





# House Panel Goes Along With Governor On State Aid For Pupil Transportation

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The House subcommittee on school finance continued work on the session's top issue today after making a \$61.1-million decision Monday to go along with Gov. Dolph Briscoe on increased state aid for pupil transportation.

The five subcommittee members also decided to write an ideal bill, phasing in some of its parts later if it exceeds the \$600 million limit imposed by Briscoe's no-new-taxes mandate.

It might be several days before the committee reaches its toughest problem—equalizing education expenditures. But the subject was kicked around at length Monday as some members of the panel expressed worry over possible increases in local school taxes in their districts.

"The main question this subcommittee has to ask itself is, 'If a district is not making an adequate effort, should the state continue pouring in more money before the poor districts have been brought back up?'" said Briscoe's education adviser, Dr. Rickard Hooker.

Briscoe's plan would require property-rich districts to use money now being spent as enrichment as part of their local share of an improved basic school program. Poor districts and the top seven big city districts would get heavy infusions of new state aid.

"To implement 1083 (Briscoe's bill) the only assurance they have is that they will get the same amount of state money they had last year. If they implement higher teacher salaries, they will have to raise more money locally," said Col. Lie Smith, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association.

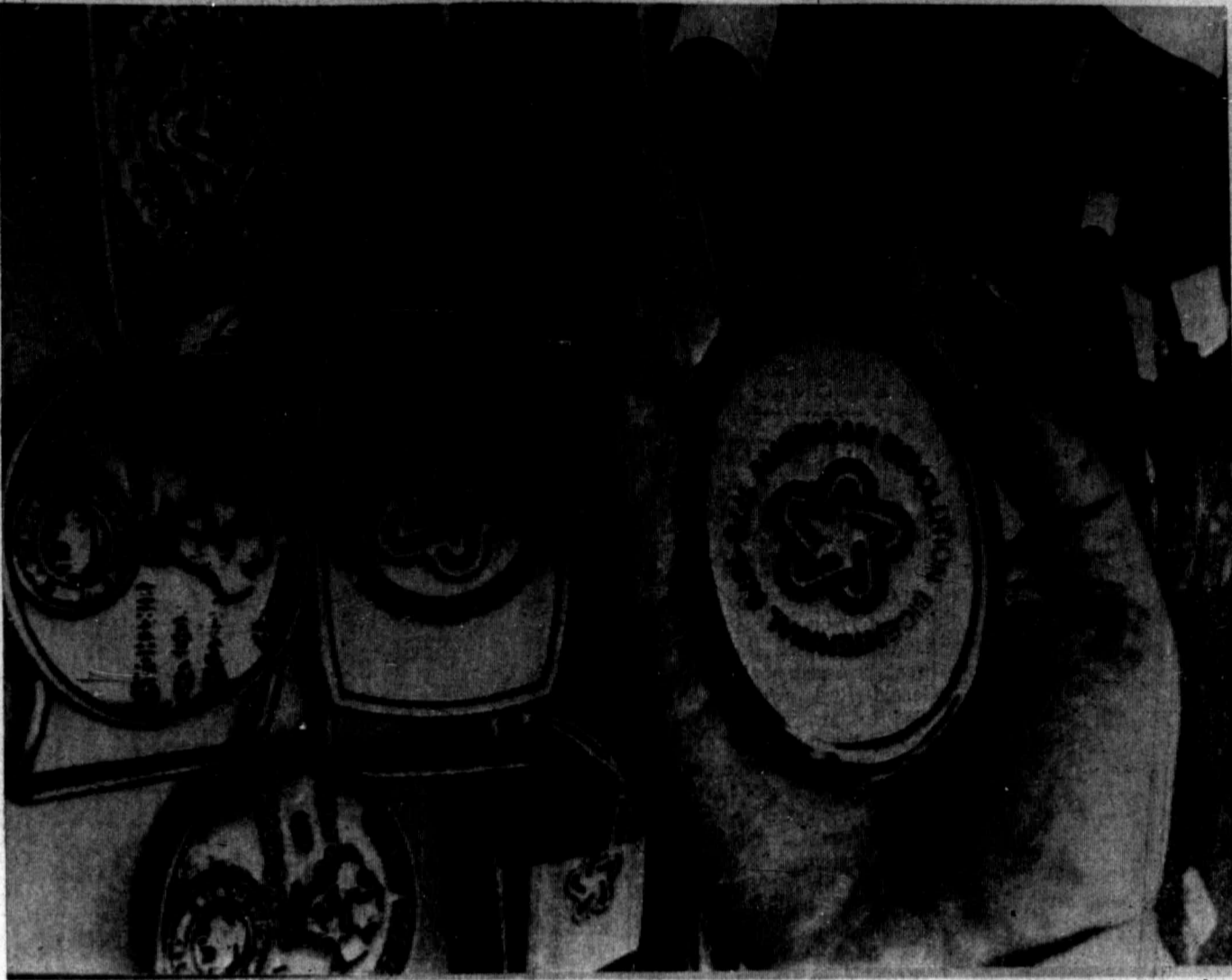
Figures prepared by the Texas Education Agency showed these cost increases in state aid and local fund requirements over the next two years for each of the five bills before the subcommittee:

- HB946 (TSTA bill)—State, \$2.1 billion, local, \$520 million.
- HB946 (Rep. Dan Kubiak, D-Rockdale)—State, \$1.8 billion, local, \$203 million.
- HB1083 (Briscoe)—State, \$600 million, local, \$1.3 billion.
- HB1126 (State Board of Education)—State, \$2.1 billion, local, \$208 million.
- HB1715 (Rep. Carlos Truan, D-Corpus Christi)—State, \$1.9 billion, local, \$1.2 billion.

