numbers to go to the polls. But the records show otherwise.

False Advertising In New Hampshire

CLAREMONT, N.H. (NEA) — Ever since New Hampshire changed its license plate slogan from a gentle "Scenic" to a boisterous "Live Free Or Die," George Maynard has stewed. Intently religious (Jehovah's Witness), he has felt the new motto anti-Christian in principle.

So, six months ago Maynard covered up that portion of his plates with masking tape. Kids occasionally would pull the tape off, forcing Maynard to eventually punch out the "Or Die" portion with a nail. Otherwise, he was content — until recently when he was stopped by the police and given an arrest summons for "defacing" the plate.

"That's when it began, Maynard says, "and it hasn't stopped."

Maynard admitted his guilt in court and because he could not, in conscience, pay a fine, his sentence was suspended.

Police, however, then extracted their own kind of retribution. "When I left the court I saw this officer confiscating my plates. He didn't ask permission, he didn't tell me why; he just did it. I asked him how I'd get home and he said it was my problem. He acted like I was some kind of loose."

Twenty miles from his living room, Maynard thus decided to make cardboard plates for the drive home. He didn't get far.

The local police radioed ahead for

the State Patrol. They stopped me, tore off my cardboard plates and gave me another summons. That officer, too, was unpleasant; I was made to feel almost un-American, if you know what I mean."

In fact, Maynard is hardly un-American. Not one of the "hippie freaks" the locals recount in disgust, Maynard, 42, is married, has two children, owns a home, and earns steady income from a printing job. "I don't have long hair, I don't live different from anyone. But, you know, in this state patriotism is everything. If you're even suspected of not loving the line the police can be very unfriendly."

He's right, the state is superpatriotic. Cops carry flag decals, flag pins and flag shoulder patches. One fellow in the state legislature has in years past introduced a bill requiring every able-bodied man to carry a rifle and 500 rounds of ammunition (Communists are coming).

As for the license plate motto, it was adopted to answer the national protests of the Vietnam war. Proponents said it reflected state thinking and should be an influence to people across the nation.

Not everybody here, however, feels that bluster is synonymous with love of country and so the license plate thing has had numerous detractors. Most critics think it's "inappropriate," others believe it offers an extremist viewpoint,

a few have refused to suffer it at all. Enter George Maynard. What it all boils down to, he says, is that "the motto is not only offensive, it's hypocritical. I'm certainly not living very free if I can't practice my religious beliefs."

His point seems valid. And though his battle is small beans in the present affairs of men, there are large questions involved. No doubt Maynard went too far in punching out a part of the motto, the masking tape would have sufficed. But given his religious objection, does he not have the right to protect his values? Even without the religious aspects of the equation, one wonders at the wisdom of a state forcing any citizen to advertise an unwanted slogan.

Maine's "Vacationland" is harmless enough, even New Jersey's "Garden State" slogan is, if phony, at least unoffensive — but "Live Free Or Die?" That's as foreign to some as if California would adopt "If It Feels Good, Do It."

More disturbing than this, though, in the Maynard case, is the inflexibility of the system which has made his life worrisome. The law is the law is the law. Early on, officials should have divined the idiosyncrasy of this kind of persecution and granted the perpetrator his simple desires. What's the harm? The man left the plate identification intact and did not alter its useful purpose. Yet, George Maynard now has a criminal

record and is thought of as a town look.

Today, Maynard, following principle, is walking. So are his wife and children. "I'm worried that my wife will have to quit her job, because she needs a car. She sells for a jewelry company."

He has applied to the state for permission to buy commercial plates which do not carry the slogan but his chances are slim. He has also pointed out to officials that plates on state-owned vehicles are devoid of the motto. How come? Yet the objection has been overruled with silence.

And so his future is uncertain. He says he may have to move away somewhere. Because he can't "Live Free" in the state that advertises it.

# Gas Blaze Resists Red Adair's Efforts

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Fire-fighter "Red" Adair's swift sword has failed to sever the head of a fire-belching gas well, so today he began slowly digging a tunnel to stab the monster in the belly.

It may take three more weeks to snuff the 125-foot-high flames that have burned for more than a week at a leaking natural gas well in the San Fernando Valley, officials said Sunday.

The legendary Adair whizzed in by private jet last Monday and has pumped tons of mud and heavy salt water at the blaze, which hardly flickered as it spat flames back.