Hooker's office began distributing to each legislator a set of figures showing the impact of the governor's bill on individual school districts.

The transportation section of Briscoe's bill changes funding from a cost per bus route basis to one based on the average number of pupils transported, along with distance traveled. It also includes \$13.5 million to keep bus fleets up to date.

Hooker made available preliminary estimates showing that each of the state's seven largest districts would receive more state funds while facing a reduced requirement for local tax money under Briscoe's plan.

## Cow Loses; Owner Wants Rematch

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. (AP) — Farmer John McAdams, who pitted his Black Angus cow, Brimmer, against the sophisticated instruments of the National Weather Service in an 80-day forecasting contest and lost, says he wants a rematch.

"This time of the year, it's pretty hard to predict rain or cold. It's a lot easier in the fall or winter, and that's what I'm going to ask for," McAdams said Monday night.

"I believe I'll ask for early fall, and four months instead of 80 days like this time," National Weather Service Houston meteorologist Irwin Bolbrecht lagged behind throughout the contest, at one point, by as much as 17 points. But Bolbrecht pulled through in the last three days and won it for the government 19-15.

McAdams and Bolbrecht originally locked horns in January, when the 66-year-old farmer said a cow with her tail in the wind or a hog buried up to its jowls in mud are better forecasters than all the government's gadgetry.

The pair agreed to forecast three times a week for the Huntsville area, 70 miles north of Houston. Each got a point for predicting the high or the low, three points for predicting rain correctly, but lost two points if no rain was predicted and it rained.

Huntsville utilities director Boyd Wilder tallied the votes. It all came to a crashing halt when Brimmer's barometricaly tuned south end was pointed in the wrong direction and failed to detect .05 inch of rain falling across town Monday.

McAdams said Brimmer doesn't realize she lost the forecast-off. "She couldn't. It was bad weather today and she had to stay inside." Nonetheless, McAdams is philosophical about the defeat.

"I came pretty close," he said, admitting the weather service's equipment is a lot more sensitive than Brimmer's south end.

"Yessir, they got a lot of equipment and it's all expensive. Cost a lot more than Brimmer did, that's for sure." He said the contest drew attention from people in 38 states.

Yet McAdams said he has only one regret.

"The only thing I would have like to do is get a little money out of it, like get on the Johnny Carson Show."

## Archer Parr Loses High Court Appeal

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Archer Parr has lost in an attempt to get the Texas Supreme Court to give him back his post as county judge of Duval County.

The high court Monday left standing a district court judge's order temporarily removing Parr from the bench.

The court also refused to hear appeals by the Duval County clerk and four members of the Benavides Independent School District.

Carrillo removed Parr on March 27 because, court records show, he had been convicted of a felony in federal court and also for "official misconduct."

Parr was accused of "receiving services from Duval County employees and illegal money payments" totaling \$460,000. He also took the Fifth Amendment in a suit by Duval County against Emilio Duvila, receiver of Archer Parr's and Jody Parr's estate.

Parr said in his petition to the high court that Carrillo exceeded his authority because the state law on removing of officeholders refers only to felony convictions in state courts, not federal courts.

He also said taking the Fifth Amendment could not be construed as official misconduct.

Without writing an opinion, the high court rejected Parr's plea for permission to file an application for writs of prohibition and mandamus.

It also turned down petitions by County Clerk Alberto Garcia and school trustees M. K. Bercau, Enrique Garcia, Luis Elizondo and Joe Garcia.

The clerk sought to prevent Carrillo from forcing him to accept the bond of Daniel Tobin Jr., who was appointed by Carrillo to fill Parr's post as county judge.

## Mrs. Westwood To Aid Sanford

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Jean Westwood, former national chairman of the Democratic party, has joined the staff of former North Carolina Gov. Terry Sanford, an unannounced candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination.

"I believe there is only one thing that will keep me from being elected president and that is not having enough money to run a good campaign," Wallace says in the form letters.

The letters, sent out by Wallace's national campaign office, make no mention of the Democratic party. Charles Snider, office director, said Monday the letters went to 300,000 previous contributors and 600,000 prospective contributors.

# Good News Shows Up At Supermarkets

There's good news at the grocery store. An Associated Press marketbasket survey shows prices declined on a wide variety of items during March, cutting supermarket bills by more than 2 per cent.

The decreases did not follow any particular pattern and they were offset, in part, by increases in the price of chopped chuck and eggs. But the declines do provide an indication that grocery prices may be leveling off and that this year's rate of increase will be below the cost spirals of 1973 and 1974.

The AP drew up a random list of 15 commonly purchased food and nonfood items, checked the price on March 1, 1975, at a supermarket in each of 13 cities and has rechecked at the start of each succeeding month. During March, the marketbasket bill declined in 11 cities, down an average of 3.2 per cent, and increased in two cities, up an average of six-tenths of a per cent. Overall, there was an average drop of 2.7 per cent.

The situation was an improvement over February, when the bill dropped in nine cities and rose in four, but the price of groceries was still much higher than last year. In the 12-months ended March 31, the marketbasket bill went up an average of 14.2 per cent. Over the 25-month period during which the AP has been checking prices, the bill went up 29.8 per cent.

Farmers have been getting less money for their products, but the decrease has not been fully reflected at the supermarket, mainly because the cost of the food itself is only a small factor in the overall price paid by the consumer. Higher costs for transportation, labor, fuel and other items have taken up much of the decrease.

In addition, the food processors and retailers are trying to make up for profit lost during the 1973 price freeze.

The decreases in the AP survey were led by sugar, which dropped in price in every city checked and was down an average of 15 per cent during the month. In four cities — Chicago, Dallas, Detroit and Los Angeles — the price of a five-pound sack of granulated sugar was below \$2 for the first time since last fall.

Beef prices, which have been declining recently because of abundant supplies, increased again, partly because of Easter sales that featured other meat items at the expense of things like hamburger.

The price of a pound of chopped chuck went up in seven cities during March, with increases ranging from 9 per cent in Miami to 40 per cent in Providence, R.I.

In contrast, pork chops, which have been going up in price, went down in six cities, despite smaller supplies of pork caused by production cutbacks on the part of farmers who say costs are too high for them to make a profit.

The items on the AP checklist were: chopped chuck, center cut pork chops, frozen orange juice concentrate, coffee, paper towels, butter, Grade-A medium white eggs, creamy peanut butter, laundry detergent, fabric softener, tomato sauce, chocolate chip cookies, milk, all-best frankfurters and granulated sugar.

The cities checked were: Albuquerque, N.M., Atlanta, Ga., Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Detroit, Los Angeles, Miami, New York, Philadelphia, Providence, Salt Lake City and Seattle.

## Saudis Plan No Changes In Policies

JEDDAH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Prince Saud, Saudi Arabia's new state minister for foreign affairs, says he does not foresee a change in foreign policy in the wake of the assassination of his father, King Faisal, nor any reduction in oil prices "unless new factors come into play."

"In real terms there has been a drastic reduction in the value of oil since the freezing of prices," the American-educated, 34-year-old prince said in an interview with three Western correspondents.

Basic Issues Unsolved

Saud was Oil Minister Ahmed Zaki Yamani's deputy until King Khaled moved him to the foreign ministry. He said that uncertainties and instability in the oil situation are due to the failure to resolve such basic international issues as inflation, transfer of technology from industrialized to developing nations, prices of raw materials including energy, and marketing of industrial products in the developing nations.

But Saud said he believed these issues would be resolved in the future meetings between the oil-consuming and oil-exporting nations.

"In terms of negotiations between the industrialized and developing nations, both sides are more equal now," he added.

Opposes Economic Threats

Asked his view of oil boycotts, he reiterated a statement by Crown Prince Fahd that they are not a basic policy of Saudi Arabia, which does not believe in threats, "economic or otherwise."

Saud also said he expects agreement very soon on the terms of Saudi Arabia's purchase of the 40 per cent of the Arabian American Oil Co. still held by four U.S. oil companies.

"There is nothing of consequence holding back the final settlement," he said.

Saud also confirmed that the new Saudi regime is faithful to his father's demand for the return of East Jerusalem and its holy places to the Arabs, one of the cardinal points of King Faisal's policy.

## Love Field Landing Fee Skyrockets

DALLAS (AP) — Starting today the charge for aircraft landing at Dallas Love Field is 55 cents per 1,000 pounds, an increase from a fee of 6 cents.

City councilmen approved the boost Monday after being informed it was acceptable to Southwest Airlines.

City Manager George Schrader had recommended earlier that the rate be raised to 97 cents per 1,000 pounds—proposal that Southwest Airlines President Lamar Muse asserted was simply another attempt to force a move by his operations to the new Dallas-Fort Worth Airport.

Southwest Airlines lawyer Herbert Kelleher estimated the new fee would cost the line \$320,000 more per year but said it was willing to pay that amount to stay at Love Field.

## Vet Offers Eye To Save Wife, Son From Vietnam

WATSONVILLE, Calif. (AP) — Randy Carson wants to sell an eye so he can get his wife and newborn son out of Vietnam.

"With the military situation over there, I want to get them out as soon as I can," Carson said in an interview Monday.

"I decided to try to sell an eye, because I don't know how else to raise the money. The only thing I've got is myself."

He has set no specific dollar amount for the eye he proposes to sell.

The 28-year-old unemployed veteran met and married his Vietnamese-born wife, Rose, a year ago while he was working as a civilian for Northrop Aircraft at Bien Hoa, near Saigon.

When Northrop laid him off last October, Carson returned to this farming community 75 miles south of San Francisco where he grew up.

"I figured I'd have a better chance of finding work here than in Saigon, but I've only gotten odd jobs," he said.

Rose, three months pregnant at the time, stayed behind, along with their 4-year-old adopted son, Kelly.

"They told us it might take several months to get the papers arranged for him to enter the United States," Carson said.

Late Sunday night, a friend in Saigon called and told Carson his wife had given birth to a healthy baby boy.

"I want to fly there and get my family out before it's too late," he said. "Some friends of mine have a house in Singapore where we could stay, and they say there's work there."

He said it would cost him \$1,000 round-trip to fly to Vietnam and he would need air fare for his family, plus money to speed the necessary paper work.

"I know from experience that a little money under the table can get things done a lot quicker in Saigon," Carson said.

He said he got the idea of selling an eye from news reports a few months ago about another Californian who made the same offer to pay for his wife's hospital bills.

Stanford University Medical Center information officer Spyros Andreopoulos said as far as he knew eyes never were bought or sold. He said hospitals normally accept corneas from donors who will them for removal after death.

## Ohio Deaths Pose Mystery For Officers

HAMILTON, Ohio (AP) — "You'd think someone would have attempted to make a break." Assistant Police Chief Gerald Rost said as officers tried to unravel the how and why of the murder of 11 members of the Ruppert family.

A 12th member of the family, James Ruppert, was charged with aggravated murder in the mass slaying at the two-story home of his mother, Charity Ruppert, during an Easter Sunday family gathering.