A new approach started today as crews drilled a 7,000-foot tunnel from a nearby well into the burning one so they can pump more mud and salt water directly into the underground cavern. Southern California Gas Co. officials said the drilling will take about three weeks.

"The slant drilling approach has been a contingency for the past few days, but more expedient plans had to be tried first," said John Brady, the gas company's manager of transmission and storage.

A similar method was used by Adair to put out a 21-day natural gas fire at McDonald Island near Stockton last year, the gas company said.

About one million cubic feet of natural gas goes up in flames each day the fire continues. Officials estimated the wholesale cost of the gas is about \$500 daily.

# Two Fishermen Rescued After Drifting 15 Days

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Two Jamaican fishermen, rescued after spending 15 days in a small boat in the Caribbean Sea, were scheduled to be flown to their homes today.

Linal Brown, 22, and Hanval Hamapi, 23, discussed their experience Sunday night aboard the Norwegian ship Brevik.

The Brevik rescued the two fishermen four days ago and next docked at the Port of Houston.

**No Food Or Water**

"We waved to the ships but they just passed," Brown said. "They didn't think anything was wrong. But we had no food or water."

Brown and Hamapi set out from their home port of Rocky Point, Jamaica, the morning of Jan. 8, heading for the fishing grounds of Portland Rock in the Caribbean.

They carried enough water for 11 days in their 18-foot skiff although they planned to return home the next day.

"After we had finished fishing and were on our way home, our motor broke and we began to drift," Brown said.

They did not realize it at the time but they were trapped in a current which carried them westward toward the Yucatan Peninsula.

They were not worried at first because the boat was filled with fish and lobster.

However, as the days went by, they said, they began to become frightened and suffered from exposure.

West opened the six of hearts, and South tried dummy's jack. East covered with the queen and declarer had to ruff.

South led a club to dummy and tried a trump finesse. West won with the king of spades and led a second heart, forcing South to ruff again.

If South now drew both of East's remaining trumps, he would have only one left. Whenever he led diamonds, the defenders would win and lead a third heart to force out declarer's last trump. With all trumps gone, South would never win a diamond trick. The enemy's hearts would get him in the end.

## Doesn't Draw Trumps

To avoid this danger South didn't draw a second round of trumps. Instead, he led the queen of diamonds.

West won and led a third heart, forcing South to ruff for a third time. Declarer next led the jack of diamonds, knocking out East's ace.

Now dummy's seven of trumps earned its keep. East could not return a fourth heart, since dummy would ruff. South had been forced to ruff three times, but dummy's trump saved him from ruffing a fourth time.

No matter what the defenders might do, South could regain the lead and draw trumps to make sure of his game contract.

# World Bridge Tournery Cheating Charged Italy; U.S. Team May Pull Out

SOUTHAMPTON, Bermuda (AP) — The United States team was expected to withdraw from the world contract bridge tournament today in protest against the failure of the World Bridge Federation to expel two Italian players accused of cheating by using foot signals.

After discussing the charges by an American journalist and others against Gianfranco Facchini and Sergio Zucchelli for nearly eight hours, the federation's appeals committee announced the two Italians were "severely reprimanded for unnatural movements of their feet and touching their partner's feet."

**Match Postponed**

Allegations against the two Italians resulted in the postponement until this afternoon of the fifth round match between Italy and the United States. But the U.S. team announced earlier it would not play against a team that included Facchini and Zucchelli, and the Italian team said it would quit the tournament if the two players were suspended.

It was the second cheating scandal during a world tournament in 10 years. During the 1965 matches in Buenos Aires, Terence Reese and Boris Schapiro of the British team were accused of using finger signals. The British team, in a close race with the United States for second place, forfeited its games and ended up last. The bridge federation suspended Reese and Schapiro for three years.

**Probable Finalists**

Italy and the United States had been expected to be the finalists in the tournament this year.

Federation officials took extensive steps to prevent cheating this year. During bidding, each table is divided by screens so that no player can exchange illegal hand or facial signals with his partner.

However, Bruce Keidan, a newsman for the Philadelphia Inquirer, reported what he considered questionable foot movements by Facchini and Zucchelli at one table Friday night. Several officials of the federation then observed the two players.