Most Shot In Head

Killed were Mrs. Ruppert, 65; another son, Leonard, 42; his wife, Alma, and their eight children, ranging in age from 3 to 17.

Police said 10 of the victims had been shot in the head; the 11th was killed by a bullet wound in the chest.

"There is a possibility that victims were picked off one by one as they came into the house," John Holcomb, Hamilton prosecutor, said Monday.

"It is a strange situation."

And Butler County Coroner Garret Boone said, "It's unlikely that 11 people would have been shot and killed unless they were held in some way or were in a position where none of them could escape."

No Sign Of Struggle

Police said there was no sign of struggle; only the bodies and spent cartridges from three pistols and a rifle found in the house where James Ruppert lived with his mother.

Police also said they could establish no motive.

"This kind of murder usually has as its motive something like sex, or greed, or jealousy," said Police Chief George McNally. "We can find none of those things here."

"Some of the aspects of the case just leave us puzzled."

They said James Ruppert, 40, has refused to talk about the case, and the unemployed draftsman remained silent at his arraignment Monday, when bond of \$200,000 was set.

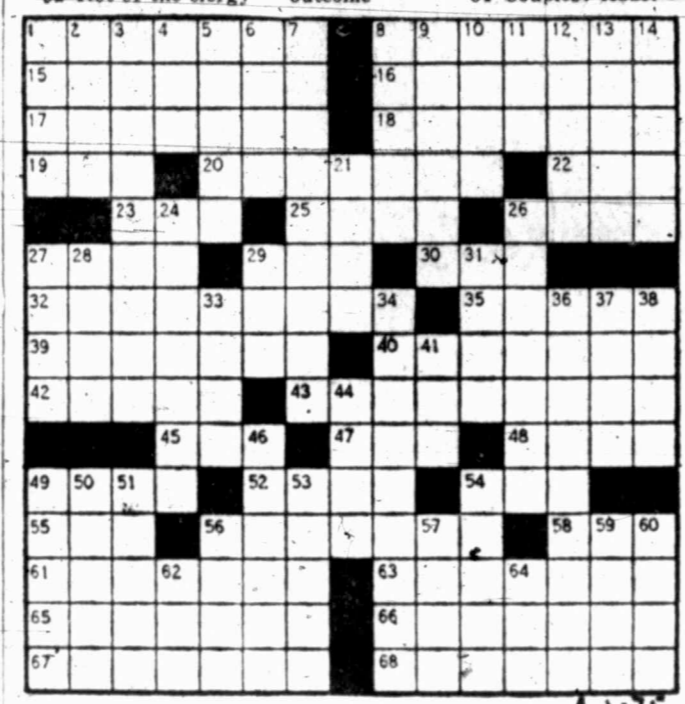

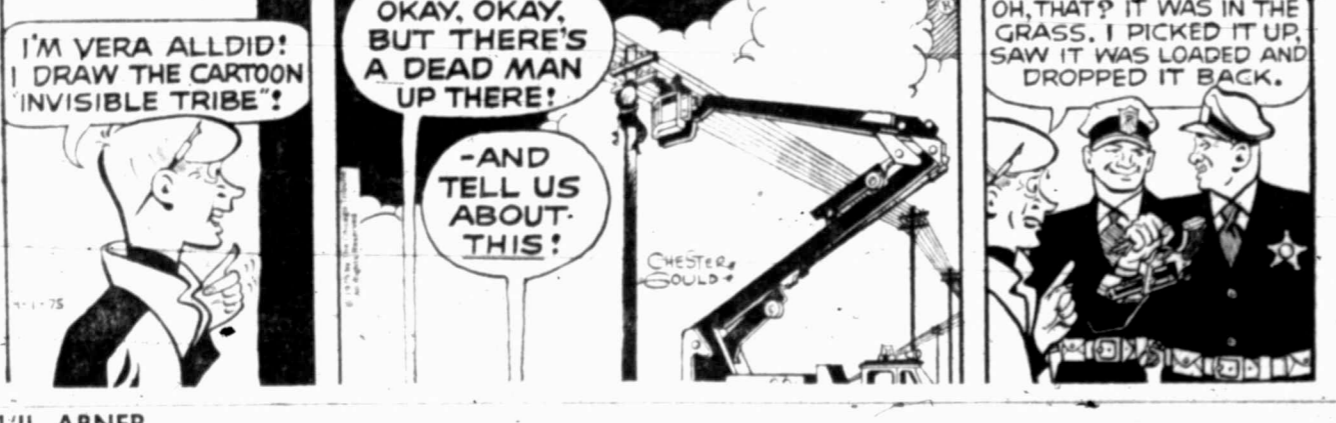

# Foes Of Utility Commission Grill Rate Expert At Hearing

By ROBERT HEARD  
AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — A utilities rate expert was grilled for nearly two hours Monday night by House members hostile to a bill that would establish a utilities commission in Texas.

The tone of the State Affairs Committee hearing was set early when Rep. Tom Uher, D-Bay City, committee chairman, questioned Dr. Jack Hopper for five minutes on his qualifications.

Hopper, who testified in support of a bill he helped write, holds a chemical engineering degree from Texas Tech and master's and doctor's degrees

in economics from The University of Texas at Austin. He served two years as staff economist for Brown and Root and has been in utility rate making for six years.

"I think this bill is fair, both to the consumers and to the utilities," Hopper said. "There's nothing punitive about this bill."

He was asked several times if he could guarantee lower rates if a commission is established. He said he couldn't, but it was his opinion that if Texas had created such a commission a year ago "a lot of cities would have lower rates today."

Texas ranks 35th on electricity rates when, because of lower fuel costs, it should rank 7th or 8th, he said.

Texas utilities make more money and, in some cases, charge higher rates than the national average, he said.

Colorado and Mississippi utilities have greater costs, yet charge lower rates than Texas, he said.

Uher asked Hopper if it wasn't true that a new Texas commission would have to go out of state to find experts to hire. Hopper said yes.

"We're going to have a lot of foreigners directing Texas Utilities," Uher said.

"There are a lot of Texans out there who want to come back, just as I did," said Hopper, who worked for a time in Kentucky.

Rep. Richard Geiger, D-Dal-

## Surtran Fare May Increase

FORT WORTH (AP) — City council members said Monday they prefer an increase in the fare for riding Surtran buses between the downtown district here and the Dallas-Fort Worth Airport to a reduction in service.

They agreed that the bus system, which has lost \$225,000 so far this year, cannot continue to operate in the red.

City Manager Rodger Line said the city could raise the fare, curtail service or arrange for Fort Worth to take over Surtran routes from the central business district to the airport.

Councilmen suggest the fare be increased from \$2.50 to \$3.

## Widow Dies Of Malnutrition Despite Huge Hoard Of Cash

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Bertha Adams was 71 and alone. For some reason she refused to spend any of her \$800,000 in cash on food for herself and died of malnutrition after wasting away to 50 pounds, officials say.

The cash and hundreds of valuable stock certificates were found in safe-deposit boxes two days before her death Sunday in a hospital, Mrs. Adams' court-appointed attorney said Monday.

"I continue to be flabbergasted," said attorney Robert M. Liete. "It's hard to get over seeing that much money."

Twenty-five-year neighbors of the twice-married, reclusive widow, once a schoolteacher, were also flabbergasted.

"We had no indication that the woman had a dime," said one, Russell Blair. "Her house looked like a pigpen and she got what clothes she had from the Salvation Army."

"She was starving to death and yet she wouldn't spend any money to get something to eat."

Blair said neighbors used to take food to her. They reported her condition to state social workers early in March.

She weighed 50 pounds when taken from her home. A probate judge ruled her incompetent because of senility. He named Liete as her guardian.

She was first put in a nursing home, then transferred to the hospital where she died.

"Mrs. Adams was certainly in a pitiful condition," Liete said, adding that an initial check of her home revealed nothing to indicate that she was anything but a "victim of need."

"I examined Mrs. Adams' papers as a normal procedure," he continued. "I found a safe-deposit box key and the numbers of two boxes."

An examination Friday at one bank revealed \$600,000 in cash. A box at a different bank, examined the same day, contained \$199,581.50 in cash, he said.

Inside the second were hundreds of stock certificates, including 740 shares of International Telephone and Telegraph, 139 shares of International Paper Co., 103 shares American Hoist and Derrick and 100 shares of Pancoastal Petroleum Co. Total value of the stock was not immediately made known.

## Rockefeller Panel Probe Extended For Two Months

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Rockefeller Commission has been given a two-month deadline extension for its investigation of alleged improprieties by the Central Intelligence Agency.

Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller, chairman of the panel, said the new deadline of June 6 "is one that will be met." President Ford extended the investigation beyond its April 4 reporting date by an executive order.

In its 12th weekly session, the commission took testimony Monday from a panel of academic experts in the field of individual privacy, apparently in an effort to draft recommendations to prevent future domestic wrongdoings by the CIA.

The scholars were unanimous in favoring creation of a public code of ethics governing intelligence gathering, said Prof. Edward J. Bloustein, president of Rutgers University.

## U.S. Businesses In South Vietnam Now Operating On Day-To-Day Basis

By JOSH FITZHUGH  
NEW YORK (AP) — Many American businessmen in South Vietnam are working on a day-to-day basis amid the worsening political and military situation, their home offices report. Few if any businessmen have left Saigon, where the American-owned companies are based, although some dependents have been evacuated. For the most part the Vietnamese subsidiaries are staffed with nationals. Only a few American managers remain. Exxon Corp. and Caltex Petroleum Co. are among the firms that have remained in the country, said a spokesman. "We're monitoring the situation," he said. "We have no plans to evacuate or to close our office. Nevertheless, things are serious."

## Fischer In Trouble

NEW YORK (AP) — World chess champion Bobby Fischer, 31, has failed to respond to the refusal by FIDE (Federation International des Echecs) to accept the champion's demand that the match be scheduled to begin in Manila June 1. The winner would collect \$3,175,000 and the loser, \$1,825,000. Fischer's other principal condition, that the match should have an unlimited number of games instead of 36, apparently was approved by delegates from 70 of the 89 nations represented in FIDE. "It is tragic for Fischer, for chess in the world, and for Karpov," Edmundson said Monday night. "Poor Fischer won't have his title; Karpov will have a 'paper' title, and the world won't have its match. We're all losers."

# Jury Selection Starts For Connally Trial

WASHINGTON (AP) — The painstaking process of picking a jury began today for the trial of John B. Connally, charged with accepting \$10,000 in bribes while he was former President Richard M. Nixon's secretary of the Treasury. "This is a criminal case," assistant special prosecutor Frank M. Tuerkheimer said. "We are about to begin trial on two cases in which John Connally, in violation of law, is alleged to have received two \$5,000 payments."

## Judge Permits Two SLA Members To Skip Court

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Two Symbionese Liberation Army members say they have been beaten, drugged and threatened, and they don't want to be in court for their murder trial. As jury selection began Monday, Joseph Remiro and Russell Little were granted their request not to be present. The judge allowed them to sit in separate holding cells in the basement of the Sacramento County Courthouse, watching on closed-circuit television. The defendants are charged with murdering Oakland schools chief Marcus Foster in November 1973. Their statements were contained in a petition to Superior Court Judge Elvin Sheehy, who said they would be brought into court whenever necessary — for example, for identification by a witness.