Keidan reported that Zucchelli kept his feet in a fixed position under the table and that during the bidding period,

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# Oil Tariff Headed For Test In Court

BOSTON (AP) — President Ford's power to impose a \$3 per barrel tariff on imported oil headed for a court test today with eight Northeastern states and a group of New England utilities set to file suit in Washington to halt the tax.

Attorneys general or their assistants from 10 states gathered at the Massachusetts State House on Sunday to discuss the suit. Eight of the states agreed to join in filing the suit.

# Ford White House More Receptive To Scientists

NEW YORK (AP) — The White House under President Ford appears to be far more receptive to scientific advice than was the Nixon White House, says a panel of government experts that includes two former Nixon advisers.

There was a hostility to the scientific community in the White House of President Richard M. Nixon, says Clay T. Whitehead, former director of the White House Office of Telecommunications Policy.

"The Nixon White House perceived, and I think correctly, that the scientific community had political axes to grind that were different from the Nixon White House," Whitehead said.

The hostility that began under President Lyndon B. Johnson was allowed to "fester," Whitehead added, until Nixon moved the scientific advisory function to the National Science Foundation.

The role of science policy in a changing political environment was discussed today at the 11st annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Edward E. David Jr., former science adviser to Nixon, agreed there was "definitely a falling out between the engineering community and the President."

But David told a news conference he thinks "President Ford has made it very clear he felt the arrangements when he took over were not adequate."

"Science advice doesn't mean a damn thing unless somebody in the White House is receptive to it," Whitehead said.

While that receptivity was "lacking in the Nixon White House, the Ford White House wants it," he said.

The problem of reorganizing the national science advisory machinery has been assigned by Ford to Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller. Completion of the study, however, may be delayed by the Rockefeller committee's investigation of the Central Intelligence Agency.

# House Panel Studies Ford's Tax Proposal

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford's proposed \$16-billion tax cut is coming under more scrutiny from the House Ways and Means Committee amid new criticism of the anti-recession package.

The committee resumed hearings on the proposed tax cut today. The panel interrupted consideration of the proposal last week to vote out a bill that would force a 90-day postponement of Ford's \$3 levy on every barrel of imported oil.

The postponement will be difficult for Ford to veto since it is combined with a \$36 billion increase in the Treasury's borrowing authority. The full House is expected to vote on the measure either late this week or early next.

Meanwhile, Sen. Henry M. Jackson, who is expected to declare his candidacy next month for the Democratic presidential nomination, criticized Ford's tax rebate proposal, saying: "So when we talk about tax rebates and the figures show

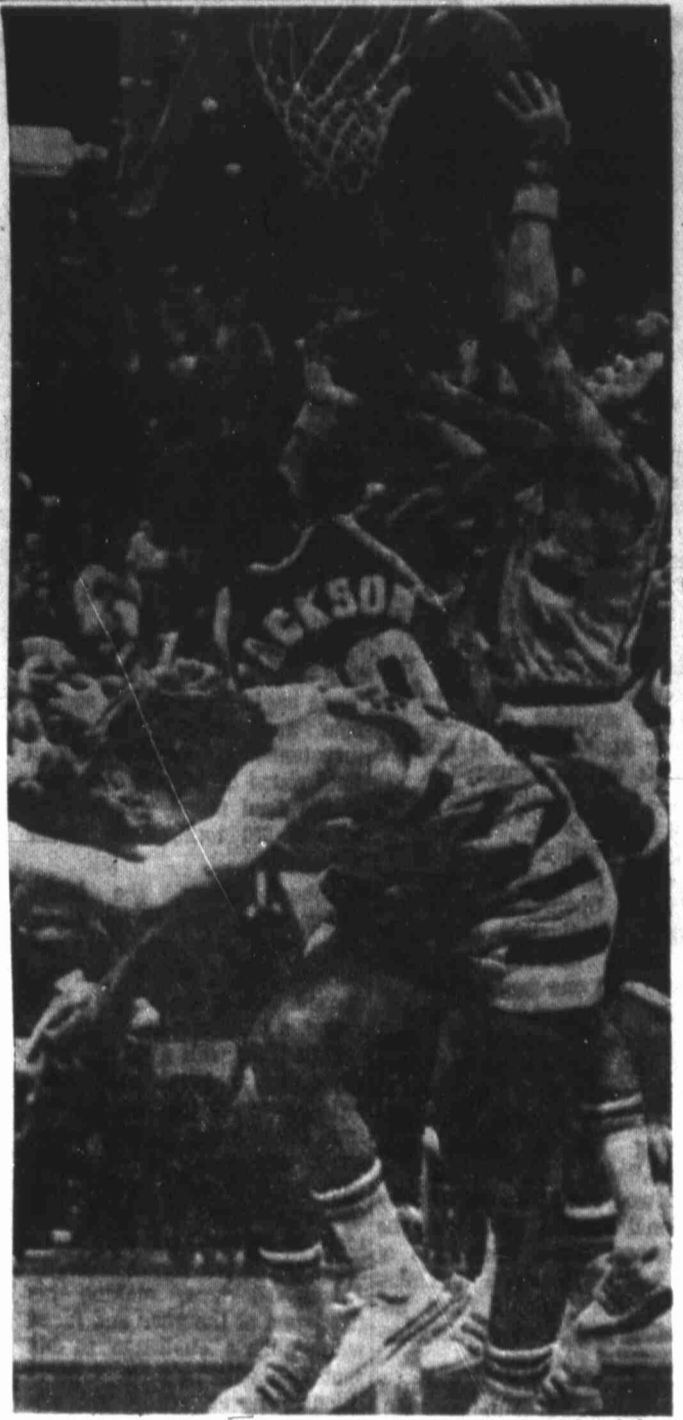

# Notre Dame Loves To Pick On Bruin Five

John Wooden was an All-American basketball player at Purdue and spent 11 years coaching high school and college ball in the Hoosier state before moving on to UCLA. He's even a charter member of the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame.  
So why do the local folks keep picking on him? Just over a year ago, Wooden's UCLA Bruins took their record 88-game winning streak into Notre Dame's sparkling Athletic and Convocation Center in South Bend, Ind. They were sailing smoothly towards victory No. 89 with a 70-59 lead in the closing minutes — and then Notre Dame scored the final 12 points of the game and pulled off a 71-70 upset.  
Saturday the Bruins returned to South Bend with a 14-1 record and a No. 4 ranking — and got beat once again, this time by an 84-78 count.  
"I played at Notre Dame as a player and coached here many times," said Wooden. "When I played at Notre Dame I had to fight for my life, just as we do when I come here as a coach."  
Meanwhile, second-rated Louisville was knocked from the unbeaten ranks, dropping a 69-59 decision at Bradley and leaving Indiana as the only major unbeaten team in the nation. The top-ranked Hoosiers boosted their season record to 18-0 with a 104-71 rout of Purdue.  
In a day of stunning upsets, three of the top four teams in the nation and four of the top ten went down to defeat. Third-ranked Maryland bowed to No.

14 North Carolina 69-66 — at Maryland, no less — and No. 8 Oregon was beaten by Oregon State 72-71 in overtime.  
In other games involving Top 20 teams, No. 5 North Carolina State whipped Wake Forest 106-80; No. 6 Alabama beat Georgia 92-68; No. 10 Arizona State defeated Wyoming 79-67; No. 11 Kentucky beat Florida 87-65; No. 13 Arizona edged Colorado State 85-82; No. 16 Providence lost to Penn 66-65; No. 17 Minnesota dropped a 53-44 decision to Iowa; No. 18 Kansas topped Oklahoma State 71-60; No. 19 Rutgers lost to Pitt 83-79 in overtime, and Auburn, tied with Purdue for No. 20, beat Louisiana State 87-78.  
"Adrian Dantley is a pretty good player," Wooden said of Notre Dame's sophomore forward, the nation's scoring leader who sank 33 points for the

Irish, who avenged a loss at UCLA earlier this season. "He deserves all the superlatives you write about him."  
The game was tight all the way, Notre Dame using a four-corner offense to preserve a slim lead in the final five minutes. The strategy worked. Dantley scored on drives through the wide-open lane and Billy Paterno clinched it with four free throws in the final minute.  
Phelps Happy  
"We had to beat someone good, and UCLA certainly is good," said a happy Notre Dame Coach Digger Phelps after the win. "We got our confidence back this week."  
Greg Smith scored 10 points in the final three minutes as Bradley handed Louisville its first loss after 13 triumphs. Bradley led 50-41 with 12:26 left in the game but fell behind