## Korff Says Opinion Pendulum Reversing

DALLAS (AP) — One of President Richard Nixon's strongest defenders says the pendulum of public opinion is swinging back in Nixon's favor as the public begins to put Watergate into perspective. "Watergate was wrong, but there were hundreds of Watergates which were taken for granted in the preceding administration under the guise of national security," said Rabbi Baruch Korff. He said reports now have revealed tapings, such as of Martin Luther King's telephone and that of a deputy director to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, during the administration of the late President Lyndon B. Johnson. "I look upon the presidency as a chain with each president as a link in that chain. I felt it was wrong to judge each link independent of the others in the chain of the presidency," Korff said in an interview Monday. He said, "Our constitutional fathers did not spell out the duties and functions of the president. America is now getting the views of the other links," Korff added.

Frank M. Tuerkheimer said Tuerkheimer asking them questions as a group. The 58-year-old Connally watched intently as the jury pool filed into the courtroom. Beside him was his attorney, Edward Bennett Williams, a noted trial lawyer. In the front row, inside the court rail, sat Connally's wife, Nelle, and an old friend Thomas "Tommy the Cork" Corcoran. Connally, who served as governor of Texas three times in 1962-1968, declined comment as he arrived at the courthouse 15 minutes before the beginning of the trial. Proceedings were expected to take three weeks, and the jury will not be sequestered. Tuerkheimer told the jury pool the reason for the questioning was to learn more about each individual. "We don't mean to pry but to try to elicit facts," he said. Then he asked whether any of the members of the pool of members of their families knew anyone in the prosecutor's office or had any contacts with lawyers in the case. There was no response.

### Women Dominate

The prospective jurors reflected Washington's predominantly black population. Women by far outnumbered men. After the questioning, the prospective jurors who had not been disqualified for reasons such as inability to serve three weeks or more on the jury were to be taken individually before the judge and lawyers for more detailed interrogation in private. Each jury prospect was to be asked about knowledge of the case, possible preconceptions of guilt or innocence, and personal circumstances that might make jury duty burdensome. The government alleges that Connally accepted two \$5,000 payments from Associated Milk Producers, Inc., the nation's largest dairy cooperative, after he urged Nixon to raise milk price supports in 1971.

### He's Second

Connally is the fourth member of Nixon's Cabinet to face criminal charges. He is only the second Cabinet member in American history to be charged with taking a bribe. The first, Interior Secretary Albert B. Fall, was convicted in the Teapot Dome scandal of the 1920s. Connally, a former Texas governor, was widely regarded until his indictment as a likely 1976 presidential candidate. He was a protégé of Lyndon B. Johnson in the late 1930s and was a Senate aide to Johnson. President John F. Kennedy named him secretary of the Navy in 1961. Soon after, he ran for his first term as governor and was riding with Kennedy when the President was assassinated in Dallas in 1963. Connally was wounded by gunfire at the time. After leaving the governor's office in 1969 Connally joined

prestigious Houston law firm, then accepted Nixon's offer to become Treasury secretary. He resigned in May 1972 and officially became a Republican a year later, while Nixon was deeply embroiled in the Watergate scandal. The government's chief witness against him is expected to be Jake Jacobsen, a Connally friend of more than two decades, who told prosecutors he gave Connally the money in two cash payments in Connally's Treasury Department office. Jacobsen was performing legal work for Associated Milk Producers at the time. He has pleaded guilty to bribing a federal official and awaits sentencing. If convicted on two counts of accepting illegal gratuities, Connally could be sentenced to a maximum of four years in prison and \$20,000 fine.

## Convictions Of Muslims Overturned In Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The convictions of nine Black Muslims for inciting a riot in which five persons died have been overturned by the Louisiana Supreme Court. In a 4-3 decision Monday, the court said the defendants should have been allowed to present evidence in support of their argument that they could not receive a fair trial in Baton Rouge. The defendants were entitled to a change of venue if they could show—even though it would be possible to select a jury whose members were not subject to a challenge for cause—that there were influences in the community which would affect the answers of jurors or the testimony of witnesses at the trial, or that, for any other reason, a fair and impartial trial could not be obtained in the parish. The defendants were Robert Barber, Clennon Brown, Ronald Crawford, Toussaint L. Hale, Daniel McKinney and James McMath, all of Chicago; John Devine and Lawrence Brooks, Vallejo, Calif.; and John Bell, Philadelphia. Each was sentenced to 21 years at hard labor.

## Daley Due To Win Easy Victory Today

CHICAGO (AP) — Richard J. Daley barely campaigned for re-election, but he is expected to win another four-year term easily today as Chicago voters choose a mayor. Daley told newsmen Monday night he expected to win by a substantial margin. He was a 58 per cent winner over three challengers in the Feb. 28 Democratic primary. The expected general election victory today will solidify Daley's comeback as a major factor in the Democratic party nationally after his ouster from the 1972 National Convention in a credentials fight. It also will mean an unprecedented sixth term for the 72-year-old Daley, who has ruled a city of patronage workers from the mayor's chair for 20 years. His opponents today are Republican John Hoellen, defeated Feb. 28 for re-election as an alderman, and Socialist Workers candidate Willie Mae Reid. Neither was conceded a chance of defeating Daley. The last Republican mayor was elected in 1928. Hoellen was the only remaining Republican in the 50-member City Council. There was a chance the GOP could hang onto one seat by winning a runoff today in another ward. ## Arkansan Charged At Los Angeles In 1971 Shooting

LOS ANGELES (AP)—An Arkansas transient who walked into a police station seeking mental care has been charged with the Oct. 2, 1971, shooting of a man who was living in a home once owned by actress Elizabeth Taylor.

Reuben Henry Hawkins Jr., 28, was arrested March 15 after telling officers that he needed psychiatric help and that he had committed the 1971 shooting and three robberies in the area, police said Monday.

The victim of the shooting, A. Duane Lee, 50, was wounded seriously but later recovered.

Hawkins told police he believed he was the son of Miss Taylor and he was looking for her to kill her when Lee told him to get off the property.

Authorities said Hawkins spent a year and one-half in a mental institution in connection with a robbery of a liquor store in Lubbock, Tex., three days after the shooting here. Shell casings found at the robbery scene matched one found at the shooting here, authorities said. A preliminary hearing is set for Wednesday.

## Satanists Blamed In Church Burning

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Satanists are being blamed for a fire which heavily damaged the Sun Valley Southern Baptist Church.

The fire did an estimated \$9,000 damage Saturday although it was quickly brought under control.

The church's pastor, the Rev. J. W. Peters, said a desecrated Bible found inside the church indicated the fire might have been the results of a satanic ritual.

He said the violation of a church on the eve of a holy day is a common practice of satan worshippers.

The Bible had been placed atop a communion table, opened and set afire.

The congregation held Easter services in a building behind the burned church.

"Why should I give you a problem?" my father asked. "I'm older, and I know what's best. I tell you only what you need to know."

I didn't agree with him then, but I was just a rebellious boy. Today I know that you sometimes get these hands and have to conceal the truth.

# Developing Storm Pounds At Midwest

A developing storm dumped heavy snow into the central Rockies today, and a fresh thrust of arctic cold plunged temperatures below zero over the northern Plains.

April began on a more tranquil note along the Pacific Coast and from the Mississippi Valley to the Atlantic, with clear skies widespread and temperatures generally above freezing.

Snow fell from northern Arizona and Utah across Colorado and Wyoming into Nebraska. Six inches piled into Denver during the night and accumulated at an inch an hour there and at points in western Nebraska and Wyoming. Bryce Canyon, Utah, collected 5 inches.

Advisories and warnings to travelers and stockmen posted from Arizona through Wyoming and into Nebraska. Wind-churned dust lowered visibilities in the central valleys and deserts of California. Gusts to 50 miles per hour buffeted Bishop, Calif. High wind warnings were in effect for the Southwest Texas mountains, passes through the night. Wintry cold streaming in north of the storm system drove temperatures below zero in North Dakota long before daybreak. A blizzard at midnight broke records for March 31 and April 1. The previous record was 1 above, set in 1881.

Showers sprinkled isolated sections of the Southeast, and light snow swirled over parts of the northern Great Lakes. The Ohio River, swollen by heavy rains in recent weeks, was expected to crest at its highest level in 24 years today at Paducah, Ky. Residents of an area south of the city and another 75 homes and businesses were flooded or nearly flooded.

Despite the high crest — 51.1 feet was forecast — Paducah itself was safe behind a floodwall built to hold back a stage of 64 feet. Temperatures before dawn ranged from 10 at Bismarck, N.D., to 79 at Key West, Fla. Some other reports: Atlanta 49 cloudy. Boston 33 partly cloudy. Buffalo 31 cloudy. Chicago 44 clear. Cincinnati 39 clear. Cleveland 39 clear. Dallas 52 clear. Denver 21 light snow. Detroit 41 cloudy. Honolulu 73 cloudy. Indianapolis 39 clear. Kansas City 33 cloudy. Los Angeles 52 cloudy. # Clemency Program Ends In Applications Flurry

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford's clemency program ended at midnight with a flurry of last-minute applications. Signups rose from 16,500 at the weekend to about 18,000 by the time the program ended at Monday midnight, a spokeswoman for the presidential Clemency Board reported. The military, which dealt with 12,500 unpunished deserters, said its total of men processed at Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind., rose from 5,253 to 5,284 over the weekend with another 33 still being processed. There was no sign of a final rush, a press officer at the post said late Monday.

The Justice Department, which took applications from among 4,400 unconvicted draft evaders, said its total of sign-ups rose over the weekend from 589 to 603.

**Government Will Step Up Borrowing**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government plans to borrow about \$80 billion this year.

Treasury Department officials said the tax decreases and rebates recently enacted are partially responsible for the borrowing, which is seven times last year's borrowings of \$11.8 billion.

**Johnson Heir Dies**  
FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Keith Johnson, 25, heir to the Johnson & Johnson pharmaceutical fortune, died Sunday. Police attributed death to an overdose of cocaine.

Assessing the program, Steve Grossman, 28, of Chicago, a draft resister on the editorial board of Amex Canada in Toronto, said it was "a miserable failure."

The American Civil Liberties Union, which has opposed the program, called it "a depressing failure."

"It has been rejected by over 80 per cent of those eligible," Grossman said. "We have opposed every extension of this punitive plan and we're glad to see it end. It was nothing more than a public relations game to let President Ford pardon former President Richard Nixon and punish war resisters."

An estimated 100,000 were eligible for the program.

**Gulf Increases Gasoline Prices**

HOUSTON (AP) — A one-cent a gallon increase in the price of all its grades of automotive gasoline has been announced by Gulf Oil Co.-U.S.

Gulf said the increase, effective Monday, was the result of the "higher cost of doing business under federal oil import tariffs, the federal crude oil entitlements program, and the mandatory crude oil allocation program." The firm said the increase was in accordance with Federal Energy Administration pricing regulations.





## Ford Believes Congress Bears Portion Of Blame For Debacle In Vietnam

 PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — President Ford has let it be known indirectly that he attributes Hanoi's military successes in South Vietnam to its violations of the Paris accord and Congress' failure to grant more aid to South Vietnam.

White House press secretary Ron Nessen told newsmen Monday he was sticking close to words Ford had used with him in private as he said: "I know he (Ford) feels the pullback of the South Vietnamese forces to a line which President Thieu feels is defensible was caused by two things: one, the violations of the Paris accord by the North Vietnamese; and second, by the effect on the morale of the South Vietnamese of the prospect of no further American ammunition and equipment which would enable them to fight for their own survival."

Nessen's comments came after Ford declined for the third straight day to respond directly to questions from newsmen about the situation in Vietnam.

During an airport stopover at Bakersfield, Calif., CBS White House reporter Phil Jones tried to ask him about Vietnam, but Ford interrupted him with a laugh and began jogging toward his waiting jet some 100 yards away.

Jones kept pace with Ford and was able to complete his question, but the President, who was grinning from ear to ear and seemingly enjoying the exercise, confined himself to challenging the network correspondent to "keep abreast of him."

After Ford returned to Palm Springs from Bakersfield and an inspection tour of the Elk Hills Naval Petroleum Reserve, Nessen was asked if Ford's trotting was an effort to avoid talking about Vietnam.

"I would not think so," he said. "I think you know him better than that."

Aboard Ford's plane en route here from Bakersfield, Nessen said when asked for the President's reaction to reports from Vietnam, "I think he finds them very sobering and is very concerned about them."

## Senate Panel Okays Child Care Measure

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Child care facilities in Texas will be licensed and regulated by the state if a bill approved by a Senate committee becomes law.

The State Affairs Committee approved Monday a measure, sponsored by Sen. Bill Moore, D-Bryan, which forbids a person from operating a child care facility or a child-placing agency without a license.

The bill, supported by the Texas Education Agency (TEA) and the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, says the facilities covered by the act would be supervised by the TEA and Department of Public Welfare (DPW).

The committee heard favorable testimony from all witnesses but two who said they did not feel the bill was strong enough.

Norma Kay Stone of Houston, representing the Texas Coalition for Child Care Licensing, said, "The bill should have provisions requiring institutions to have provisional licenses for six months to see if they are conforming with the law."

"This bill does not answer the need for a strong licensing law," Miss Stone said.

The bill exempts a "family home" from the licensing requirements but does require that the home be registered with the DPW. A "family home" is defined as a residence in which children under 14 from not more than three families are cared for for less than 24 hours a day.

## Realtor Segal Assessed 3-Year Term In Swindle

NEW YORK (AP) — Florida realtor Alan Segal has been sentenced to three years in federal prison for a \$335,000 stock-rigging swindle involving a Nevada corporation.

Three other men drew shorter sentences in a case that began with the indictment of nine men last Sept. 24.

All were accused of conspiring to rig the stock of Pioneer Development Corp. in 1969-70 through brokers in New York, Denver and Los Angeles. The firm was described as a "shell" corporation.

Segal, 51, of North Miami, associated with a Miami condominium firm, was sentenced Monday by Federal Judge Lloyd MacMahon in Manhattan federal court on his Dec. 12 conviction of conspiracy and 27 other counts.

Barred from stock dealings in 1959 by New York state courts, Segal netted \$335,000 on Pioneer sales while feeding suspicious investors false information about government contracts for mobile heaters, according to the government.

Others sentenced were Edward Zuber, 34, of Costa Mesa, Calif., 2 1/2 years for mail fraud; Howard Finkelstein, 46, of Bay-side, Queens, a Florida realtor, two years for mail fraud; and Anthony Scardino, 48, a Houston, Tex., designer, two months for conspiracy and nine other counts, plus a 22-month suspended sentence.

Three other defendants pleaded guilty and were sentenced Jan. 13, among them Pioneer Development president Michael Clegg, 36, of Marble Falls, Tex., who got two years. An eighth case was dismissed and a ninth defendant remains a fugitive.

Besides individuals who lost on the swindle, trial testimony identified the Industrial Bank & Trust Co. of Everett, Mass., and the Guarantee Trust Co. of Waltham, Mass., as losing \$40,000 each, which they loaned against stock collateral.

## 10 Texas Cities Eligible To Buy Flood Insurance

NEW YORK (AP) — Residents of 10 Texas cities and one county have become eligible to purchase federally-subsidized flood insurance for residential and non-residential property, the National Flood Insurers Association (NFIA) announced.

Private insurance agents and brokers are authorized to offer flood insurance to interested owners or residential and non-residential properties. Coverage on contents also will be sold to owners and occupants of such buildings.

The Texas cities made eligible Monday are: Point Comfort, Decatur, Hooks, University Park, Sonora, Henrietta, Bastrop, Brownfield, Falfurrias, and Dayton, Waller County also, was included.

# Israeli Newspaper Suggests New Withdrawal In Sinai

By The Associated Press  
A leading Israeli newspaper has suggested that Israel should pull back its forces in the Sinai Desert another three miles in response to Egypt's decision to reopen the Suez Canal as a result of the engagement agreement negotiated by Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger in January.

But Israeli ships will be barred from the waterway because Egypt and Israel are still technically at war. The Israeli army's lines are now 12 miles east of the canal. He said military intervention in the Middle East oil states is "a remote possibility." The Iraqi government announced that its army was advancing on the last strongholds of the rebel Kurdish tribesmen along the Iranian border following the expiration of an amnesty offer.
